Food and beverages available: Barbecue, Delicious boxed lunch, Full bar facility, Tea/ coffee/ sweet treats.


Directions:

Wirraminna News

Wirraminna includes large areas of native gardens, a dam and natural woodland which we are working to restore to its original pre-settlement condition. This means that the wildlife habitat is improving. The tree canopy has increased as we planted many different species of Eucalypt, suitable for smaller gardens, and larger trees representing the vegetation of areas further west and north like several species of Casuarina, large wattles, and Cypress Pines. The shrub understorey habitat is provided by the wide variety of non local native shrubs in the garden beds, and more local species around the dam and in the farm shelter belt. The open areas are becoming more and more dominated by native grasses. The ponds and the dam have a lot of marginal vegetation of rushes and sedges.

All this native vegetation is accompanied by a very diverse range of insects and spiders, So with the addition to a range of seeds and fruits, there is a banquet for visiting and resident birds, and lizards. An important feature of good bird and lizard habitat is that it should be "messy". The ground should be covered with dry leaves and bark where insects can live, and native grasses should be able to grow and have seed heads for the finches. Dead branches on shrubs and trees are also important, as a perch and lookout post for birds during their hunt for food. This also makes it easier to see them.

Some bird species are permanent residents while others come and go. During any visit to Wirraminna, there is always a chance to see a bird you haven't seen before. Very often some species are more easily heard rather than seen, and there is almost always something calling in the tree tops. We have a list of species that have been recorded at Wirraminna and an even greater number, approaching 200, that have been recorded in and around Burrumbuttock, thanks to Dave Watson's skills, any

of which may be seen at Wirraminna on a lucky day.

Birds that can almost always be seen include Magpies, Grey Shrike Thrushes. Willy Wagtails, Superb Blue Wrens, Red-browed and Double-barred Finches, Grey Fantails, Magpie Larks, Crested Pigeons, Galahs, Striated Pardalotes and Whiteplumed Honeyeaters. On the dam, Black Dusks, Grey Teal, and Moorhens come and go, herons and ibis are frequently seen and cormorants are often hunting fish.

At this time of year, the summer visitors, like the Sacred Kingfisher,

Rainbow Bee-eater and the Dollarbird have probably moved north, while the Currawongs and the robins may be moving in.

In recent years some new birds have moved in which were not about 20-30 years ago. King parrots have become regular residents, possibly as a result of the changing conditions in their usual habitat in the forests further east, Crimson Rosellas are also more common. They appear to find that the habitat in Burrumbuttock suits them very well.

A pamphlet listing the birds that can potentially be seen at Wirraminna is usually available in the entrance shelter.

It is proposed to turn the disused railway line from Culcairn involved in beautifying the trail, planting trees for wildlife to Corowa into a recreational shared cycling/walking trail corridors i.e. a rail trail which excludes all motorised transport. This remnants, creating information signs and so on. rail trail would deliver on many points raised in the GHC 2025-2035 Strategic Plan that was released recently. Currently this 76 km route within Greater Hume and Federal Council areas is a weed-infested eyesore and a fire hazard but if turned into a rail trail, it would be an economic asset to Culcairn, Walla Walla, Burrumbuttock, Brocklesby, Balldale, Hopefield and Corowa. It has been well documented from the many other rail trails (133 and counting) already in operation around Australia that rail trails attract thousands of visitors each per year which gives rise to new business and tourism opportunities. Rail trails are mainly funded by State Government followed by Federal Govt grants and smaller community and regional development grants. Local councils typically contribute only a small amount e.g. they may pay for the feasibility study. Businesses and community groups also contribute some funding or volunteers.



include farm tours, farmgate sales, showcasing historic farm building and vintage machinery, diversifying into rare breeds of livestock, planting mazes of corn or sunflower plants instead of hedges and so on. Businesses in towns benefit from rail trail visitors because the visitors will be spending money on food and drinks which could mean extra staff employed to enable longer opening hours of pubs, cafes or new hospitality ventures are created. Bikespecific ventures include bike rentals, bike repair shops and guided cycling tours. Rail trails have free entry but visitors tend to spend money along the trail. Obviously, the more there is to see and do along a rail trail to enhance the cycling/walking experience, the longer visitors will stay or they will return later. Towns and villages which currently don't have anything to attract visitors may be encouraged to paint their silos, create a new festival or come up with other tourism ideas to put their town on the tourism radar. Rail trails connect towns, not only physically through the trail but by coming together in fundraising and volunteers being


and shade, restoring historic railway station

Rail trails are a tourism magnet for visiting cyclists/ pedestrians but they also provide a safe place to exercise for locals. Last year, there were 38 cyclists and 167 pedestrians killed on roads in Australia. We aim to have a sealed surface which would mean it is all inclusive. Therefore, unlike gravel trails that are only suitable for mountain bikes and which are high maintenance, a sealed trail is suitable



New opportunities include accommodation options for for all types of bikes (including children's tricycles), as well visitors such as caravan parks adding cabins, farm stays and as wheelchairs, wheely walkers, prams and strollers. In bed & breakfast options. Agritourism options are many addition, rail trails can be used by schools for cross-country carnivals; a football club can do training runs there instead of running around a muddy oval and some have been used for fundraising efforts. These efforts include hosting fun runs, bike races of various distances or orienteering challenges. Bird watchers are also enthusiastic users of rail trails as they are a safe quiet environment to do so. Bridge enthusiasts are also drawn to rail trails and we have 7 trestle bridges.

> We have formed a subcommittee and we welcome any new members who would have a vested interest in this rail trail such as business owners, walkers and cyclists. So far, we have made contact with Rail Trails Australia for their guidance and we have created a vision statement that has


