### Do you have a Bush Fire Survival Plan?

The NSW Rural Fire Service provides on-line information in relation to bush fire preparedness. A Bush Fire Survival Plan can be downloaded to assist with preparations and can take as little as five minutes or you can sit down with your family and discuss what you will do using the guide to making a bush fire survival plan (https://www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/ resources/bush-fire-survivalnlan).

The location of Henty's Greater Hume LGA Neighbourhood Safer Place is Bicentennial Park, Olympic Highway, Henty.

#### Four simple steps

There are four simple steps to get ready for a bush fire:

**Step 1** - Discuss what to do if a bush fire threatens your home.

Many households find that having a discussion over dinner works best as everybody is together and focussed.

**Step 2** - Prepare your home and get it ready for bush fire season.

There are simple things you can do around your home to prepare it for a bush fire, like keeping the grass low and having a cleared area around your home.

**Step 3** - Know the bush fire alert levels.

If there is a fire in your area you will find its alert level on the NSW RFS website and in the 'Fires Near Me' app. You need to keep track of the alert level so you know what you should do.

Step 4 - Keep all the Bush Fire information numbers, websites and the smartphone app.

In a bush fire, it's important that you stay up to date on conditions in your area.

It's a fact. If you and your home are well prepared, you stand a better chance of surviving a bush fire. Download the four simple steps today.

#### Prepare your home

A well prepared home is more likely to survive a bush fire.

Even if your plan is to leave early, the more you prepare your home, the more likely it will survive a bush fire or ember attack. A well prepared home can also be easier for you or firefighters to defend, and is less likely to put your neighbours' homes at risk. A well prepared home will also give you more protection if a fire threatens suddenly and you cannot leave

Here are some basic maintenance tips to prepare your property:

- Clean your gutters of leaves and twigs
- Install metal gutter guards
- Repair damaged or missing tiles on the roof
- Install fine metal mesh screens on windows and doors
- Fit seals around doors and windows to eliminate gaps
- Enclose the areas under the house

- Repair or cover gaps in external walls
- Attach a fire sprinkler system to gutters
- Keep lawns short and gardens well maintained
- Cut back trees and shrubs overhanging buildings
- Clean up fallen leaves, twigs and debris around the property
- Have hoses long enough to reach around your house
- If you have a pool, tank or dam, put a Static Water Supply (SWS) sign on your property entrance, so firefighters know where they can get water
- Check and maintain adequate levels of home and contents insurance. Ensure it is up to date.

What should you take with you in case you need to leave your home: (https://www.redcross.org.au)

- Take your medicine
- Pet essentials
- Radio (battery powered)
- Lights/batteries
- Water
- Cash
- Food
- Toiletries
- Chargers
- First Aid Kit
- Protective clothing/ blankets
- Scans or photocopies of important documents
- Photographs of valuable household items
- Copies of videos/photos

Fire Danger Ratings have changed and are now simpler and give you clear actions to take. They are:

#### MODERATE Plan and prepare.

• Stay up to date and be ready to act if there is a fire.

#### HIGH Be ready to act.

- There's a heightened risk. Be alert for fires in your
- Decide what you will do if a fire starts.
- If a fire starts, your life and property may be at risk. The safest option is to avoid bush fire risk areas.

#### EXTREME

Take action now to protect your life and property.

- These are dangerous fire conditions
- Check your bush fire plan and ensure that your property is fire ready.
- If a fire starts, take immediate action. If you and your property are not prepared to the highest level, go to a safer location well before the fire impacts.
- Reconsider travel through bush fire risk areas.

#### CATASTROPHIC For your survival leave bush fire risk areas.

- These are the most dangerous conditions for a fire.
- Your life may depend on the decisions you make, even before there is a fire.
- Stay safe by going to a safer location early in the morning or the night before.
- Homes cannot withstand fires in these conditions.
- You may not be able to leave, and help may not be available.

Jessica said she was thrilled to find out her idea was chosen from more than 100 suggestions and she wanted to have input into a town where she loves living.

Visitors to the open day also saw demonstrations in the latest technologies available to hospital staff to allow real time access to medical specialists when dealing with emergency and acute care patients.

## Record wrap

Displayed in the Henty Craft Gallery will be some Wrap With Love wraps for cold humanity. Twenty-four were delivered to Wagga in early November to bring the total to 211. When the last load was delivered in December from the hostel, it set a record for Henty's contribution.

for all the youth. The response was overwhelming, and Henty LHAC intends to run another course next year, due to the demand as we were limited to 20 places.

Cooking lessons ran for three weeks, with a local caterer, who provided very hands-on sessions that were fun and engaging. Participants cooked and ate their meals, also receiving the recipes to take home. This was attended by a mix of males and females, who all expressed a desire to attend further sessions.

Table tennis over four weeks proved to be a hit, with older and experienced volunteers, who willingly gave their time and energy to teach the younger attendees. This proved to be a fun activity for both young and old alike.

Henty LHAC is working with outside providers to deliver other events in response to issues identified by teenagers in surveys conducted earlier in 2023. These include soccer and more summer sports, such as touch football or night netball, but the challenge is insurance.

Further workshops are planned for 2024 and hope to include developing videos for social media platforms like Tik Tok, creative writing and art.

#### Nepalese adventure recounted

Our meeting on Wednesday November 8 was at Culcairn Bowling Club. The president Yvonne Booth welcomed all including Greater Hume Councillor Doug Meyer, and deputy chairperson for Riverina Water. Two new members, Lois Biti and Pam Schulz were presented with their Probus badges.

Yvonne has received advice that the Peter Mac fundraising group has raised \$99,163.62 in the past 12 months. The group has been a big part of making baby clothes, toys, beautiful bears, hot water bottle covers and heat bags with wheat and lavender. Congratulations to all those helpers, your beautiful work goes towards a very good cause, and thank you to the generous souls who donated yarn and transporting the craft to Melbourne.

Yvonne spoke of a beanie competition being arranged for next June. Probus are making beanies for the men of the Mission to Seafarers in Sydney, and this is advance notice to everyone to knit for this most worthy cause as part

of a competition. There will be more information after Christmas.

The five-minute speaker was See Gain. See was born in Malaysia and spoke of her childhood during the Japanese occupation. See was the youngest of five children, raised by her mother, while working in the family book shop after her father had died at enemy hands. She studied nursing in England, and now joins Probus.

Yvonne presented See with a Probus pen as a token of thank you for a most interesting speech.

Henty now has a choir and the intention is to sing for the folks in care and community events.

After an attempt by the Probus group at the carol, Twelve Days of Christmas, with no song books, they might need some choral assistance.

The main speaker was Brenton, from Riverina Water, who had a helper to set up the slide show. Brenton told of being part of a team of people being sent to Nepal, as volunteers, for Rotary projects in Nepal. The team included Virginia, a

computer specialist, and leaders from Albury. The time spent in Nepal was over three weeks. The team ranged in ages from 18 to 80 years. Rotary volunteers helped to refit a three-storey building to dormitory rooms for nursing students.

In February, Brenton went to Kathmandu and saw cremations in the River Ganges and learned that the Gurkhas are from Nepal too. The roads were very winding in Nepal, a country of at least 30 million people on a land area about half the size of Victoria.

The team stayed in a hotel with hot water, wi-fi and air conditioning. Food was spicy with flat bread.

Occupational health and safety was not the same as in Australia. Language differences required a Rotary club translator or lots of hand signals. Tall white people were a novelty and in Nepal, high school lasted until 23 years of age. Projects included giving treadle sewing machines and training to women and small water units to a maternity hospital.

Brenton talked of going to small villages to hand out books and backpacks to school children. The team made a bedroom for the caretaker of the dormitories by renovating an animal shelter that he had been sharing with the animals.

Riverina Water has Vietnamese people visiting to learn about water systems and will perhaps do an exchange with their people in the future.

Brenton was presented with a Probus pen as a thank-you for talking about a most amazing experience.

Lots of questions were asked and answered, and talk over lunch was that the Probus people were most happy with the visit. Thank you to all involved in arranging this visit.

The Christmas meeting is to be lunch at Henty on the second Wednesday of the month, December 13, at 11.30 am for a noon start. Menu is roast turkey and vegetables with mini pavlovas for dessert. Cost is \$25 and bookings must be made with Yvonne Booth or Kevin Fogarty, unless you have already signed to attend. Probus will be meeting in January at the second Henty on Wednesday.

The pair have worked on tanks in the Australian


