CORONATION DRIVE EVENT

The unveiling of a new Storyboard and the refurbished "Original" plaque for Coronation Drive was held on the afternoon of 2nd June, 2023. The event was attended by about 40 people, and included members of the Culcairn Garden Club, the Culcairn community and included a number of people who had been involved in the original planting of the Avenue of trees in 1953.

Special guests who attended: Justin Clancy MP



for Albury, Annette Schilg (Dep Mayor, Greater Hume), Evelyn Arnold (GM, Greater Hume) and Ian Forest (Councillor, Greater Hume).

The day was organised by the Culcairn Garden Club. President Lolita Landman gave a summary of the history behind the creation of Coronation Drive. Coronation Drive Project Officer Jennifer Christensen introduced Mr John Ross and Mr Kit Middleton who unveiled the new Storyboard. Mr Ross and Mr Middleton were requested to unveil

the Storyboard as their fathers (Mr Alister Ross, and Dr Geoffrey Middleton) were heavily involved in the creation of Coronation Drive.

The unveiling event was timed to recognise the 70th Anniversary of the planting of the trees which form Coronation Drive in Culcairn. The original planting took place in the late afternoon/evening of 2nd June, 1953.

In his speech, Mr Clancy remarked that the trees chosen for the avenue were White Cedar and Kurrajong and that they were symbolic of the area, being used in streets and even in sheep and cattle yards for shade in the region. He also noted that Coronation Drive was a lasting legacy to future generations which was something that subsequent generations should aspire to.

The event was made possible through the assistance of Management and staff of Greater Hume Council who funded the refurbishment of the original plaque, and the creation and erection of the new storyboard.

Refreshments were provided in the club rooms of the Culcairn Football Club by members of the Garden Club at the conclusion of the Unveiling.

It is hoped that the community will make greater use of this wonderful asset, and that it can become a tourist attraction for Culcairn.

Hello! My name is Erica Percy, I am a proud Wiradjuri woman working at our beautiful MPS in Culcairn. I am a mother to my beautiful two-year-old daughter, Alice, and I just celebrated my first wedding anniversary to my husband Brayden. I enjoy educating my daughter of our Aboriginal heritage, mostly through books at the moment. My aged care career started in 2019 as an Assistant in Nursing, and I have since started my Bachelor's Degree in nursing through Charles Sturt University. I absolutely love my culture and being connected to the land through the original custodians, my ancestors from Darlington Point and Narrandera. I love learning about my Indigenous heritage and hope to be able to use this through my nursing career, and my new position as Culcairn MPS's Aboriginal Nursing Cadet.



Footnote: Erica began working with us as an AIN in August last year and has quickly gained rapport with staff, residents and patients alike.

Erica is respected due to her work ethic, person-centred focus and her bubbly personality.

Management were aware that Erica was studying her Bachelor of Nursing with CSU and encouraged her to apply for the Indigenous Cadet Scholarship with MLHD when she identified as being of Aboriginal descent.

This scholarship, funded by Nursing & Midwifery extends for the period of Erica's degree and offers her one day per week paid employment to learn the role of a Registered Nurse hands-on.

Erica will be supported by our entire team to buddy with our RN's on these shifts and to complete her baccalaureate.



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**COMMUNITY AND CARERS TO LEARN
MORE ABOUT BENEFITS OF INNOVATIVE
ARTS PROGRAM**

The Arts in Health Multipurpose Service (MPS) Pilot Project is an innovative program which provides aged care residents at three facilities in the Murrumbidgee Local Health District (MLHD) with access to professional and quality arts engagement experiences.

Murrumbidgee Local Health District Chief Executive Jill Ludford said the pilot project, the first launched in the state in 2021, aims to provide opportunities for engagement in arts activities as a catalyst for conversation to connect people and improve wellbeing.

“Now in its second year, we are incredibly proud of this pioneering program and the benefits it is delivering for our residents and staff at Murrumburrah-Harden, Culcairn and Tumbarumba Multipurpose Services,” she said.

This month, the Art Gallery of NSW and Health Infrastructure is providing training and development opportunities to health staff, family, carers and community members to engage with the program directly in their local multipurpose service.

The Pilot Program is modelled on similar Art Gallery of NSW programs created for people with a lived experience of dementia and uses arts activities to connect people and improve wellbeing.

It includes a curated display of 20 high quality, framed reproductions featuring some of the Gallery’s most loved artworks from the Australian collection, and an associated program of purposeful activities and materials provided at each facility to engage aged care residents in self-guided, one-on-one and group activities led by trained staff.

The project is a collaboration between Murrumbidgee Local Health District, the Art Gallery of NSW and Health Infrastructure. The initiative received the Murrumbidgee Local Health District ‘Chief Executives Award’ in 2022.

If you call to the Outreach Hub during the opening times, we have vouchers available for new enquiries for some FREE sample meals. We have other goodies to give away as well. Why not drop in and say hello!

Our staff will be available to help with enquiries regarding our services, Meals on Wheels, Social Support, Food Services and Transport. We will be able to help you with My Aged Care enquires and registration as well as the process of registering to receive referrals for our services.

We look forward to meeting you in Culcairn and providing these services face to face across the council area.

You do need to be registered with My Aged Care to access ongoing services with us – don’t worry, if you aren’t registered, we can help you with that as well. Our service provides supervised contact visits and change-overs/change-backs with the aim of reconnecting parents/carers to children and fostering positive relationships.

Below is a summary of each of these services.

Contact Visits:

Our CCS staff facilitate safe, positive and child focused supervised contact visits which allow children to spend time with a parent/family member whom they do not live with. Staff supervise, monitor, and document these interactions. Visits usually occur on a regular basis and commonly occur between 30 minutes to two hours. Visits can be based within the children's contact centre, the local community or online via video.

Change-overs/change-backs:

Our service also provides supervised change-overs/change-backs. Our CCS staff facilitate change-overs and change-backs to support parents/carers facilitate a conflict-free and child focused exchange. For example, children may spend hours, days or weeks with the other parent/carer until the agreed time to transition back to the parent they live with. Change-overs can occur at the children's contact centre, online by video or in the community.

We take court ordered referrals, referrals from other organisations or self-referrals. Additionally, we provide our services onsite, offsite within the community and online to parents who may live in another town or interstate. We are a not-for-profit organisation and our centre is government funded, meaning our priority is reconnecting families and supporting healthy relationships. The Halve Waste people have a recycle situation using black soldier fly larvae fed by robots and then dried larvae can be fed to chooks and pigs. There is a recycle/reuse shop at Albury Waste Management Centre. There are tours of the facility, with presently a three month waiting period.

Lindsay Lowe thanked Sarah for her most informative chat and presented her with a Probus pen as a token of our appreciation.

We went on to lunch at the Bowls Club and much happy conversation.

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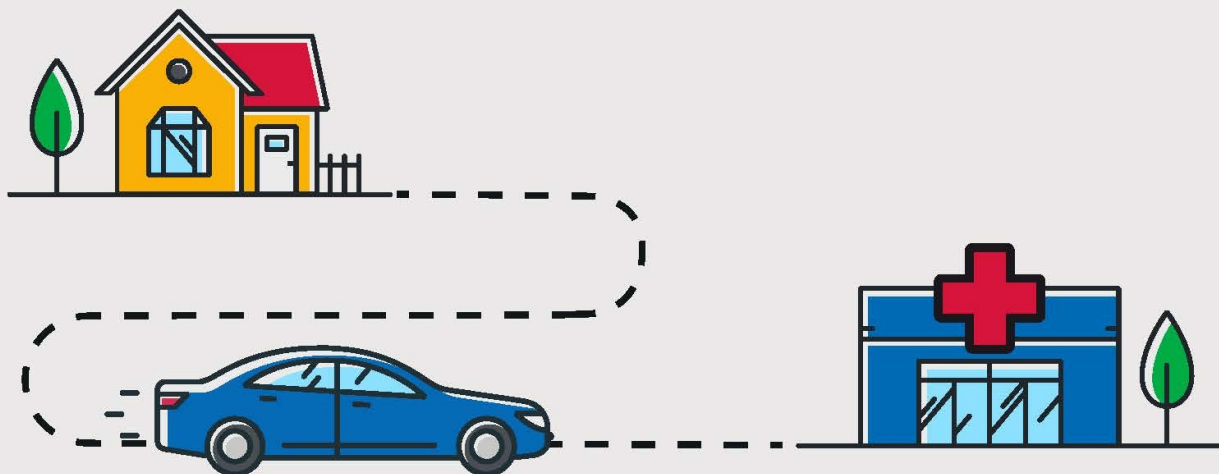

He Couldn't Make Dough, so I Made Bread Instead

Ysha & family's story continued...

The difficulty of course is how to continue with our story from where we left it? So many things have happened! I think we will leave all the negative stuff, the drama if you will, where it belongs, in the past. I won't go into the problems we had with the bank, the moving truck or anything like that.

In saying that...there is one catastrophe which fundamentally changed our lives.

One week after we had moved ourselves, and all our worldly possessions, more than 400km (248.5m), my husband's new employer calls to tell him he's now suddenly out of a job; 'don't come back Monday'. So here we were, my husband jobless, myself a stay at home Mumma, with a mortgage to pay, a growing baby to feed and clothe, plus my husband, I'm sure, eats more than an elephant and lion put together, and all we had in the world was a little over \$1,500. To quote the much loved bear Winne the Pooh, "Oh bother!"

Commence our headfirst plunge into frugal living! Step One: Cut out the majority of our pre-packaged food consumption. You know that thing everyone started doing during COVID? Baking? Well this ex-career woman, whose cakes generally looked more like crepe(s), decided to try and bake bread! Normal packet yeast loaves, right?! Nope. Sourdough. I know, I know, 'but everyone's doing that!' True, but, can everyone put bread dough in the oven and pull out a stone? That, my friends, is pure, unadulterated, talent.

Do not let my poor photography fool you, once you broke your teeth on biting through, the gravel



that remained really got the gastric juices flowing. To top this hardy loaf off, a short time later the sourdough starter went, well... Sourer? This simple concoction of flour, water, and time had started smelling like the stuff you use to remove nail polish. The one upside, I suppose, was when I took a whiff of the stuff I felt somewhat 'happier' for a little while...

I took the putrid nail polish removing starter (imagine you're watching a CSI episode or something of the like and they are checking the

cranial area for damage, they cut into the skull and... ok I'll stop now, but you get the general idea) and emptied it into the only good place for it, the bin. I felt an attempt at redemption was beckoning.

The next steps were simple:

- 150g plain bakers flour
- 150g filtered cool water
- Mix ingredients together

Leave partially covered for 24-48 hours in a warm place to start fermentation.

Tick, tick, tick and tick. I go back a day later, to see what I have...

I would like someone to explain how something



like this can happen in just over 24hours! Alas, I decided the sourdough life was not for me. Defeated, I went out and bought some packet yeast, and we've been eating home baked bread ever since.

I am sure I will brave sourdough redemption again one day, but, for now, I think I'll stick with my beginners' loaf:

- 750g of white bakers flour (or wholemeal)
- 10g of fine ground sea salt
- 15g of bread improver
- 15g dried instant yeast
- 590ml-600ml room temp filtered water
- 15ml olive oil

Combine all dry ingredients slowly with the water in a stand mixer using the bread hook attachment (or by hand if you have the time, inclination, and muscles). Continue to knead in the mixer for 5-10mins on a medium speed. Cover the mixing bowl and place in a warm part of the kitchen leaving it to prove for 30mins-3hrs (dependant on room temp) or until the dough has doubled in size. Knock air out of the dough, by hand or with the mixer, and shape it to fit in a well oiled and floured 1kg loaf tin. Allow the dough to double in size again and then put in a preheated oven at 220°C (430-°F). Bake for 25-30mins; generally, a loaf is done when you tap in the middle of the bottom and it sounds hollow.
