OCTOBER AG REPORT

As we enter spring, rainfall has remained patchy across the district, resulting in inconsistencies in crop growth and development. Early emerged cereals and canola have generally fared well, with yield potentials still quite high. However, later-sown paddocks in drier pockets are lagging and will require on going rainfall and cooler temperatures to ensure they can maximise yield. A key issue emerging this season is the potential for disease outbreaks, particularly in cereal and canola crops. With mild weather and sporadic rainfall encouraging leaf wetness, the risk of diseases such as stripe rust and septoria in cereals, along with blackleg and sclerotina in canola has increased. This is the reason a number of planes have been buzzing around the region! Warming temperatures combined with recent rainfall have also provided ideal conditions for strong pasture growth in the area. Lucerne, across the board, is responding well however there are isolated areas of aphids affecting growth, so it is crucial to inspect stands and make sure they're not being compromised. There has also been a small amount of hybrid ryegrass cut as fine chop silage, as growers begin to rebuild fodder stocks after the extended period of dry weather!






WALLA WALLA MEN'S SHED Inc Update



Weeds at Walla Walla by Herb Simpfendorfer

A few days ago I was enjoying a nice cuppa at the Food Mill, minding my own business when I was approached by a person who is an Expert about weeds at Walla. Without saying Hi, she looked straight at me and said, "What about chick weed?" This was our conversation:

Herb: Does it have prickles?

Ex:No.

H: Is it noxious?

Ex. Well, no.

H: I know about bindii, cape weed and marshmallow and not much else.

Ex: Then it's time you learned about chick weed!!!

So I went home and Googled chickweed to increase my scanty knowledge of weeds. Then I went out and about and bent down to closely see small low growing plants. Chickweed was growing all over the place. It hides amongst grass and lawn and often beats them in the battle for survival.

It has small round leaves and small white flowers. It goes to seed in about four weeks then dies off. It is easy to pull it up. Low mowing helps control it. Lots more information on the Internet.

Another grass growing now all over the place in cracks in concrete and by itself is winter grass. It grows very quickly. It is easily controlled with a hoe or spraying.

IN YOUR GARDEN

Ideas for October

Spring, with its warm, longer days is progressing well. We hope frosts are finished and it will be safe to plant out tomatoes now.



I recently read an old article by the great gardener Peter Gundall, which I will share with you. His method of enriching the soil before planting out tomato seedlings was to collect a bucketful of black charcoal lumps from a wood stove or open fireplace. Pulverise these with a lump of wood. Mix half a bucket of these pea-sized pieces and black dust with a special, high potash mixture suitable for tomatoes. It was 1/2 cup seaweed concentrate, 1/2 cup sulphate of potash, a good handful of blood and bone. Bulk out this mix with sheep manure and wet with three litres of water. Result - a black sloppy gruel!

Dig holes for seedlings slightly deeper, fill the bottom third with the gruel, then work into surrounding soil. A seedling went into every hole treated like this, each given an extra circle of potash. Peter said the results were phenomenal, with fantastic yields and unusually rich delicious flavour. I plan to try this "recipe" this year and would be interested to hear from others who try it too.

Beans, corn, cucumbers, zuchinni, melons and pumpkins can all be planted now in frost free areas. Grow your beans, cucumbers and pumpkins UP. Saves space and are easier to pick. Add some companion plants, basil, parsley, etc

and edible flowers – violas and merigolds.

Magnolias, lilacs, wisteria are coming to an end with their beautiful fragrant blooms. Feed and let bulbs die down. Roses – flowering now – climbers Claire Matin (pink), Sutters Gold (yellow) and Pierre de Ronsard are beautiful.

Deadhead bush roses to promote longer flowering. Look out for Oct/Nov open gardens for beautiful displays and great ideas that you can use in your own garden.

Clivias – Great plants for dry shady areas - yellow, orange, red.

Enjoy your peas, broad beans, lettuce etc. Keep up the water, down with the weeds and surround with mulch.

Walla Walla in days gone by

1875, 150 years ago

October 1875. Albury Police Court. Norman Beaton, an elderly Highlander, was charged with having stolen a pair employment agreement because it contained of bagpipes at Walbundrie, belonging to John Macdonald, little means; he purchased the bagpipes in Melbourne with dispute and work proceeded satisfactorily. a view of travelling the country in the company of Mr 1925, 100 Years Ago. 1900, 125 years ago


October 1925. Horse Shot Dead. Mr Jacob of "Merino Park" was hunting rabbits with his gun-shy horse. Mr Jacob October 1900. The first Grain Shed at the Railway Station dismounted to take aim at a rabbit, the horse panicked and moved in front of Mr Jacob, he gave the horse a prod with the barrel of the gun to move it away, the gun fired into the horses side, "and it dropped dead".

1950, 75 Years Ago.

October 30th1950. Alma Park Fire Brigade joined with the Walla Subdivision Brigade to form the "Walla Subdivision -Alma Park Rural Bush Fire Brigade." Fees were now 10/- for every landholder up to 50 acres, and 2/- for every 100

October 1950. At their Annual Meeting, the Walla Walla Volunteer Fire Brigade had just purchased a new fire fighting unit for £170. The meeting also voted to draw up plans and buy material for a new fire station beside the Literary Institute/Soldiers Memorial Hall.


