GARDEN CLUB – UPDATE ON CORONATION DRIVE

Recently a group of current and past residents of Culcairn met at Coronation Drive to plant a new addition to the grove of White Cedar and Kurrajong trees. This tree replaces one of the original trees planted which unfortunately did not survive.

Coronation Drive was originally planted as a part of the celebrations for the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II some 70 years ago. It has grown to become a magnificent stand of trees.

Henty/Culcairn Probus met at Henty Community centre 12th April 2023. Our President Yvonne Booth welcomed us all. Beryl Meyer took up her new position as our club secretary, and our Treasurer Heather Collis gave her report. Neil and Julie Parker told us about possible phone and computer scams, and Janet Beverley gave an update on Avondale and the anticipated occupancy certificate. A big thank you from Yvonne and the sea men who receive our beautifully beanies. They are much appreciated and much needed.

Sybil Ritchie was our five-minute speaker. She told of her father being fourth of ten children and eldest boy, and how he went farming at Ganmain and then to war, and how he met his future wife, a qualified tailoress, in Glasgow. Sybil's parents were married at Ryan and her mother learned about cooking on a wood stove, from neighbours. The family from Glasgow came to Australia and some went to school in Henty. Sybil has worked in Melbourne and Sydney and has had two corner stores in Wagga Wagga, as well as working at the Prince of Wales motel in Wagga Wagga. We thank Sybil for sharing her family story and very busy life.

After morning tea, June Bahr introduced Robyn Wood, whose family she has known for fifty years. Robyn spoke on falls prevention. The information from Robyn was aimed at those over sixty -five years, particularly the people using walking sticks and walkers and their fit for our height and width and discussing this with a physiotherapist. Robyn spoke of eating well, wearing well-fitting nonslip shoes, annual medical testing as well as dental and eye checks. Most importantly, Robyn spoke of needing to keep our bodies strong, so we are less likely to have falls. Thirty-seven percent of injury deaths are caused by falls and it is every one's business to prevent falls.

We should have ICE (in case of emergency) phone numbers in our phone and do gentle exercise to help ourselves and that can be as basic as a daily 20 minute walk.

After a most interesting question and answer session, following her chat, Robyn was presented with a Probus pen as a token of our thanks.

Yvonne most often closes our meetings by sharing an interesting quote. Todays was "Be the reason somebody smiles today". Our next meeting is May 10 at Culcairn Bowls Club, 9.30 am for a 10.00 am start. Hope you will join us and stay for lunch, smiles and friendship after our speakers.

CULCAIRN BUSINESS DISTRICT UPGRADE

Greater Hume Council is currently upgrading the Culcairn Business District with the installation of new drainage pipes, kerb and channel, footpaths, development of a central Plaza area (see attached for artists impression) and replacement of some of the plane trees with Chinese Pistacho trees.

Council is in regular contact with the business operators and landowners affected as well as the Culcairn Community Development Committee. The contractors have advised that depending on the work being undertaken, there will be a loss of several parking spaces between 3 to 10 days as they progress along Balfour Street. Council and the contractors are also working on minimising the impact of the works on access to businesses, however there may be occurrences where this is unavoidable.

Currently work is progressing well along the southern side of Balfour Street, with the current weather conditions assisting the contractors. New drainage pipes have been installed and work has commenced on the kerb and channel along with a new standard footpath between Fraser Street to the Lane between Fraser and Blair Streets.




