IN YOUR GARDEN

Winter is well upon us now, perhaps a little drier than previous years.

PLANT RESCUE: Don't rush to prune frost damaged material on large shrubs as it helps to protect new growth. Be patient. A plant may appear dead, but many woody ones happily reshoot further down the stem. Covering plants with vegie netting prevents further damage. Generous applications of liquid seaweed aid recovery but avoid heavy doses of fertiliser to stressed plants.

FROST TOLERANT PLANTS/TREES: Apple, Pear, Pomegranate, Persimmon, Fig, Walnut, Grapes and Blueberries.

VEGETABLES: Brussel Sprouts, Cauliflower, Cabbage, Rhubarb, Spinach, Leek, Rocket and Lettuce, Silverbeet, Turnip and Asparagus.

Bare rooted Roses should be in the ground now ready to grow and flower in the Spring.

In the language of flowers different coloured ROSES have different meanings. If you need a bunch today, here are some meanings.

RED rose—I love you

WHITE rose—I am telling the truth

YELLOW rose—I am your friend

ORANGE rose—You fascinate me.

PALE PINK rose—I am sorry

PRUNING KIT: Good quality Secateurs - Pruning saw/sharpening tool --Long handled Loppers.

Use a small spray bottle with Methylated Spirits to sterilise tools between Trees, Roses etc. Fine steel wool will clean off sap. Use sewing machine oil to keep tools moving. Clean and sharpen after use.

The last Sunday in JULY is NATIONAL TREE PLANTING DAY.

To plant out bulb in plastic pots, just cut out the bottom of the pot and plant in the ground. Next year you will have no trouble locating your bulbs in the garden.

DAPHNE bushes are now blooming, with a strong, delightful perfume. They grow best in a southerly or easterly aspect.

TULIPS start appearing in August There is a variety of amazing colours, even striped ones!

BOWRAL holds a Tulip festival later in the year, which is worth a visit.

CRAB APPLES: These small to medium trees have flowers from hot pink to soft pink to white IOWA crab apple (M.ioensis) and ELEYI (MXpurpurea) are two lovely but different varieties.

Still too cold for tomatoes, beans etc but put Tomato seeds in pots to plant out in October. Leave pumpkins, cucumbers zucchinis, a little while longer, till the frosts are over and the soil is warming up.





Taxes & Trenches: Digging our way out.

Ysha & families story continued...

Hi there, welcome back. I have never been one for recounting events in my life, so this is all very new to me. To tell the truth, I can't believe this was actually my idea to go ahead and give it a try! Okay, tangent over, back to our story...

I won't lie, the future was looking formidable for us. Hubby was only able to source a few odd jobs here and there, and, as a result, we'd had no steady income for a little over two months. Throughout this, there was a constant and terrifying decline in funds and resources to support our little family.

Friends, never in my life, did I think that I would bless July the 1st! Tax time. Who, in the history of taxation, ever sat down in anticipation of the experience to follow? No one, that's who! But, in the year 2021 I sat at the computer for hours, counted the pennies, calculated the deductibles, and revelled in the fact that we would get almost \$4,500 back. The little dance that ensued was both jolly and undignified; like a voguing giraffe.

Once the money came through, we did the only reasonable thing; spent every single penny. I stocked cupboards, paid bills, and bought enough timber to build some of our desired raised garden beds.

'But, raised beds are expensive! You should have just dug up the grass and put plants in that way!'



Yes, yes, I hear you and to be quite frank, I totally agree with you! However, when trying to do exactly that, we discovered our home is built, oh so conveniently, on the site of an old brick quarry and foundry. Digging this ground was like stepping on a stray piece of Lego; painful and infuriating. No matter which garden implement we used, breaking ground was breaking wrists, elbows, and backs. So, as soft bodied former city dwellers, we made an entirely 'rational' decision... and gave up. Hence the raised beds. This would require digging only small trenches for the sleepers to make sure they would end up level. Our bodies would thus remain intact, with plenty of opportunities to build muscle and callouses in the future.

Making the garden beds was a wonderfully uneventful

experience! That's a change for us isn't it. The most exciting thing that happened was my sons love of power tools was sparked. During the construction phase he managed to get hold of our power drills, work out how the trigger functioned and learnt the noise that they make all in a couple of hours.

It was a simple project. Each bed was built using 50mmx200mm (2inchesx7.9inches) treated pine sleepers; to the following specifications: 3.7m (12.1ft) long, 1.2m (3.9ft) wide and 0.2m (0.65ft) high. In

future we plan on adding two more tiers so that the overall height will be 600mm (23.6inches).

this point we realised. like the fledgling gardeners we were, and still are, things may have been done slightly backwards (comparable to peeling envelope before putting the letter in). You see, only after construction finished did we sow our seeds. Ideally, should have had

The other 30% either didn't germinate (which we are told is not uncommon) or died off from sunburn (our bad, we're learning, sunscreen next time). We have been harvesting things from the garden for the last few weeks now and it's been a delightful change to the poor substitutes available in the supermarkets. I can promise, if you haven't eaten home grown produce, you are missing out. Never have you experienced the sweetness, the crispness, the freshness, or the intensity of flavour in something picked 15 minutes before you eat it!

If you don't grow your own, try it my friends... I promise you won't regret it.


