PLANNING DAY TO SHAPE HEALTHCARE IN YOUR COMMUNITY



Murrumbidgee Local Health District (MLHD) and Murrumbidgee Primary Health Network (MPHN) to discuss local health data and set the LHAC's priorities and projects for the vear.

In addition to advocating for local health needs, the Culcairn LHAC set their own goals and projects based on what it most important for their own community.

On Monday March 6th Culcairn Local Health Advisory Committee members will meet with Executives from MLHD and MPHN. While the role of the MLHD and the MPHN are quite different, priority areas do overlap and both organisations work closely to address the needs of the local community. The role of the LHAC is critical in helping the MPHN and the MLHD understand priorities from a local perspective and both organisations work closely with the LHAC to support local initiatives.

The MPHN, which is federally funded has responsibility for primary health care, while the state funded MLHD is responsible for acute health provision in the hospital setting. Data used to guide the discussions is sourced from the Australian Bureau of Statistics and combined with the local health needs assessments carried out by the MPHN.

"As advocates for their local community, members of the Local Health Advisory Committees are chosen for their ability to represent their town's health interests, needs and concerns," said MLHD's Community Engagement Manager Setchen Brimson. "We love that LHAC members are always very vocal and active in their advocacy around what is a priority for their local community, and this drive and commitment to improving health outcomes helps us all work together to achieve results."

LHAC projects may range for arranging events and activities or developing information awareness brochures to raise communities around access to services, to taking steps to support, extend or introduce services. LHACs have also been actively involved in health service planning and redevelopment projects, providing very critical feedback to inform these plans from a consumer and enduser perspective. "The key to being a good advocate is the ability to have your finger on the pulse of your local community and the ability to speak up and represent these community needs and concerns when you're at the discussion commented Ms Brimson. "LHAC members are well respected for their contribution and in every aspect of the role they take on," Ms Brimson said.

IN YOUR GARDEN March 2023

Summer has kicked in over the last few weeks, with hotter drier days. As the days shorten, we still have quite warm nights, so growth and ripening is good. Prepare beds now for Autumn vegetables. Onions - Red, White and Brown, can be sown now, either as seedlings from a punnet, or directly into the soil as seeds. Wait a little longer to plant Garlic (April /May).

Brassicas – Cauliflower, Cabbage, Brussels sprout and Broccoli planted in the Autumn will grow well through the colder months. Green Vegies - Spinach, Silver Beet, Broad Beans, Lettuce go in now too. Plant some new herbs for Winter use, parsley, rosemary, mint, chives etc.

Pumpkins are growing well. Pinch out ends of runners to stop new fruit forming (it won't have time to mature before frosts). Zucchinis and cucumbers are in abundance in many gardens, A saying: If you plant more than one Zucchini plant you must have a LOT of friends!!

NATIVES: After the BIG WET people are wondering, what to plant to replace those lost in the WET areas. (L – Large, S – Small)

WET AREAS - Callistemon – L (bottle brush) and Casurina - S (She Oak) L & S Some weeping forms.

DRY AREAS – Grevilleas - L&S Varied Foliage, Wattles - L & S Flower at different times, Hakeas - L&S Pretty Flowers, Correas - L&S Flower in Winter

MARCH 17th ST PATRICKS DAY said to be the day for planting Sweet Peas.

PRUNING Gardenias: Wait until they have finished flowering (mid-March). Remove dead flowers and wood. Prune bush to shape. Pruning too early will inhibit the setting of buds for next year's flowers. Fertilise well with a liquid manure.



Time now to plant BULBS for Spring flowering. Many varieties of Daffodils, Hyacinths, tulips etc available in nurseries and online now (Garden Express is a large and reputable firm). I have found them to be very efficient and have some

good specials.

DAHLIAS Flowering beautifully now in many colours shape and sizes. Fertilise with a Potassium fertiliser every two weeks after buds form. Stake larger plants so they won't suffer wind damage.

Grey leafed plants - good for hot, dry conditions also used for borders and hedges, as they can be clipped. Coastal Rosemary (Westringia fruticose), Teucrium fruticans and Lavender varieties all thrive in dry climate.

Keep the water and fertiliser up and enjoy your Garden, Margaret Pumpa




