

#### REMINISCENCES

As I sit at the word processor and my computer I'm thinking how much we have come to rely on technology and the avenues it has opened up for us....but when it breaks down how much we miss it.

My parents were Hubert and Olive Odewahn, I have a brother, who lives at Walla, another brother deceased whose son Cameron lives in Walla, and two sisters.



#### **Telephones**

At Braefield we shared a telephone party line, with Hill and Dale and Bona Vista. Our number was 30S and neighbours were 30U and 30I. The telephone to the three properties were connected together, so neighbours could listen to each other's incoming, and outgoing conversations, considered rather bad manners if one did. It also meant that one could speak to the other without going through the exchange. Incoming calls was three short rings were for us. A line was connected to the Walla exchange. For 'outside' calls the telephonist controlled and directed the calls to the correct number from the Walla "exchange" through a switchboard.



The telephone was on the wall and it didn't have a dial but it had a handle one turned to call the exchange. Trunkline calls were charged in three minute intervals, the cost depending on how far away the recipient was. When I was working as a bush nurse it cost me \$1.60 for 3 minutes to ring home, or for my parents to call me. Albury to Walla was a trunk call but not as expensive as further away. There was a day rate and a night rate.

After moving to Dallaroo it took a year to have the telephone connected and then we could ring up between 6am and 10pm...we were no longer on a party line, now a continuous

service. Our number was 103. The handset still had a handle which one turned to call the exchange. Sometimes the switchboard at the exchange was so full


# Greater Hume Children Services - Walla Walla News

#### **Brigade Update**

Did you know that there is a legal responsibility to notify all adjoining neighbours (including those separated by a road or waterway) at least 24 hours before you light?

To make notifying authorities easier you can now lodge an electronic notification of your intention to burn off by visiting <a href="https://www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify">https://www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify</a>

This simple web based program is suitable for both computers and smart devices.

Should a Total Fire Ban be declared, people will receive an email and/or SMS message advising not to proceed with burn.

For the moment residents of Albury, Greater Hume, Federation and Berrigan Shire Councils can contact the Albury FCC on 02 6051 1511 if you have any questions or need assistance.

#### Things to remember:

- During the Bush Fire Danger Period or when your fire is likely to endanger a building, you must obtain a Fire Permit to burn which can be obtained from the NSW RFS or Fire & Rescue NSW.
- It is the responsibility of the person lighting the fire to ensure they are abiding by all Council and State government regulations and obligations.
- Failure to notify authorities or your neighbours could lead to the responsible person being issued with a \$1,100 infringement or other more serious legal action being taken.
- It's your fire and your responsibility

that one had to wait.

The manual telephone was an advantage when there was crisis in a family or an emergency such as a fire, as the operator kept everyone in touch.

In those days a telephone was a luxury and quite expensive.

The telephone exchange

in Walla was part of the Post Office on the corner of Commercial and Queen Streets.

Several local people were employed as telephonists at Walla and occasionally the Post Office clerks filled in, and they all did a wonderful job.


Telecommunications were controlled by the PMG [Postmaster General's] department until about 50 years ago

#### Weeds and Beauty at Walla Walla

Spring has sprung and our area is absolutely beautiful. It can't be missed. The crops are a magnificent deep shade of green. The wattle trees, daffodils and canola flowers are a beautiful yellow. With a bit of artistic licence, we can say we are surrounded by green and gold. Has there ever been a nicer combination of colours than green and gold? The sporting fraternity don't think so. Green and gold were chosen in 1984 as the official colours of Australia in international sports. And the colours are worn with pride ever since. And at Walla Walla, we see those colours every day at this time of year.

Golden wattles are our national flower, and they can be seen in many places near our town and certainly not in every other area of Australia. Green and gold. Walla Walla. It would be nice if they would rhyme.

Wattles are the first to tell us the end of the worst of winter has arrived. But weeds too like to flower at this time of year. Soursob, patto, onion weed, marshmellow, stork's bill, capeweed, sticky weed, thistles, nettles, and more. Dealing with them is a important, but the chief energy in our town must once again be focussed on **bindii**. The **bindii** plants will come up in October, and rapidly grow in what for them is a perfect season. We have to look for them in

#### A story to lift the spirits

On an isolated cattle farm that was hit hard by the Black Summer bushfires the Sturgess family are building a new home for their friend Smiley, with the help of two Red Cross emergency relief grants.

When bushfires tore through a remote property near Batlow in New South Wales earlier this year, retired man, Smiley, lost the home he had found with a local farming family. But thanks to two Red Cross grants, farmers Andrea and Paul Sturgess have been able to build a new home for their friend. With the grant money, they're converting two shipping containers into a cottage in the bush for 63-year-old Smiley. "We've got to build a big shed over the whole lot. We could put a bit of hay in the side of it ... which will be warm in the winter for him. We're going to find some second hand tin to put on this shed to give him a bit of cover from wind."

We can all learn something from this story.



#### **WALLA HISTORY**

#### The Walla Walla gold rush of 1877

June 1877. In these early days of settlement around Walla, there are a host of stories featuring indifferent characters, unfortunate accidents resulting in serious injury and death, and many, many stories of hardship. Too many to cover in one article. This next one is a hard luck story with a slightly humorous twist.

A man named John Meldrum worked on Walla Walla Station as a bullock driver. In December 1876 he had found gold in "the creek" and was going to "make a pile" of money. However, upon selling 2 ounces of "gold" to Mr. Dixon from Wodonga, it was found to be worthless by an Albury jeweller. This led to a charge of obtaining £7 under false pretences and then a subsequent visit to the Albury police court. At this court, Walla Station owner, Mr. Douglas, was one of the witnesses, he gave a glowing character reference of Mr. Mel-

drum, Mr. Douglas also went on the assert that Mr. Meldrum wanted to leave his employment as "he had found gold in the creek", Mr Douglas had agreed to this request. The following morning Mr. Douglas found out that "two of the lads on the station had been salting the creek sand with brass filings". Mr Douglas told Meldrum he was wasting his time, and once the salting had ceased, he found no more gold. Meldrum showed Mr. Douglas what he had found, Mr. Douglas replied "I could get him pounds of stuff like that in the blacksmith's shop." Meldrum was committed for trial but was released on bail for a total of £160. His case never went to trial, as the Crown Prosecutor was convinced of his innocence. Poor Mr. Meldrum was the subject of a cruel hoax, he admitted to this and ended up paying £10 to the defendant. Albury Banner 16th June 1877 p14 & The Sydney Mail, 21st July 1877,

The salting of the creek with brass filings had been going on for some weeks, how-

ever, for the previous couple of days of this charade, the perpetrators had been melting the brass, these drops of molten brass were cooled in water creating even larger "nuggets" for Mr. Meldrum to discover!

There is no mention of where this supposed "gold rush" occurred, all that the court documents say is a "creek on the station", but we could assume it was not far from the station accommodation buildings near the Billabong creek in the vicinity of the existing woolshed. Mr. Meldrum even went to the trouble of having a mining cradle made in Albury, this cost him £1 18s 6s (\$3.86) plus some other small mining tools. There is no mention that he was reemployed by Mr Douglas, however Meldrum attended the Albury court again later in 1877, this time as a victim of a robbery, so he had remained in the area.

The funding received from the grant project was used to purchase iPads which are available now to be loaned from Greater Hume Council Libraries to people who are over 60 years of age and who are isolated from family members and friends. The IPads are great for browsing the web, reading and sending email, enjoying photos, watching videos, listening to music, and playing games.

The iPad can also be used to download library resources or to connect with family and friends using Facebook, Skype or Zoom. Library staff are available to teach customers on how to use the IPads and will also provide ongoing support.

Currently over 22 iPads have been loaned to community members and Age Care Facilities in the Greater Hume Council.

Students were encouraged to wear the colours black, white or grey and bring a gold coin donation. The day consisted of several activities and a sausage sizzle. It was fantastic to see such participation with almost every student wearing civvies and buying a snag or two from the BBQ.
