WALLA WALLA BUSINESSES: THE OLD WALLA WALLA BAKE HAUS

Past: The original building was used as a bakery from June 1903 until 1973 by Mr William Bowcher. In June 1908, William Bowcher was granted ownership of the bakery block at 55 Commercial Street with permission to build a baking premises by the local council. However, in October 1909, the bakery and adjoining residence were destroyed by fire while Mr Bowcher and family were asleep.

When William awoke to his alarm to get up for work at the bakery, he noticed that the room where his wife and children were sleeping was well alight with all contents destroyed. The contents were uninsured and the building was insured for only a small amount. The community came together with a subscription list for fundraising which raised enough money to start again.

January 1910, William Bowcher commenced with rebuilding the bakery. By July 1910, Walla Walla had 3 bakers and 2 butchers. Increased demand for freshly baked bread meant that the original oven was no longer sufficient. William built a new furnace oven that was functioning in August 1910 with the great achievement of baking 350 loaves of bread in one batch.

In October 1910, William sold his bakery to a Mr D.A. Smith who subsequently sold the bakery, adjoining house with 4 rooms and shop in March 1919 to Otto Schulz who paid £650. The bakery was managed by Edward (Ted) Hay who built a house for himself across the street. Ted Hay bought the bakery from Otto Schulz in May 1931.

The bakery changed hands a few more times: Papworth's Culcairn Bakery owned it from May 1946 until 1953 when it was sold to Dick and Dot Schirmer (below right). They, in turn, handed the bakery over to their son John and his wife Terry in 1973.

In 2019 Mr Peter Graves bought the building which was in desperate need of repair. He spent 18 months restoring the building back to its original glory including adding a small coffee area. His vision has added another great business to Walla Walla. The original oven is still in place but it cannot be used as we are missing the key stone.

Present: The Schirmer Family has lent us a number of items from when the shop was run as a bakery. These items are in the old bakery area and are available for viewing when we are open. (Thursday - Sunday 9am-3pm).

Virginia Scholz started an eclectic old wares shop 2 years ago to encourage people to the town. She has been very successful in promoting the area and her shop. People travel from far and wide for a look around her shop and to come and enjoy a lovely Devonshire Tea at the adjoining Old Walla Bake Haus.

On the 5th November 2020, I started the "Old Walla Bake Haus and Tea Rooms. It has been an amazing year. I have always wanted to run a coffee shop and English Tea Room. It was a dream of my late mother and it is great to bring it to fruition. We make everything ourselves on the premises.


We would appreciate you sharing your ideas and suggestions for making Walla Walla a better place to live and visit with us at the Open Community meeting.

I like to promote home grown and country fare. People told me I was nuts to start a business in the middle of a pandemic. It has given us some challenges, but we are still here and will continue to grow.

NATIVE POLLINATORS IN WALLA WALLA

November 13-21 is International Pollinator Week 2021, which includes lots of events worldwide such as planting pollinatorfriendly verges, seminars, mapping sightings and more. Imported honeybees pollinate the majority of commercial crops and make honey that is collected for human consumption. Native Australian bees are important in pollinating not only ornamental garden plants such as roses but also some food crops including fruits and vegetables. Stingless bees pollinate macadamias while blue-banded bees are used to pollinate greenhouse tomatoes. Native bees use a method called Buzz Pollination whereby they grasp a flower and vibrate them with their flight muscles which causes pollen to shoot out of their capsules. Commercial honeybees cannot do buzz pollination which makes native bees ideal pollinators for flowers needing this kind of stimulation such as eggplants, kiwi fruit, chilli peppers, tomatoes, cranberries and blueberries.

Native bees do not make much honey and need this for feeding themselves through the winter. Stingless bees make honey that is more tangy than the honey produced by commercial honeybees.



There are over 1,700 species of Australian native bees of which only 11 species are stingless. There are ten major groups of native bee species which are all found in NSW but stingless bees and carpenter bees (yellow & black and green) are subtropical and live in northern NSW/Queensland.

In our area, we are more likely to find reed bees, blue-banded bees (top left), teddy bear bees (top middle), leaf-cutter bees, resin bees, masked bees and homalictus bees. Hoverflies (top right) are also pollinator insects found in Walla Walla.

The green legless grubs (larvae) feed on aphids, a pest insect which destroys many species of plants including trees, while the adults pollinate flowers which produce nectar. Unfortunately, hoverfly larvae are often mistaken for diamondback moth caterpillars, another pest species.



To encourage native bees to pollinate your flowers and crops, plant bee-friendly native flowering plants near your vegetables and fruit trees, provide shallow bowls of water for bees to drink from (insects get thirsty, too) or put up shelters such as 'bee hotels'. Beneficial insects such as ladybug beetles are preferable to kill aphids and other pests instead of insecticides which kill bees also. Alternatively spray with a less potent solution and/or spray when plants are not flowering or when the bees are inactive.

Pollinator Week not only celebrates the contribution bees (native and commercial)

make to our ecosystems but other important pollinator animals as well. These include bats (long-distance pollinators), possums, butterflies, birds and beetles. Bats such as grey-headed and black headed flying foxes are an important pollinator animal for melaleuca and eucalyptus forests while possums are partial to banksia and eucalyptus pollen and nectar. Honeyeaters, lorikeets and wattle birds pollinate eucalyptus trees, grevillea, callistemon and kangaroo paw among others. Pollinators in the Walla Walla area include Red wattlebird, Little wattlebird, brush-tailed and ringtail possum, squirrel glider, blue-faced honeyeater

and grey-headed flying fox among many others.

To protect your fruit crops after pollination, cover trees with netting with gaps of at least 5 mm so that possums, bats and birds don't get caught and injured. Putting up artificial nest boxes allows different species of birds and possums/gliders to breed when natural hollows are lacking.

WEEDS AT WALLA WALLA

It was very good to see that the Border Mail has joined the good people at Walla Walla by **declaring war on bindiis** with a full page article, including three photos, on Saturday November 6th. The journalist, Kate Cunnow, claimed a single plant can have 8,000 seeds in one season. (She must have taken a day off to count them!). She listed the harmful effects bindiis can have on farming land and on farming animals. Her well written article contained information which would get everyone and his maiden aunt motivated to attack this awful botanical enemy!!

I have a self sown single **bindii plant** growing near our shed. Its birth date was Wednesday November 3rd. It will be allowed to grow under strict supervision. Its whole life is for educational purposes. The plan is to take photos once a week, and put them in this Newsletter. See above right for the first one. It may be one of the last bindii plants in our town, because of our hugely successful campaign. Its life will be well documented, and hopefully of some interest to our readers.

Weeds that are now on the move are **fleabane** (grows straight up, has grey floppy leaves, there are thousands), **hairy panic** (has pointy leaves, many thousands) and **paspalum** (has long, strong, narrow pointed leaves, stays close to the ground, hundreds).



It is worth the effort to get rid of paspalum, because of those awful seed pods on the end of long stems that stick to clothes. It can be chipped out with a strong hoe, or sprayed. I've been successful in eliminating paspalum in some areas in the town.

Ms Marsh had flowers and now has many seeds. She is now 2.22 m high, and slowing down because of old age. If marshmallow plants growing tall is important, it is indeed an admirable achievement.

Her comment the other day,"I've given it my best shot this year. That Council guy with a squirt gun went past yesterday, but was looking the other way. That was a close call!" Ms Marsh could add a few more cm to her height in the next few weeks. More about her next time.

COUNCIL NEWS

Council met on 10 November, business dealt with at the meeting included:

- Council's external auditor Mr Brad Bohun from Crowe, attended to report on the conduct of the 2020/2021 audit and the financial result for the year ending 30 June 2021.
- Council agreed to offer a contribution of \$88,270 (exc. GST) to the developer of the approved 43 Lot subdivision at Yankee Crossing Road Henty to locate the sewerage pumping station on Yankee Crossing Road rather than in the lane adjacent to the Olympic Highway.
- Council agreed to delegate the civic and ceremonial functions of the position of Mayor to the incumbent Mayor (Cr Wilton) from 4 December 2021 until a Mayor is elected in the week commencing 10 January 2022.
- Council will call for Expressions of Interest from Real Estate Agents to appoint an Agent to market Lot 2 DP 610499 at Holbrook (known as Camden Forest).
- Council confirmed ongoing membership of Riverina Regional Library for the term 1 July 2022 to 30 June 2025. Council will give notice of withdrawal from the Riverina Regional Library Mobile Library Service effective 30 June 2024. Various models of operation are being explored to continue to provide library services post 30 June 2025.
- Council noted the introduction of the new rate peg methodology effective 1 July 2022 from the Office of Local Government.
- The Lease Agreement with John Holland Transport Asset Holding Entity for the Walla Walla Rural Fire Station will be renewed.
- Council approved the extension of the NSW Grain Harvest Management Scheme for the next 12 months to 30 September 2022.
- Subject to valuation, Council approved the purchase of 95-99 Albury Street, Holbrook.

Council are currently reviewing the Council Community Strategic Plan. There are a number of opportunities for the community to contribute to the development of the plan.

FIRST AID - BURNS

Burns are injuries to the skin and underlying tissues caused by heat, extreme cold, chemicals, electricity, friction (rope burns), and radiation such as the sun, microwaves and therapeutic radiotherapy. Scalds are burns caused by hot liquid and steam. Children under 5 are more at risk due to their smaller fluid resolve and the elderly due to associated illnesses.

The severity of a burn depends on surface area damage, the body parts burnt, the depth of the burn, the age and physical condition of the patient, and any associated injuries.

Superficial burns affect only the top layer (epidermis) of the skin. A common example is sunburn. If severe, some fluid may leak into the epidermis causing swelling and blistering.

Superficial partial thickness burns occur when the upper layers of the dermis are injured resulting in leakage of fluid into the tissues. These burns are commonly caused by brief exposure to flame or spill scalds of 50-70oC. The area is red, very painful and blistered with copious tissue fluids.

Deep partial thickness burns involve the epidermis and much of the dermis. They are caused by scalds of longer duration or temperature of more than 70oC, or exposure to flame. The area is mottled red and white, dark red or pale yellow, painful, blistered with a moist surface if the blister is broken.

Full thickness burns involve the epidermis the entire dermis and may include deeper structures of fat, muscle and tendons. They may be caused by flame, contact with hot metal, immersion scalds, strong chemicals or electricity. The area is white or charred and feels dry and leathery. Because the nerves are destroyed, the pain will not be as great but there will be pain in the less burned margins.

Critical Burns

- Burns that interfere with breathing
- Burns where there is serious soft tissue injury or fracture
- Burns to the face, feet, genitals, neck, knees or elbows
- All electrical burns, especially high voltage
- Most chemical burns
- Burns to young children and the elderly
- Burns to people with serious medical conditions, such as diabetes, seizure disorders, hypertension and respiratory difficulties

Management of Burns


- 1. Remove the patient from danger
- Follow DRSABCD
- · If clothing is on fire

STOP, DROP AND ROLL

- Pull the patient to the ground
- · Wrap in a blanket or similar
- Roll the patient along the ground until the flames are extinguished
- 2. Cool the burnt area under cold running water for 20 minutes for
- Thermal burns, scalds, chemical, electrical and bitumen burns
- If the burn is to the eye, flush the eye with water for 20 minutes
- 3. Remove any constrictions
- Remove clothing and jewellery from the burnt area (unless it is sticking to the burn)
- 4. Cover the burn with either a non-stick burns dressing, plastic wrap or loosely applied aluminium foil over the burn
- 5. Calm the patient

6. Call triple zero (000) for an ambulance if:

The burn involves an airway



- The burn is deep, even if the patient does not feel any pain
- You are unsure of the severity of the burn

WARNING

DO NOT apply lotions, ointment or fat to the burn.

DO NOT touch the injured area or burst any blisters.

DO NOT remove anything sticking to the burn If the burn is large or deep, manage the patient for shock.

WALLA WALLA TIMELINE - ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO - 1922

- JANUARY -

A weekly fresh fish supply to Walla Railway Station was proving very popular. This was a government initiative; fish were sourced from Government trawlers and railed in refrigerated wagons to numerous locations around the state of NSW. At first, two crates of fish were sent weekly to Walla. These sold very fast, so four crates were then sent weekly, also proving very popular. It was even jokingly said that when local fishermen went away on fishing trips, that they should buy some of these fresh fish beforehand, to be sure of having a feed when they got back home!

Walla's Gum Swamp was again very full, all was well for the duck season to open on February 1st.

Mumps and whooping cough had been prevalent in the district for some time and the effects seemed to be waning, it was said that hardly a house in Walla Walla was not affected by these illnesses.

Due to the activity of the local Police officer, the issue of straying stock in Walla had almost ceased. And "owners of gardens can now live in peace."

- APRIL -

One of the worst dust storms experienced in the region came through on the 4th, rain did quell the dust storm, but it was patchy.

ANZAC Day was celebrated by the opening of the Soldiers Memorial Hall in the morning, and the holding of a United Service in the School of Arts (Literary Institute) in the evening. The unveiling of the "Lest We Forget 1914 – 1918" stone was also on the program. This new building, which is made of red brick, has an ornamental front of coloured cement, upon which is inscribed "Soldiers' Memorial, 1914 – 1918." Cost of the building, £900. It was used for the first time on the 8th of June for a Golf Club Dance.

Mr. and Mrs. H. G. Wenke purchased Mr. Dechart and Tummell's Store in Walla. They had been running the store for some months before that.

The Walla and District Football Association became the Hume Football Association. Participating clubs were Burrumbuttock, Bulgandry, Brocklesby, Gerogery, Walbundrie, Walla Walla and Walla Subdivision. "Mr. P. Mulray donated £5/5/0 trophy to the most popular player in premier team." And "Mrs. W. Habermann donated a cup to be won three times." Jindera had been part of the association but dropped out prior to the 1922 season. The Walla Subdivision "Ramblers" joined in their place, still necessitating a bye.

- MAY -

By means of a fair, the farmers at Walla Subdivision, raised over £100, which cleared their hall and piano from debt, and enabled two extra rooms to be built. By October 1923 the new rooms had been added. The Hall was built in 1914 and closed in 1984, then it was demolished

The driver of a ginger beer wagon had just released the brake from the wheels, and was about to alight the wagon, when the horses lunged forward, throwing the driver off, and finishing up amongst trees just beyond the Lutheran Church. The driver was apparently OK, many jars of the ginger beer were distributed over Commercial Street.

Christiane Hennersdorf (Weiss) died at Walla. Wife of Peter (dec 1883). Both took part in The Trek. Peter and Christiane owned two 40-acre farming blocks just south of the Pioneer Cairn, adjoining Michael Wenke's original selection, "Sunnyside". They had no children, but adopted a child, Anna Mücke, whose mother had died, and whose wealthy father chose not to look after her. The families were mutual friends. Christiane is buried in Walla cemetery, Luth. Row F, Plot 11.

Around this time, a shortage of accommodation for workmen at Walla was evident. It was suggested at a Progress Committee Meeting in June, that following Mrs Hennersdorf's passing, and as she had left no direct descendants, that her small farm be made available to sub-divide for small working men's blocks. No action was taken.

Mr. C. A. Jacob, of Walla, "had the honour of topping the market with his merino clip at Albury wool sales on Thursday last, when he realised the handsome price of 27 1/2, d (27c) per lb. for the A fleece."

- JULY -

(July 18th) William Carter disposed of the freehold of the Walla Hotel and the 8 remaining acres of the hotel paddock behind Market Street houses, to Henry Mellor, formerly from Yerong Creek

The Culcairn Shire was gravelling the footpaths in Walla township, "a matter very much in want of attention." Up until this time there had been no designated footpaths. This may have been OK for most of the year, but in the wet when it was boggy, people had to walk on the roadway.

Work had now begun on the excavation of the footings for the Walla silo complex grading bins, the bundle of 6 silos at the western end of the complex. A gang of 60 men were soon to arrive to complete the building of these bins.

"Walla Walla footballers were compelled by the home team to journey to the Subdivision on Saturday last in pouring rain to fulfil their engagement with that team. Efforts were made to have the game postponed, but there was not enough sportsmanship to bring about that result." The ground was under water and pouring rain fell throughout the game, the game resembled water polo, and the order of the day was to kick the ball off the ground, the player often landing "splash" on his back on the ground. Albury Banner. Walla played with only 16 men and won by 9 points.

The Brae Springs hills were covered in a thick coat of snow which lasted for some hours. Walla also had a dusting, but it melted very quickly.

- AUGUST -

The School of Arts, or Town Hall, was being left in an unclean condition, one time being "littered with boxes, paper and all sorts of rubbish." It was suggested that the committee bring a deposit system, which would be forfeited under such circumstances. This was soon enacted. Police were also asked to help prevent people loitering in the hall passageway at dances.

From Culcairn Council: "It was decided to write to the Superintendent of Police, asking that action be taken to prevent straying stock in Walla Walla; and the furious driving of motor cars in Walla Walla......A speed limit of 15 miles per hour was fixed. The matter of motor cars and vehicles pulling up on the proper side of the streets is also to be brought under the superintendent's notice."

- SEPTEMBER -

An interesting month for the Hume Football league, especially for the Walla Walla Football club. At the end of the home and away games, Bulgandry were the minor premiers. When it came to the Grand Final, Walla beat Bulgandry, at Walbundrie, Walla 5 goals 13 behinds to Bulgandry 5 goals 8 behinds. Utilizing an optional rule of the time, Bulgandry, being the minor premiers, challenged Walla to a replay, this took place at Walla the following week. This time Bulgandry won, 8 goals 12 behinds, to Walla 6 goals 4 behinds, thus taking out the premiership. As an aside, after the first grand final match at Walbundrie, a Burrumbuttock man, Mr. Jack Zweck was allegedly assaulted by a Walla person and needed medical attention. Over following days when Walla residents went to Burrumbuttock on business and family visits. they were pelted with eggs, making quite a mess of their clothes and vehicles!

Commercial Street was finally being formed properly, and being sheeted with blue metal, from the Lutheran Church southward to the Gerogery Road.

(September 23rd) Football; Walla Walla played the Walla Sub "Ramblers" at Walla in aid of the Parents and Citizens Association. The game was poorly attended and only £2 was taken at the gate. Walla Walla won by 5 points.

The Walla Walla Tennis Club was formed, their home courts were to be built at the new Sports Ground.

- OCTOBER -

New Tennis Courts at the Walla Sports Ground were nearly ready for use. The opening of the courts took place on the 21st.

Also at the Sports Ground, a new cricket practice wicket was built, enclosed by wire netting, enabling 2 or 3 players to practise at once. (The cricket nets.)

Karl Simpfendorfer, from Triangle Farm on Walla Subdivision, met with a serious accident. He was cultivating with 6 horses, he then stopped for dinner, (lunch) and while unyoking the 3 rear horses, all the horses then took fright and bolted, dragging Mr. Simpfendorfer along with the cultivator. Mrs. Simpfendorfer witnessed the accident and went to help. Her husband had to be dug out from under the cultivator. Karl made a slow but full recovery.

- DECEMBER -

The new telephone service was now up and running. However, getting the local farmers to subscribe to this service was proving difficult, so an effort was made try to get them to take it up, twenty-five to thirty new subscribers would have made this possible.

December. Mr. O. Scholz sold his garage on Commercial Street. Mr. D. (David) Lieschke from Alma Park was to take possession on 1st January 1923.


