SQUIRREL GLIDERS SEARCH AT WALLA WALLA GUM SWAMP

On 26th April over 70 local Walla residents and friends huddled together to search for Squirrel Glider's (a threatened species) at Walla Walla Gum Swamp. The Walla Walla Gum Swamp committee hosted a BBQ dinner then local ecologist, Damian Michael talked us through the techniques of stag watching.

A stag is a word used to describe big old trees – alive or dead that are standing and host many hollows. Squirrel gliders emerge from tree hollows right on sunset when all you can really see are the silhouettes of the trees. The gliders move very quickly to the



top of the host tree and then launch themselves off and glide to other trees to head out and forage (mostly for insects, spiders and possible lerp on the leaves of the eucalypts).

Damian settled family and friends close to pre-selected suitable trees 20 minutes before sunset. This allows for eyes to adjust to the fading light and ears to adjust to the twilight sounds. We didn't spot any squirrel gliders this time, but all reported large numbers of the small insectivorous bats which is positive. After regrouping Damian led a spotlighting walk. At least 6 ringtail possums and several brushtail possums were seen. Unfortunately, the spotlighting team also spotted a cat. This highlighted an important point about keeping our domestic cats in at night and managing feral cat populations.

Despite not seeing any squirrel gliders this time, locals have reported them in the area. Areas like Walla Walla Gum Swamp are very important due the large number of trees with hollows, which are critical for squirrel gliders.

HISTORY OF WALLA WALLA - HORSE RACING AT WALLA WALLA (PART 1 OF 3)

On June 21st, 1919 the first event was held under the name of Walla Walla Amateur Picnic Racing Club. So, we could say that we are recognising a centenary of sorts.

Racing at Walla has gone through three distinct incarnations, **1896 to 1906, The Walla Walla Racing Club; 1919 to 1928, The Walla Walla Amateur Picnic Racing Club; 1933 & 1935, The Walla Walla St Patricks Racing Club**, (events were held on St. Patricks Day.)

Early Years.

Racing horses was part of the Walla district from back in the days of the squatters, with informal challenge or scratch races between individuals, station staff and settlers alike, to see who had the better horse, or just a short sprint of "drag" usually emanating as a bit of fun, there is even mention of a competitive gallop home from church. **In February 1889, we find the first mention of an organised event.** "...excitement during two Saturdays, several of our local young men going in for horse racing; but on both occasions the favourite was beaten, and it is said considerable sums of money were lost on the favourite." *Albury Banner, 8th February 1889, p17. Walla Correspondent.*

The First Events. 1896 to 1906.

The first Walla Racing Club races under the direction of a committee organised in 1896 were held annually during this time on Easter Monday, with the exception of 1905 when the horse races were substituted with sports/athletics day for people. (Running, jumping, team/individual games and bike riding events, more on these days in a later issue).

These early racing days were held in at least two different locations; at the Gum Swamp reserve, and in a "paddock behind the Hotel." The Gum Swamp was some distance away and effort was needed to organise these annual days. The hotel had to organise food, and a booth licence, the track had to be marked out and, being a reserve, there were plenty of trees and logs as obstacles. The paddock behind the Hotel, as described by a Correspondent in 1899 was "in a stubble paddock, which the rain had made fetlock deep." **The course was rated as very, very heavy**, but there is no indication of exactly where the course was. **On this occasion and other race days at the Hotel, the athletic and games events were held on the Main Street, in front of the Hotel.** In 1899 it was estimated that around 500 people were present, other years were given as good attendances both from locals and non-locals. Horses came from local farms, Albury, Walbundrie, Corowa, Jindera and other localities in the district. Often the last event finished in the dark and the meeting included false starts, shortened races and even a full race rerun! I'm not sure what the serious punters and bookies made of that.

Decisions of the stewards to be final in all cases.

All these race days included some athletics/games for the public, interspersed between the main horse events. Regular races on each occasion were: Trial Stakes, Walla Walla Handicap, Pony Race, Hack Race, Flying Handicap and Consolation Stakes. On one occasion there was even a jumps race on the program, on another there was a Handicap Trot. After 1899, a dance was held in the evening in the new brick hall built by the hotel owner, Mr. Winkleman, across the road, where Wiesner's office and workshop are now. Seemingly on a high, the 1906 event was the last race meeting for another 13 years.

In 1901, in the Walla Handicap, after running about a half a mile, Charcoal ran off into a wire fence and broke his neck, the jockey suffered a severely broken arm and was conveyed to Albury, Bo Peep won the Pony Race, and the Hack Race was as usual, a full field.

Hack races were for horses with little or no potential, your average farm horse, and at least for the 1919 to 1924 racing period, it was stipulated that contestants for the hack race had to be from within 20 miles of Walla Walla. These Hack events always ran a full field due to plenty of contestants, also the jockey weight was not a real concern, as farmers themselves or someone else who suited, often sometimes saddled up! So this was a fun event.

WEEDS AT WALLA WALLA

We can forget about Bindii and Khaki Weed weed for about six months, because the frosts have started. The Walla folk have done well with the eradication project of these two.

However, there is still work to be done, tackling the Winter weeds, which are not nearly as bad, but are a nuisance. We need to get out our hoes and chip cape weed (also called dandelion) marshmallow, stinging nettles, (to see if you have found them, put the back of your hand on the leaves, and see if they sting), thistles, patto (get to them right now, before they flower), and onion weed (long very thin leaves, all coming out of the ground). Paspalum has met its match, because of our hoes. It is interesting that bridal creeper and lippia are noxious weeds in our area, even though they are good looking and seem to be harmless.

These are all important messages for me to get out there and to share with you. I say share because the security of our community is a mutual responsibility which we take very seriously and an area where we need your help.


As much as we talk about locking your house, it is sad that we have to bang on about the need to lock your car regardless of how long you are going to be away from it. Especially overnight.
