Unique wetlands at our doorstep

Believe it or not, Henty's Doodle Comer Swamp (Wetlands) actually helps you stay dry and it serves many other highly beneficial purposes.

The Doodle Comer Wetlands – which cover a National Parks and Wildlife Service nature reserve, private farming land and the Henty Common – provide the township of Henty with a natural drainage system, keeping our houses, shops and public facilities high and dry in heavy rainfall periods, such as the past couple of years.

The Doodle Comer Wetlands are considered unique and are one of the largest non-river wetlands in southern NSW. The uniqueness comes from the fact the swamp doesn't drain off into another area when it gets full and the

flow into the wetlands is relatively unhindered (ie no large reservoirs or dams are along natural tributaries such as the Buckingingah Creek).

What are the other benefits of wetlands? Wetlands provide:

- A place for plant and animal biodiversity to thrive and survive
- Carbon sinks undisturbed wetlands can store up to 20 times more carbon than soil/plant systems or 81-216 metric tons of carbon per acre
- A filtration system for cleaning water
- A site for the regeneration of threatened species
- An important stopover in the migration path of many bird species.



Humans have a great impact on the quality of wetlands and here in Henty we can improve the quality of the water getting to the wetlands by doing simple things like:

1. Keeping the areas which drain into the swamp free of rubbish, such as street gutters. The breakdown of plastics into microplastics in the water and around feed

sources impacts animal and plant species living in wetlands.

- 2. Ensuring free drainage into the swamp by clearing debris from gutters, drains and creeks
- 3. Thinking about actions you take close to the swamp and the impact it may have on the water quality.

Everyone is encouraged to use the Doodle Comer Wetlands Nature Reserve for exploring, bird watching, walking, water activities or having a picnic.

Entry from Henty is via the road running behind the Henty Golf Course and Sweetwater or via the Henty-Walla Road and Diffeys Road to Listers Lane (to reach the two bird hides) and the Henty Swamp Road.



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Empathy focus of term

Each term, St Paul's Lutheran School focuses on a different aspect of the Learner Profile and this forms the basis of a Wellbeing Program. In term 2 the focus was on empathy.

In this we looked at:

1. Listen 'first'.

The students practised the art of listening first by watching a series of short video clips before speaking. They discussed perspectives and then viewed this through a Christian lens and ask, "What would Jesus do?" Yarning circles as a whole school and in the classrooms were also invaluable to practise this important and often overlooked skill.

2. Respect everyone's stories.

The school enjoyed a visit from Celia from Australian Lutheran World Service and Hands at Work, which fitted with listening, respecting and acting with compassion. The says any opportunity to build empathy in the students is always a necessary and valuable opportunity.

Students also worked hard at collaborating and working as a team. Working with others isn't always easy. The Wellbeing coordinator, Sara, worked alongside students at lunch times to help form some great relationships based on trust and respect.

3. Act with love and compassion.

On the last day of school, students completed their



empathy focus by performing random acts of kindness in the Henty community. They made cards, wrote encouraging notes, letters to the elderly and confidently distributed them among the many businesses and people out and about. The students showed love and compassion to others as a great way to finalise their empathy focus.

Friday Evening Gatherings

The school held the first service for the school community and members of St Paul's Lutheran Church on a rather wet and miserable Friday evening. The community came together and shared in an evening of fellowship. It is powerful to share stories, show vulnerability and learn more about each other.

Mavis told of a beautiful lunch on June 21 at the Purple Chicken, in Albury. Purple Chicken is a training restaurant for people with disabilities. Our Probus people are fans of Purple Chicken, the food, and lovely people, and a framed certificate of appreciation was presented to the Purple Chicken people, after the meal.

Yvonne Booth was our fiveminute speaker, and she told of writing a book of memories of her life, for her grandchildren. Yvonne, as president presented herself with the Probus pen given as a token of appreciation to our speaker, amid much laughter and much discussion of memories.

The main speaker was Tom White, introduced to us by Trevor Bedggood. Tom is a farmer from Henty, working for Local Land Services, Riverina, and is involved with the Murray Darling Plan, particularly as it applies to the Murrumbidgee River. He came equipped with slides to show the areas under discussion, and the number of irrigation businesses and the potential of decisions to be made under the plan,. There seems to be a need to have water for the environment. birds, fish, animals and farmers and the more than 2.3 million people in the basin area.

There are bridges and effects on farms and wetlands and public lands all to be taken into account with the potential of a Business Plan to be handed to Government regarding the Murrumbidgee River, mid next year.

Tom provided an outline of information so that people can do their own research to learn more about the Murray Darling Basin Plan and its management of water and possible effects on us all.

Neil Meyer thanked Tom for his information and presented him with a Probus pen as a token of appreciation.



Motivated by a desire to seek a good education for



"We've both been made to feel very comfortable in our workplaces and that makes us want to stay in Henty."

Where is Kerala? It is a state of India in the far south of the country. It is home to

34 million people and is known for its spice, coconut and tea and coffee production and is one of the largest producers of fish in India. "Entries can be any agribusiness invention, ranging from a mobile phone app or computer software program to the largest tillage machinery," Ms Pink said.

Entries close on August 21, 2023, with entries to be judged prior to the field days and the winners to be announced at the Henty Machinery Field Days at 10.30am at The Stump on Thursday, September 21.



New exhibition at HCG

An artist's perspective

We continue in this edition with another contribution by local artist, Gwen Bullock.

Painting is not just Painting. Well certainly not if your art is a business that you make a living from or if you are a reasonably serious hobby artist. As soon as you begin showing and selling art there begins a flow on effect.

Researching and studying to develop and extend your knowledge and techniques. Maybe workshops, Studying The Masters, a university course or TAFE course to attend. The day before Monet died, he said. "I learnt something new today."

Researching a subject before beginning the paint-

ing. This may be Google, library, art galleries, travel, wanderings, setting up "still life's", organising models etc

Preparation for the actual painting - thumbnails, colour swatches, sketches, etc.

Photography - photographing your completed art for records and advertising. These need to have a professional touch to be good representations of your artwork. Therefore, the artist becomes a photographer or enlists a professional photographer.

Recording - computer skills are helpful here. Keeping records up to date are essential for a successful business. This includes titles and details - size un-

framed and framed, medium, paper type or canvas, dates began and completed, etc; exhibiting history, awards, location now if in galleries, pricing - cost to produce, costs to show, etc.

Advertising - websites, Facebook, Instagram, exhibitions, CVs, artist statements, blogging, newsletters, emails and so on. Keeping these up to date.

Framing - do you do this entirely yourself, buy frames and assemble yourself or pay a framer? A good job for a partner or friend!

Naming the artwork - Sometimes easy, sometimes difficult and time consuming.

Pricing- the age-old question. There are many theories out there (x times the framing costs, \$x times the height x width of the painting, \$x per square cm and so on)!! After supplies, framing costs, exhibitions and gallery commission, is there a possibility that the artist's time, effort, talent, skills, knowledge and emotional input are worth anything? Well mostly not much until after death!!!!

Supplies - ah the shopping part. I like this job. Keeping up with stock is important. It is not good to be in the middle of a Greek seascape and the turquoise green tube runs dry.


Exhibitions - entries in on time, packaging, deliveries, opening nights and collections (well you hope this last one is not necessary!)

Then do you teach as well!!?? Another story again.

Consequently, there are many businesses and websites out there offering their skills and knowledge to artists to fill some of these jobs to allow the artists more time to paint.


Henty Active Arts AGM

Faith Journey - Ken Dale

When I started typing this, I thought it would take about three minutes to type and 30 seconds to read. (It took a bit longer)

I had open heart surgery in October 2013. I wasn't scared, or even worried. I had faith in my Lord, faith in the surgeon that God provided for me, and faith that the entire town of Henty was praying for me. The Holy Spirit can work through barriers that even the town drunk, and town druggy, both commented that although they don't usually believe, they both said a little one for me. The 'POWER of GOD'! (I was not embarrassed to be seen with these guys as someone 2000 years ago lead by example that all people are to be treated well).

My journey just pre being Father Ken -

I have had my Black and White cassock since I was 26 years old (and they still fit—just). They were purchased when I was Senior Alter assistant for Fr Colin Wellard, and I'm not afraid to use them out in the community. After attending a funeral service at Culcairn that I had just taken, Pastor Garry Kenney of Culcairn gave me his set in

2014.

With the lack of clergy to choose from these days I am called more frequently by the local hospital when a Christian of any denomination requires 'last rites', prayer or someone to be with them when they are passing.

As well as 12 Baptisms, I have taken over 170 funerals and assisted with others in the areas of Henty, Culcairn, Yerong Creek, Holbrook, Howlong, Walla, Albury and crematoriums in both Albury and Wagga Wagga.

I like taking a funeral in a Church (which as well as ours, includes the Presbyterian of Henty and Yerong Creek, and the Uniting Church in Culcairn), but I generally get asked to take a graveside. I still use the entire funeral service from beginning to end, including a bible reading and words of comfort in a message.

Sadly, I assisted Fr Colin with my grandmother's funeral and brother-in-law's funeral and I also read intercessions at Fr Colin's funeral. I was strong enough to take both my mum and dad's funerals with assistance from the bishop of the day. The one funeral I couldn't take, and

understandably as being too emotionally involved was for my 19½ year old stepdaughter Anthea's in 2005. (Ovarian Cancer).

I think it a compliment that I have taken bookings after some funerals, as people make comments about wanting a funeral service 'exactly like that one' which I had just completed. My usual response is "I'll have to change the photo on the cover".

I thought the best accolade was from a Lutheran Church member saying, 'if there is no Lutheran Pastor around when I go, then you've got the job'. The next day a Catholic texted me a similar comment. (Don't tell other Catholics. So, what is an 'aspersion' anyway?)

I guess my biggest Christian role in my community has been to give a Christian burial, not only to those who attend church, but for those who normally wouldn't have asked for, or even
wanted a Christian burial. I guess I'm asked because the grieving family
know me, and I of course
know them, and usually I
know the person being buried. They trust me, and I
have trust in my everhelpful God, for without
him, I wouldn't be able to
help others during a very
sad time in their lives.

On a happier note, I was asked to take the Christmas Service for St. Barnabas in 2017 pre being ordained, which means no Understanda-Eucharist. bly an honour as Christmas and Easter worship is considered very important in the Anglican faith. Reminding me that I have for many years taken the Ash Wednesday service, mainly in Henty and Culcairn when required.

We came up with January 25, 2018 to be held in St Barnabas Henty for friends and relatives to be there for this important event in my life. Priested June 17, 2018 in St Alban's Cathedral Griffith during the SYNOD Eucharist. I was so chuffed that many of my church friends came to the service.

So far as a priest, I have taken four weddings and a renewal of vows.

In conclusion

2000 years ago, people worked and bought items alongside the Disciples when in the marketplace. I have worked in my shop in the main street of Henty hopefully in an ethical way since 1985. At times people ask me at work questions on faith that I hope I an-

swer in a clear and Christian manner. It pleases me that in my shop and tearoom, there have been many prayers asking God for help, as well as thanking God by Christians and non-believers in times of stress, and times of goodness.

Sometimes customers make a comment after a conversation saying, 'I didn't think we could talk politics or religion in a shop', and my answer to them is, Why Not!

Lismore flood victims helped

The annual report of Wrap With Love for 2022 shows that 27,246 wraps were distributed to 13 countries, with 15,639 staying in Australia. After the earthquake in Turkey and Syria,

Wrap with Love has managed to send 3,750 wraps to Turkey and 6,000 to Syria.

South Australia supplied wraps to the homeless, indigenous groups, refugee associations and the Domestic Violence Service. Lismore district received 71 wraps for flood victims from two Sydney groups plus many hundreds more.

Henty district have recently given 15 to the Albury-Wodonga Blanket Appeal and the Wagga Wagga coordinator has so far accepted 106 from Henty for 2023. 
