
30th **June**, so please search out some photos and write your family story for us to include!

Ley narrowly wins the leadership, first woman in charge of federal Liberals

Member for Farrer Sussan Ley has been elected to

the federal leadership of the Liberal Party, becoming the first woman in the role.

The 63-year-old won the vote 29-25 over fellow regional MP Angus Taylor in a ballot of party MPs in Canberra on Tuesday, May 13.

As well as being the first woman to lead the party, Ms Ley will become the first female Opposition Leader.

Not since former prime minister Malcolm Fraser in 1983 has the Liberal Party had a leader who represents a country electorate.

It caps a 24-year rise for Ms Ley.

When she was first preselected in 2001 by Liberal Party members for Farrer, Ms Ley told *The Border Mail* she had no ambitions beyond serving the electorate.

"I don't want any other job," Ms Ley said. I only want to be a good local member for Farrer. Ms Ley has been the member for Farrer since 2001 and has served under John Howard, Brendan Nelson, Malcolm Turnbull, Tony Abbott, Scott Morrison and Peter Dutton.

She has won nine elections to the seat, which extends from Jingellic across to the South Australian border along the Murray River and north to the Murrumbidgee Irrigation Area.

The Nigerian-born parliamentarian is the second longest serving member for the seat and is due to beat the record of inaugural member David Fairbairn (1949-1975) if she remains the member until October 2027.

"Records and statistics don't matter to me, I'm here because every election brings new challenges and important work for me to do with my community to help them get ahead," Ms Ley told *The Border Mail* in response to that mark looming.

In terms of portfolio service, Ms Ley has been a minister for health, sport, aged care and the environment at different times between 2014 and 2022. Sourced from the Internet.

We have welcomed 6 new children to the Preschool this term and are busy getting to know each other. The children who were already attending are excited to have more friends to play with and are helping our new friends to settle in and get involved in our programs. We have been really enjoying lots of time outside with the weather, but it is great to see the rain. We are blessed with 2 big undercover areas that allow us to enjoy time outside even if it is raining. We are proudly



flying our 3 new flags from Sussan Ley's office in our yard. We have the Australian Flag, Aboriginal Flag and Torres Strait Islander flags. We are learning about what the colours and the symbols on the flags mean as we are also creating our own versions of the flags with our handprints. Did you know that the yellow on the Aboriginal Flag represents the Sun which is seen as the giver of life in Aboriginal Culture and the white star on the Torres Strait Islander flag has 5 points to represent the five island groups. We enjoyed putting up our new flag over the 3 days we operate so all children could be involved.

We have a great interest in building and using what is available to us to build with. We have some large/strong cardboard rolls, and they are great for building including when we combine them with our flat wooden blocks. Inside we have been exploring building with small wooden pieces (called biscuits I believe), seeing how we can stack them which involves lots of problem solving as they are not all uniform in size.

Wirraminna News - Celebrating 30 Years



The rain has been so very welcome at Wirraminna. At last, we can stop watering and pay more attention to the winter jobs. To confirm the seasonal change, the winter wattles are brightening up the park. We are also counting our losses as some of the garden plants didn't make it, despite our watering efforts. We are having our annual Nursery visit and lunch this week, this year to Myrtleford, in company with the Albury-Wodonga Australian Native Plant Society. One of the results of the lovely rain is the emergence of large moths, generally seen banging on the windows at night. We have had a lively comparison of observations over the week, and it seems that there may be several species that emerge from their pupal stage during autumn rain. They spend their grub/caterpillar stage underground eating tree roots, or in the trunks of wattle trees. They are among several species often collected as Bardi grubs. This takes up most of their life span. When they are ready to pupate, they make a tunnel nearly up to the soil surface where, while the grub turns into a moth, they stay hidden. The autumn rains alert them that it is time! The pupae move part way out of the ground, and the adult moth emerges. They are attracted to lit

windows, so we notice them. There are several species, most commonly the Wattle Goat Moth, and the larger Rain Moth which can have a wingspan of about 20 cm. They mate quickly and the female Rain Moths hold the record of the greatest number of eggs which they scatter over the ground as they fly. The adult moth stage of their life is very short. These moths are part of the wonderful diversity that Wirraminna supports.

However, I was sitting there recently while my wife was powdering her nose. I know, women don't do that these days, do they? But you know what I am referring to.

"There for the fox," he enlightened me, matter of fact and seemingly a normal reason for having so many pairs of thongs. Now he really had my attention, and noticing I seemed amused, he continued.

"If I ever walk into the house and leave my thongs outside and forget to bring them in, the fox chews them overnight. He never misses. Next morning, the straps are chewed through, and the heels are knawed."

"Why don't you shoot the fox?" "We've got lots of rabbits, and the fox helps control them."

I thought his logic was a little askew since if he spent the thong money on rabbit poison, he could then shoot the fox, and both problems would be gone. But no, he obviously had an affinity with the fox and enjoyed their relationship. And why not! They are attractive, sleek animals, highly intelligent, and very crafty, but unfortunately, they are pests as well. "Where do you live. "Just out of Holbrook."

I was about to ask him if I could take his photo with the thongs as I thought he would agree, but his wife suddenly arrived with her arms full of goods, and he stood up to help her, so the moment passed. Pity. Colin Wiltshire
