#### **Culcairn History Column #1** ~Discovery of the Hume District~

Our little township in the southwest of the Riverina Region of NSW has quite an extensive and colourful history. The area is one of immense beauty, a fact certainly noted by the intrepid explorer Hamilton Hume; who, unlike most other explorers of the time, was Australian born.

In 1824 NSW Governor Thomas Brisbane determined to send an expedition from Sydney to Wilsons Promontory and was recommended to acquire the services of Hume. Hume, however, declined the commission, offering instead to undertake expedition from Lake George to the Bass Straits; unfortunately, the Governor rejected his counteroffer.

A short time later, Hume joined forces with sea captain



William Hovell forming their own expedition party. The group consisted of 8 members, namely: Hamilton Hume, William Hovell, Claude Bossawa, Henry Angel, James Fitzpatrick, William Bollard, Thomas Smith, and Thomas Bovd.

Cpt. William Hovell The venture was privately funded by

Hume and Hovell, with a token offering from Governor Brisbane consisting of 6 pack saddles and gear for the journey. Not much, but just enough to show that the Australian Government was in support of their

They commenced their journey on the 2<sup>nd</sup> of October 1824 from Humes home in Appin. On the 13<sup>th</sup> they arrived at the most distant out-station about 165 miles (265.5 kilometres) from Sydney. Departing on the 17<sup>th</sup> of October, they journeyed on, passing Yarrh (modern day Yass Plains) on the 19<sup>th</sup>.

The party's first struggle was that of crossing the Murrumbidgee River. The river at the time of crossing was in full flood. Unfortunately, the trees surrounding the river were too heavy to float on the water, so the decision was made by Hume to build a makeshift cable ferry out of their only cart and a tarpaulin. Thus, the perilous task of crossing the river to secure the line needed to be undertaken. The selected candidates were Hume himself, and Boyd as he was well known as a proficient swimmer. They made the crossing with a thin rope clenched between their teeth, which was attached to the heavier gauge rope to be strung across the river. Despite the strong current a successful crossing was made without loss.

On the 24th of October the party came upon what seemed an impassable mountain barrier. A discussion about which route to take led to a fight between Hume and Hovell, which was said to be commonplace. Unable to agree on how to proceed they temporarily parted company, each seeking their own way to navigate the obstacle.

Hume followed a chain of ponds and came to a chasm, which the whole party, Hovell and the others having rejoined, later descended. On the 31st of October they arrived at the western edge of the tablelands, proceeding down with great difficulty. Finally, on the 6<sup>th</sup> of November, they found themselves in full view of the Australian Alps. Soon after, an area of rich pastures lay before them (now known as the Greater Hume Region), teeming with native wildlife, and evidence of occupation by the local Wiradjuri People.

On Tuesday, 16<sup>th</sup> November, they arrived on the banks of a river, which Hume, being the first in the party to catch sight of it, named in honour of his father the 'Hume River' (now known as the Murray River).

Ten years post, Culcairn began being settled by Europeans in 1834 due to the favourable reports of good grazing land by Hume and Hovell on this expedition.

At the statutory meeting held Wednesday, 20 September 2023, Council voted to reelect Cr Tony Quinn as Mayor and Cr Annette Schilg as Deputy Mayor.

At the meeting the Returning Officer advised that nominations were received for Crs Parker and Quinn. They called for further nominations from the floor. No additional nominations were received at this time. The Returning Officer then conducted the election by a show of hands. Following the ballot the Returning Officer declared Cr Quinn duly elected as Mayor for the period September 2023 to September 2024.

The decision for the meeting venues was to alternate between Holbrook and Culcairn but to also identify two venues across Greater Hume to host Council meetings in the coming months.

#### IN YOUR GARDEN

Warmer, longer days are here and it is drying out a bit! It is Lilac time, beautiful mauves, whites and cream ,with a delicate perfume. Syringa Protolaciniata will tolerate more warmth than most species, so they are suited to warm climate temperatures.

Trails of Wisteria in blues, mauves, whites and pinks catch our eyes on garden trellises.

Roses in our region are waking up and we are treated to amazing colours and fragrances. Pruning off spent flowers will encourage more blooms. "Bonica" is a small pink rose that does well in a pot or hanging basket, "Red Illusion" is an unusual striped red rose and old Fragrant Plum" has a great scent.



This month should see some "Open Gardens" in our area ready for visitors. The Brocklesby flower Show and Open Gardens are worth a visit and not far from home.

There are always several gardens open in conjunction with the Lockhart Sculpture Festival, both town and country.

ABC radio 675am (Wagga) Gardening Talk Back, often has information on gardens that are open to the public. Tune in on Saturday mornings at 8:30 am.

Euphorbias and Sedums are great plants for a water wise garden. There are many varieties of both plants available.

Vegies - Hopefully October sees the end of frosts in our area. We can now plant out summer vegetable seedlings and seeds of beans, corn, and zucchini. Tomatoes (many varieties) go in now too. Remember to stake taller growing varieties now. For many years I have grown Cucumbers up on frames or screens. It makes them easy to fertilize, mulch and pick the produce. This method works for pumpkins too.

Passionfruit can have a light prune and feed now. I use liquid Sulphate of Potash to encourage flowering and fruiting on vegetables. Companion planting attracts beneficial insects, and as bees are under threat from Varoa mite we need to encourage other pollinators to our garden (moths, butterflies, wasps, flies and native bees).

Keep up with the weeding, mulch well and water lots. Enjoy your garden, Margaret Pumpa.




#### CULCAIRN GARDEN CLUB

Another Henty Machinery Field Days is done and dusted! Our Culcairn and Community effort in the big shed this year took a BIG effort from a lot of people from our community!




