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Let's talk about Sewerage Community Forum members meet with Council Manager

On 10th July, five members of the Community Forum committee met with Evelyn Arnold, Greater Hume Shire General Manager, in Burrumbuttock.

The purpose of the meeting was to inspect the Gibson Drive subdivision that was originally proposed on Council land at least twenty years ago. The parcel of land is adjacent to the Common Effluent Disposal System.

The Forum is concerned that the current effluent pondage system is over-subscribed and is one of the major limiting factors to new development occurring in the village.

Evelyn explained the process that needs to occur for the Council to prioritise the project. The community needs to lobby the Council and

request that Burrumbuttock undertakes a Structured Plan. This planning activity is a community-led process funded by Council to holistically look at all aspects of what Burrumbuttock needs in order to develop - according to the wishes of the residents. It would identify barriers to growth, consider water, sewerage, potential blocks for subdivision, and other related factors.

Once this plan was completed, budget allocation for design of new infrastructure would occur, followed by a budget for the actual works needed. This entire process could take several years, so the Burrumbuttock Forum is keen on raising awareness across all Greater Hume councillors of the need for Burrumbuttock to be prioritised for this Structured Planning process to take place.

We must request Council prioritises Burrumbuttock to undergo a Structured Planning process as soon as possible so that our village can continue to develop.


Burrumbuttock is 'a community destined to grow.' It is twenty minutes' drive from Albury, and also strategically located between Walla and Howlong where two large employing industries are located. **Background**

There is a **twenty year history of inaction** over the effluent pondage system. A Strategic Plan for Burrumbuttock was completed in 2006 with the support of Hume Shire Council. The plan was the culmination of a number of Strategic planning community workshops that were held in 2003. Two of the 2006 Strategic Plan's top projects for development in Burrumbuttock were:

- 1. That appropriate land be set aside for new sewerage works the current system is considered not suitable as it is positioned in prime residential area, has reached capacity, and for other environmental reasons.
- 2. That further residential development occurs.
- 3. No action has been taken on these 'priority projects' for twenty years!

Please attend the next Forum meeting on Monday 25th September

at the Public Hall to help us develop a campaign to pressure the Council for Burrumbuttock to be the next community to undergo a Structured planning process. We need your support.

Wirraminna News The 'Big Lift' arrives to lend a hand at Wirraminna

When thirty-nine Sydney University of Technology students turned up to do a day's work at Wirraminna, they certainly moved the project ahead with a big leap. The team were students from the University of Technology Sydney and were part of a volunteer group calling themselves the 'Big Lift Volunteer Society,' with the motto of 'To pay it Forward, Helping not Expecting.

The idea of forming the society came from the U.S. and was assist community projects in regional towns throughout the state. They do one 12-day trip, and several weekend excursions, per year.

A committee is responsible for selecting the applicants as well as locating projects sites. Burrumbuttock was found after the committee googled Albury, and somehow found Burrum from there.

Students wanting to participate must apply, and while this year there were 80, or two busloads, selected, many more applied.

Before coming to Burrum, they had been at Adelong, cleaning creek edges They visit nine towns in all.

The only conditions they have for helping is that they are given a meal and provided with somewhere to lay out their sleeping bags. These places might be school halls, classrooms, scout halls, even churches, and in Burrumbuttock it was the change rooms at the sports ground.

The three-course evening meal was prepared and served by Angie Marshall, Sue Rose, Fe Coleman and Estrella Wiltshire. Their sleeping quarters were heated, so all around, the word next morning was one of much satisfaction.

The Wirraminna committee was not short of work for the thirty-nine. Two undertakings were ready for the group. The first was to fill the two gabions at the entrance to the discovery centre, and two gabions over the creek bridge with stones. The second project was to help with the everlasting fight with weed control by covering the plant with wet newspaper and bark.



I visited Wirraminna woodlands as planned in damp conditions with light rain on Friday June 30, and experienced the most bird diversity I have seen since commencing surveys there back in 2015. The good work is definitely showing results.

Nineteen species were recorded within the boundaries of the woodlands being galah, eastern



rosella, red rumped parrot, superb fairy wren, striated pardalote, yellow thombill, red wattlebird, noisy miner, yellow faced honey eater (good

numbers and a first record), white plumed honey eater, golden whistler (first record), grey shrike

thrush, grey fantail, black faced cuckoo shrike, magpie, pied currawong, raven sp, tree martin (first record), and silver eye.

of

What was particularly interesting was the number

birds moving between the mature vegetation in Elmslea lane and the plantings in the woodlands.

Of interest in the surrounding area was a black shouldered kite and the large numbers of parrots on the oval.

There was at least 100 galahs and a mixed flock of



150 plus red rumped parrots and eastern rosellas.

This is the largest flock of red rumped parrots that I can recall..

There was also a golden whistler.
