Respite centre officially opens

Avondale Place marked its official opening on Wednesday, March 22. Due to inclement weather the opening took place at the Henty Community Club, where a large crowd of 150 was in attendance for the proceedings. The attendees consisted of donors, service clubs, ambassadors, supporters, grantors, representatives of local entities/ business and a mix of community members

This official opening follows an open day that was held on February 5, where the community and others were invited to view the home and four independent living units. A large number of people also came on that day and it was wonderful to be able to share the progress of Avondale Place with the community. A sausage sizzle was provided and catered for by the Henty Lions Club, who have been one of the great supporters of this project, both in funds and the assistance they have given.

The theme of the official opening was all about Henty and its community spirit, recognising that this project has only been possible through the generosity of so many people and groups.

Sue Green, a local resident and proud Wiradjuri woman, gave the welcome to country and her call to "walk with our people", was reiterated by all speakers. This was recognising that we have walked together in the achievement of Avondale Place, and will continue to do so as we move forward.

Emcee for the day was Michael Broughan, who introduced the guest speakers, Justin Clancy, Member for Albury, Trent Dean, CEO of Mercy Connect, John Ellis, chair of the Bendigo Bank Board and Alison Campbell, Henty Respite Trust board member. All spoke about their involvement in the project and their excitement at the path forward. This included the opportunities to provide employment locally with nine people currently engaged in training with Mercy Connect and hoping to work for the service provider, who will oversee the day-to-day running of Avondale Place and the living units.

Chair of Henty Respite Trust board, Ben Hooper, spoke of the achievements to date and the challenges

ahead, in particular the equitable access of nonfunded participants to the facility. He acknowledged the enormous contributions made by so many, both great and small and thanked them all, for each and every manner in which they have assisted. It is anticipated that the facility will be operational by the time this article goes to print, awaiting a final sign off any day.

The formalities were concluded with a ceremonial cutting of the ribbon and morning tea was provided, again by the generosity of the CWA and the Henty Community Club, another two wonderful supporters of Avondale Place.

Henty should be very proud of what has been achieved to date and is to be congratulated for bringing such a wonderful vision to fruition.

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

The Biography History Book

Just at dawn, he began to shell us. I thought the end had come, as four chaps that were in the same room as I was got killed. A shell landed in the street, only a few yards off.

During World War I, the diggers were rarely safe, even when they were tucked up in bed, miles away from the front line.

provides This book ล glimpse into a private's experience on the frontline. It is based on the war diary of Private Charles Robert Lumsden Smith, but is set within the broader context of World War I: the events that led up to the outbreak of war, the battles in which Private Smith fought, and others that influenced him or the outcome of the war.

It is the story of one man, amongst the hundreds of thousands of young Australians, who fought in a war that changed the face of Europe and spawned the nationalism that set the foundations for the next world war.

The Author

Anne is a retired science teacher who started her working life as a medical scientist. She followed a passion to become a teacher and taught Science in the western suburbs of Sydney before taking up a position at a large independent school in the city where she taught for 30 years.

Retirement brought time to write, first about her children and the remarkable journey they shared in The Gift of Adoption, and then about her parents' experience of World War II in No Ordinary Life. Her latest book, Private CRL Smith, tells another family wartime story; this time about a young Aussie on the Western Front during World I.

You won't find his name amongst the heroes written about in the history books, but he was one of the many unsung heroes of a war too willing to sacrifice young lives.

"Is it important to know about glaciers and their changing movements and features?"




Riddle - who won best exhibit?

Local WWI veteran remembered

Charles Robert Lumsden Smith or just CRL, of Inverbourne in Day Street Henty, was faced with the same question as many young Australian men during World War I; should he enlist? The question was raised during a conversation with a mate.



'One Sunday morning, a pal of mine said to me, "What about coming to the War?"

I said, "if" you're game, I am". So, we went to the Doctor in Henty and got examined, the result was I passed, and he didn't.'

A simple question from a mate, and a typical response, but the consequences were so significant. Was it a sense of duty to King and country that saw so many young Australian men enlist, or simply a sense of adventure and the lure of fighting in a war?

At the time of his enlistment, CRL was employed in the grocery department of Rohrich and Saunders, the General Merchant Store in Henty.

'On the Monday morning, when I informed my bosses that I had decided to do a bit they all shook hands with me and wished me all sorts of nice things. I felt like a little hero, but there have been times since, that I wished I was never born.'

These quotes come from the war diary that CRL wrote during his return journey to Australia on the HMAT Miltiades in 1919. The diary entries reveal the stark comparison between the excitement of a young Aussie on his way to the front and the war-weary man who returned.

CRL survived the war, but died from pneumonia in 1929. He had been gassed near Villers Bretonneux in early 1918, leaving his lungs vulnerable to infection. The family moved to Albury in the early 1930s and although his children retained his name, their mother's remarriage closed the chapter on CRL's life.

CRL's personal war diary is the backbone of a new biography, Private CRL Smith. The book follows his service with the 18th Battalion AIF from the Battle of Bullecourt, the 3rd Battle of Ypres and the battles for Villers Bretonneux to the battles of the 100-day offensive that led to the German surrender. The diary entries are a window into the thoughts of a Private in the mud-filled trenches of the Western Front and Official Battalion. Brigade and Division War Diaries were used to provide the details of battalion movements and the offensives in which it fought.

The book fills in the story of the war around the diary entries and was written primarily for the family, particularly Jeffrey Raymond Smith, CRL's youngest child and longestsurviving offspring. Although Jeff was only two years old when his father died, he felt a strong connection with him. Jeff became a well-known figure in Albury and the local area, first as a stock and station agent with Young Husbands and then as a partner in Bottrell Smith. He was proud that his name appears on the Honour Board at the Albury Golf Club along with his father's.

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Jeff was part of the project to record his father's story, but unfortunately, he passed away in 2022 before the release of the book. He now rests in peace alongside CRL in the Henty Cemetery.

The stories of our diggers are important family anecdotes, but they are also pages in our nation's history. Retaining records of them ensures that memories of quiet heroes such as CRL are not forgotten by time. CRL's diary has been donated to the Australian War Memorial Collection and will in time be available online.

The book and CRL's involvement on the Western Front will be discussed in a talk at the Henty Library on 28th April at 12.00 pm.

On the day you will have an opportunity to speak with a Murrumbidgee Primary Health Network staff member about health matters or experiences important to you and your community. There is no set agenda or questions we are seeking feedback on - the conversation is led by you.

Conversations on the Couch is an activity as part of MPHN's HNA Community Feedback. All feedback is collated used to and guide MPHN's Health Needs Assessment, which helps determine any gaps in services and initiatives.

They learned Herb Simpfendorfer had signed on for the Albury-Wodonga City-to-City Run and was encouraging others to join him.





Busy start to school year


