Endurance ride augurs well for next year

Burrumbuttock's inaugural Endurance Horse ride has been hailed a success by both the competitors and the local volunteer support contingent.

It also proved a boost for Rec. Ground's fund raising, the Farmers Inn and the store.

Promotor and event director Tony Marshall said that for an introductory ride he was pleased, and it augured well for an even bigger event next year, and was a solid foundation for the future.

Many riders had expressed pleasing comments about the Burrumbuttock event being included in the nation's endurance calendar, as they had found the professional organisation and the enthusiastic support of volunteers gratifying.

As well, with some endurance events now coursing along roadways too much, it was pleasing that the Burrum ride was principally across farmland. Even the presence of the children's playground drew positive comments.

Tony said some lessons had been learned, and there was room for a few improvements. A little more volunteer support next time would lighten the load for the volunteers.

People do not need any horse expertise to be helpful.

Landholders played a pivotal part in this events' success and their support was critical and much appreciated.

In all just over 120 riders took part in the International, Australian, intermediate and social sections, with overseas competitors coming from Singapore and Malaysia.

As well horse buyers from Bahrain were active among owners.

From America to officiate



The Chief Steward at world Endurance Rides, is responsible for ensuring riders abide by the rules and protocols as laid down by the governing body, the Fédération Équestre Internationale.

In the case of the Burrumbuttock event the Federation approved steward came from Seattle in America, and was a Japanese gentleman who spends a good portion of his life supporting endurance rides around the world.

They are responsibilities he undertakes at his own expense.

Yaguchi Kiyotaka has previously officiated at several Australian rides and has attended other recent events in New Zealand and Thailand. Now finished in Australia (for now) he's off to Japan for yet another endurance ride there.

WIRRIMINA NEWS

When Wirraminna was started nearly 30 years ago, the plan was to create an arboretum to plant a range of local trees and shrubs that landcare farmers could plant on their farms. This aim was quickly expanded to include native plants for home gardens and educational opportunities for local schools. Walking around Wirraminna now, the results of these different aims can be seen. Garden beds are (mostly) neat and tidy, with a large range of native garden plants, carefully pruned and spaced to give full expression to their attractive flowers, foliage, and fruits or bark. We try to keep them neat and tidy.

On the other hand, many areas are messy, and are crowded with a mixture of native herbs, grasses and shrubs. There are a lot of dead leaves and sticks, and the plants may be tangled together. This is our attempt to re-create the original vegetation of this region prior to settlement, with the associated clearing and introduction of exotic pasture grasses, crops and weeds. Growing the local trees and shrubs has been fairly easy, but a greater challenge has been the groundcover species, as these are not easily sourced, and seed has to be collected from roadside remnants. Our Seed Production Area is a way of increasing the supply of seed of many species.

Restoring the original vegetation is not just about the plants. The diversity of animals is much greater in the messy restored vegetation, when compared to the tidy garden beds. This goes right up the food chain, through insects large and small, spiders, frogs, lizards and birds. We don't have the expertise to identify them all, but it doesn't take long, searching through the vegetation, to find a lot of different creatures, even if we can't put a name to them. Birds are the main beneficiaries of this diversity and abundance.

Restoration of original vegetation is a slow process and weeds continue to be a problem, but we are making progress. We have a diverse range of birds resident in Wirraminna, and while they use the garden beds, the natural restored areas are most important for their livelihoods.

We are looking forward to a different event in Wirraminna on **Saturday April 20th** when Murray Arts will present **Limelight, Art/Science/Light**. It is a free event that will provide a new experience in Wirraminna.

Is it an all-access event?

Wheelchair access:

The event is a trail of art along a gravel path that may be difficult for wheelchairs to access in some areas. The main gathering area is accessible along a gravel path.

Low Vision access:

The artworks are not audio described so you may want to bring an interpreter.

The path is quite narrow and winding. It is lit but not very brightly so you may want to bring someone along to help guide you if you have low vision.

Low hearing access:

Some of the works have soundscapes running alongside the visuals. There is limited text interpretation accompanying those works however the visuals themselves tell the stories quite powerfully

Yes, we have local services providing a range of food on the night.

You are very welcome to bring your own food, picnic rug, folding chairs etc and enjoy the night as we wait for the sun to go down.

SQUIRREL GLIDER PROJECT

My name is Dylan Lees and I am a PhD candidate with the Gulbali Institute at Charles Sturt University and my principal supervisor is Dr Damian Michael. My overall project will be looking at the response of the squirrel glider (*Petaurus norfolcensis*) to management interventions in urban and rural environments. This will involve a number components in the Albury-Wodonga area and Burrumbuttock comparing uptake of various nest box types, occupancy relating to camera trap data within Albury-Wodonga and also trapping and GPS tracking of gliders in Burrumbuttock to determine population estimates and how they move throughout the landscape.

Trapping surveys: My aim here is to replicate the same trapping procedures undertaken 10 years ago as part of the implementation of the Burrumbuttock Local Area Management Plan (LAMP) to conserve and increase the population of squirrel gliders. This will involve setting cage traps at 30 sites within a 10km radius of Burrumbuttock. This will start from early April and continue for approximately 5-6 weeks.

GPS tracking: I also aim to attach GPS devices to at least 15 individual gliders so I can assess how they move throughout the landscape, in particular in areas where revegetation works have taken place as part of the LAMP. The idea here will be to see if they are using and moving through areas subject to tree plantings and installation of nest boxes.

This will enable us to compare population estimates from the surveys 10 years prior and assess the effectiveness of the revegetation works with a view to better understanding how the species is using the landscape and inform further targeted interventions.

I understand the Burrumbuttock community has taken a keen interest in providing additional habitat and conserving this species so I very much look forward to meeting and working with landholders and other local stakeholders who may be interested in this project.
