WALLA BUSINESSES: LIESCHKE BUS LINES

Past: Lieschke Bus Lines Pty Ltd started on 1st July 2010 when we purchased 4 school buses and school bus run contracts from John and Sally Withers. Three bus runs consisted of going to Pleasant Hills, Culcairn and Jindera via the Table Top area. All would wind up back to Walla Walla Public School and St Paul's College with Billabong students being transferred to neighboring bus operators such as Lodges, Kane's etc. The fourth run went to Gerogery Public School.

On the 1st of May in 2019, Lieschke Bus Lines Pty Ltd purchased the Henty – Walla Walla bus and route contract from Robert and Sandra Lieschke. This bus run starts in Henty and goes to Walla Walla via Ryan and again meets neighboring bus companies to transfer students between Billabong High School and St Paul's College.

Present: On the 1st July 2020 we purchased 2 buses and contracts from AP Ofak Pty Ltd. These buses service Howlong, Burrumbuttock area as well as the Brocklesby Balldale area and have been repainted with the Lieschke Bus Lines colours and logo. This is in conjunction with the pre-existing Culcairn, Henty, Pleasant Hills and Jindera bus routes.

Lieschke Bus Lines also purchased Koorong Pty Ltd that goes from Holbrook 35km up the Jingellic Rd.

MAKE WALLA GLOW AGAIN

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Currently, Lieschke Bus Lines employs 14 casual drivers who are all Walla locals. They also include married couples such as Wilf and Elaine Krause as well as Jodie and Ross Hoffmann. John Mullavey is the most recent driver to be hired to drive the Burrumbuttock school bus.



In total, the business is accredited for running 8 buses traveling approximately 1,360km a day 5 days per week. The buses range from Mitsubishi and Volvo to Fuso and Hino of different sizes and seating capacities. These buses are only for school bus routes, not charter buses such as Martin's or Lodges buses that run charter trips to Melbourne, Canberra etc to the general public.

I have seen the change in going from no seat belts in any bus to eventually having all buses fitted by seat belts to comply with new road safety rules. So far, 6 buses have been fitted with seat belts, leaving two more to go to make the entire fleet safety compliant.

It's always interesting to hear the kids' conversations and what they talk about However, according to Elaine Krause, the driver on the Pleasant Hills bus route, the kids are picked up so early in the morning on that route that many seem to be still catching up on sleep on the way to school.

Future: As the student population grows at St Paul's College, Walla Public School and elsewhere, it may be necessary to purchase additional buses/contracts and hire more drivers to cope with demand.

QUIRKY WALLA & DISTRICT HAPPENINGS, PART 1, THE FIRST 50 YEARS.

October 1875. At the Albury Police Court. **Norman Beaton, an elderly Highlander, was charged with being in possession of a stolen pair of bagpipes belonging to John Macdonald, who was almost totally blind, at Walbundrie.** Both these men had been on the road from Melbourne travelling from town to town amusing the "lovers of the music of the Gael," living off the proceeds received. Beaton had a propensity to get drunk; this caused some differences between the two on numerous occasions. At Walbundrie, after promising to refrain from the drink, Beaton again gave way to further indulgence and, after repeated warnings from Macdonald, Beaton marched off **towards Walla Walla with the bagpipes.** Beaton was apprehended, together with the bagpipes, and brought into Albury Police Court where he stated he had no intention of leaving Macdonald alone at Walbundrie. The magistrate gave Beaton the benefit of the doubt and discharged him.

September 1890. **Railway construction crews on the proposed new railway line through Walla, were making their way to COROWA with their plant and families, only to be "disappointed and dismayed when they learnt that the construction was to start at CULCAIRN."**

April 1893. Following the annual Easter Sports Day at Walla, there was this Letter about "racy men's costumes" to the Editor of the Albury Banner. "Sir, - Having been to sports occasionally I always admire the nice racing costumes which are often worn at different sports by runners. **But it seems that some class of young men would just as soon run without any clothing on them at all, at least it is put on in such a way that respectable ladies have to turn their faces away from those running.** It happens not only in our otherwise respectable Walla Walla, but other places as well, and I consider that the committee should see that everyone is dressed in a way that will not cause any respectable lady to blush and turn away when amateurs are walking past them. - Yours, A FATHER OF A GROWN-UP FAMILY."

December 24th, 1895. The former Walla School Teacher & Postmaster, **Mr. Zilius who was 83 years old,** was presented with a **house and 4 gallons of wine** by Walla Walla residents on Christmas Eve.

January 1st, 1900. **Sports Day at Walla;** in addition to the foot races and horse events, there was a "**Beer Drinking Contest**" and a "**Catch the Pig**" competition among the events throughout the day. The Market Street recreation ground was situated on 10 acres west of Market Street, between Edward and William Streets.

August 1905. Albury Court. Local woman, **Auguste Lehmann was convicted of sly grog-selling at Brae Springs.** Police alleged that when they visited her place and disclosed their identity after buying some wine, **the woman offered them £100 to hush up the case.** She was fined £30, in default of six months imprisonment. The fine was paid.

August 1905. **Mr. Harry Schmidt was going through paddocks with his dogs when his dogs startled a full-grown fox.** When the pursuit got too much for the fox, it made a dash for Mr. H. E. Scholtz's kitchen, in through the open door, ending up on top of a large meat safe, where it was dealt with.

January 1907. From the Jindera correspondent: **To-day our little town [Jindera] is quite deserted -- all off to the Walla sports. Jindera has given up sports, and, quite right, sticks closer to religion.**" Walla too, had the divide between religion and sports, but in most cases, there was a consensus between the two where they could at least both co-habit in the same town!

April 1907. Walla Walla Oddfellows (I.O.O.F.) **Lodge held their first "Sports and Ball"** (sports & games then a dance in the evening). The usual sports and games were played, the day was sponsored by the Walla Hotel and the Albury Brewing Co. to the tune of £6 1s, as well as others who contributed on the day. **One notable diversion on the day was the appearance of "Mr. E. Lewwellyn and a band of boys dressed in fancy costume and blackened to represent the "Darktown Fire Brigade.""** They had all appliances for extinguishing fires with a reel and hose, and a prehistoric fire engine, "accompanied by much water, yelling and confusion." After standing for photos, they proceeded to the centre of the Market Street Recreation Ground where a "**large heap of dry bushes was ignited and speedily quenched by this fire brigade.**" Very "not-PC" these days!

October 1910. There were **now 6 families using the name "Smith" living in Walla, the most common surname in and around the town of Walla Walla at this time!**

1912. Teacher **Walter Baker was in charge of the Alma Park School,** he did not seem to be renowned for his teaching abilities. When he went away for a weekend, he did not arrive at school on time on Mondays. When he did arrive, all the students had already gone back home!

February 1912. **A daring and partially successful attempt to derail a stock train east of Walla. Stephen O'Brien, was arrested near the Billabong Creek.** Police ascertained that the accused laid the fishplates (rail joining plates) on the line in order to stop the train so he could get a ride. **It seems the accused was expecting a passenger train, not a stock train!** The subsequent inquiry mentions that if the number of fishplates laid on the line were hit by the lighter passenger railmotor, it most likely would have been derailed, causing much more of a concern. In this case, with a heavier locomotive on the stock train, only one bogey left the rails.

April 1912. At Walla, "Quite a sensation was caused on Sunday when a **pair of ponies bolted down the main street** with part of a vehicle. ... Nobody got hurt in the smash, which happened through one of the ponies starting to kick and breaking the buggy to pieces." **Mr. Mickan** was later reunited with his ponies and the remnants of his buggy!

October 1912. The annual **Walla Walla Sports Carnival** was held on the Market St Recreation Ground. Apart from the usual athletic, bicycle and horse events, other events/games included throwing at the wicket, kicking the football, serious face competition, guessing the weight of a sheep, (95lb, dead heat between Mr. R. Schultz and Mr A. Pertzelt,) penny cleaning competition, wheel barrow race, **and of course, sewing on a button for men!**

1915. All **Back Yard Dummies,** were described in Council Papers as "**Closet Accommodation**". Those residents who did not have the required "Closet Accommodation" were threatened with prosecution. This was in preparation for setting up Walla's night cart waste collection service. All Shire town residents were required to install the required "accommodation", either building their own to a generic design or buying locally made prefabricated kits and assembling them; the Shire then supplied the galvanised collection cans. This system lasted until the 1960's.

WEEDS AT WALLA WALLA

Bindiis have arrived.

Action 1: Look for bindiis.

Action 2: Destroy them.

Another nasty one just now is **hairy panic**. It is a pretty plant when small with long thin leaves going pretty well straight up.

It likes to grow in places where nothing else grows. There would be thousands of plants in our town. They are on every street, every lane, every gutter, every footpath. Keeping them from seeding is a good plan, but difficult. We can but try.

Also starting now is **paspalum**. It has long thin leaves that stay near the ground. It grows happily in lawns and with other plants. Digging it out with a long thin hoe works well,

Still growing in the town are **marsh-mellow, cape weed, sticky weed, thistles, khaki weed, patta**, and more.

This is the time of the year when most weeds desperately try to produce seeds. Our aim is to stop seeding. In a month from now, most die off from old age, but bindii and a few others keep going through the great heat of Summer, if we let them.

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


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


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THE AUSSIE BACKYARD BIRD COUNT 2020

What is it? This year, National Bird Week was from October 19 to October 25. This coincided with the Aussie Backyard Bird Count which is an annual event co-ordinated by Birdlife Australia. Birdlife Australia is the country's largest bird conservation charity and aims to preserve Australia's unique native birds and their habitat. This year was the seventh year and it has become the largest citizen science project in Australia. The aim is to enlist the help of observers all over Australia to count birds and report sightings throughout this week. Despite the name, observers are not confined to backyards or indeed their own postcode area. There are many varied habitats across Australia with their own populations of birds that need to be counted. Birds have been counted on the mainland as well as outlying Australian territories such as the Australian Antarctic Territory and islands such as Christmas Island, Norfolk Island, Cocos (Keeling) islands, Heard and McDonald Islands (subantarctic), Ashmore and Cartier Islands south of Indonesia and the Coral Sea islands in the Great Barrier Reef area.

All week, bird watchers everywhere have been setting out at all hours of the day/night to find birds and do their bit for science. They ranged from excited novices with nothing more than their eyes and ears to dedicated bird nerds weighed down with binoculars, cameras, sunscreen, water bottles, insect repellent, folding chairs, multiple changes of clothes for all weather conditions, snacks and waders. All over the country this week, bird watchers have set out on a mission. They have sloshed through swamps, endured Antarctic blizzards, climbed up rocks, trekked up mountains, hacked their way through tropical mozzie-infested rainforests, hid in prickly bushes, float-

ed in tinnies on lakes, dodged swooping birds, tried not to step on millions of migrating red crabs (on Christmas Island), paddled down rivers, braved the wind on city skyscraper rooftop gardens, stumbled through sand dunes, stalked through knee high grass and craned necks towards tall tree tops to find and identify birds to be counted. October is the chosen month as many birds breed in spring and food is plentiful.

Why do the bird count? The annual bird count is a census for birds and gives an idea of biodiversity and distribution ranges of different bird species. Observers are asked to help out and report sightings over this 1 week period. These sightings are collated and compared to other data such as from the Bureau of Meteorology and statistically analysed. The results give the researchers an idea of bird biodiversity and how the population density and distribution ranges of bird species change as a function of natural events and human factors.

These events include drought, cyclones, heat waves, floods, bush fires, disease outbreaks, habitat clearing and revegetation programs. The count of 2020 was critical after the catastrophic bushfires last summer and the end of years of drought. Last year, more White Ibises were seen near the coast due to the drought inland which attracted more crimson chats. In 2017, there was a decline in Laughing Kookaburras across Southeast Australia.



Who can do it? Anyone can register for free with Birdlife Australia to be a bird spotter for this week. Registration is free and easy to do. More than 1000 schools have registered. The user-



friendly Birdlife app has the checklists you need plus a digital bird identification guide and aids to try and identify the birds you encounter. Some people count birds while sitting on their

verandah. But you can multi-task and count birds while walking the dog, gardening, exercising, mustering stock, checking fences, playing golf, fishing and so on. Bird watching can be done alone or in company and is strangely addictive! You can be a passive observer or actively seek out birds.

What to do? Each bird recording session lasts for 20 minutes after which time you submit your checklist. To start, enter your postcode or let the app track you by satellite and select which habitat you will find birds in. Then the timer starts and you add birds. You can do as many counting sessions as you want. It helps to not have cats lurking in the bushes nearby sharpening their claws and licking their chops in anticipation!

Which birds to count? All wild bird species can be reported. This includes all native species but also ferals such as Indian Mynah, House Sparrow, Eurasian Skylark and Blackbird among others. Ferals are included so if there is a population explosion of these birds to the detriment of native birds, eradication measures may be needed. Likewise, new laws may be drafted to protect native habitat for birds identified as being at risk of being vulnerable or worse based on this annual bird census.

Migratory species are also included as they breed and feed in Australia for a short time. Most migrating birds will have made it back to Australia by October. Data is shared with international bird conservation agencies. Shearwa-



ters (a.k.a. Muttonbirds) arrived in Australia later than usual in 2019 and in much reduced numbers. This year, there have been few or none reported at usual breeding sites along the Victorian/Tasmanian coast. However, a mass die-off has been reported along the Alaskan coast. These birds have died from starvation due to lack of krill in the Arctic waters and started their migration underweight.

Where to count? Birds can be counted in any location such as your own backyard, neighbouring properties which may attract different birds based on the trees and plants growing there, local parks, farm paddocks, road verges etc. But if you want to go away and

count more exotic species of birds on tidal mudflats, Mallee scrubland or rainforests elsewhere, just change the postcode on your app or select satellite location tracking, choose the right habitat and get counting.



How to identify? Birds can be identified by their plumage, calls, behaviour, social structure, wingbeat sound and silhouette. But, there can be differences between the sexes, between adults and juveniles and between related species.

When to count? It's recommended that counts are done at different times during the day and in the dusk/darkness to get different species of birds counted. You may even spot a Barn Owl, Tawny Frogmouth or Nightjar to add to your tally.



Results so far: See Table 1 for statistics of the last 4 years. The Rainbow Lorikeet has been the most sighted bird overall each year due to more people planting nectar producing trees for

them.

Aussie Backyard Bird Count 2021: In the Walla Walla/Alma park postcode region, 949 birds of 38 species were counted in 2020. To get ready for next year's Aussie Backyard Bird Count during 18-24 October, improve your bird watching and identification skills and sign up to be a registered bird counter in October 2021. It really is a worthwhile thing to do with prizes on offer! So, come on Walla Walla, do your bit for bird conservation next year. Just get out there and count birds. For more information, see www.birdlife.org.au and www.aussiebirdcount.org.au.

There are similar citizen science projects Australia-wide to count frogs (Nov) and pollinating insects (April and Nov) each year.


