"I hope to put my skills and knowledge in mental health to good use," she said.


It has been 30 years since the club closed. Do you re-





Lauren helps older folks live better

Lauren Coe is most likely Henty's current longest serving health professional and, yet, you might have little idea of what her job actually involves. That is, unless you've needed her services and you've discovered she's an essential element of successful care for the aged in their own home.

nurse for more than 20 years.

What is a community nurse? In Henty it is a four-day-a-week role filled by Lauren three days (with Colleen Nicholls of Holbrook on the fourth day). A community nurse works to help the elderly and frail stay living independently as long as possi-

palliative care.

Some recipients may only receive visits on a short-term basis while recovering from illness or injury, while there are some who Lauren has been working with for many years.

"Fran Fifield initially recruited me for the job and it has been a good job to have while raising a family," Lauren said. Lauren and farmer husband Grenville now have three grown sons.

"There's no shift work or weekend work and it is good to feel useful in making people's lives easier."

After her years of observing how people age, Lauren has some simple tips for people wanting a healthy later life:

- Do your exercises.
 Work on strength and balance and take advantage of classes on offer;
- 2. Get a personal alarm, especially if you live alone; and,
- 3. Plan ahead, as waiting lists for some care packages are lengthy don't wait for a crisis.

How do you access community nurse services? Through your GP or via the Henty MPS or by contacting the Community Care Intake Service (CCIS) on 1800 654 324.

A full assessment is carried out and a suitable care package will be developed.



A career nurse who started more than 40 years ago at one of Australia's largest hospitals, The Alfred in Melbourne, and went on to become a midwife and neonatal intensive care unit specialist, Lauren has been Henty's community

27 years of support

Last month they made novelty bags and heat packs. Thanks to Peter Campbell for the wheat, Alice Latham for the lavender and Ada Uebergang for the collection of quilts, baby knitting, children's jumpers and slippers and Julie Parker for printing labels.

Besides knitting and crocheting, the group have sewn 60 baby beanie seams from Wendy in South Australia. These will also be distributed to local hospitals, and in Alice Springs and Katherine.



Support serve grows rapidly

The Henty/Culcairn Probus group held its April meeting at the Henty Community Club and the May meeting at the Culcairn Bowling Club. Both gatherings were well attended.

April's keynote speaker was Dylan Harrison (Hore), who, with his wife Rachael, founded The Next Step in March 2022 as a disability personal support service located in Henty. It is the only such service located between Albury and Wagga Wagga. The business began with one client, but has expanded rapidly as families within the Greater Hume Shire who have a child with a disability learnt of the seroffered. vices Dvlan's brother Daniel quickly joined the staff and now the organisation has 13 active support workers, of whom 11 live locally. The Next Step has 30-40 actively involved clients. Recently, through a working relationship with Henty Respite Trust, Avondale Place has become the hub for The Next Step's work.

Programming has grown over the past three years. Now The Next Step provides activities in the following areas: community access, assistance with daily life, short term respite at Avondale Place, road to independence activities subsidised by Henty Respite Trust, social activities on Friday nights and Saturday, social excursions for one or two days, car washing, and aged care support. Those of us who patronise Henty's coffee shop in the morning regularly see the happy disposition of The Next Step participants as they gather to begin their daily activities.

May's keynote speaker was Craig Broughton who recounted the journey he and his wife Karen undertook after deciding to relocate from their Albury home rather than to renovate. In November 2021 they found a 40 acre lot on Coach Road which suited their needs. After discovering that it would cost \$80,000 to get power to the property, they investigated going solar and thus began their journey to build a threebedroom off-grid home that was as solar-passive as possible.

The property only had five trees on it when purchased; however, over the next several years, Craig and Karen planted 1,000 trees. In designing the house, they decided to use materials that don't require upkeep, including corrugated iron outside walls. The walls and ceiling are exceptionally well insulated, the windows are double-glazed, and the whole house is wrapped, such that no air transfers from outside to inside or vice versa.

Major windows face north to optimise the use of sunshine for heating, and the house has polished concrete floors that capture heat during the day and release it in the evening to help heat the house. The house's ambient temperature is between 18 and 20 degrees all year. The Broughtons supplement the solar heat in winter with a wood fire and have a split system for heating and cooling as a final backup.

The solar system comprises 48 solar panels that can generate up to 23.5 kWh daily, plus seven batteries for storage. With careful scheduling of major appliances, the Broughtons use less electricity than they generate. They also use a sustainable approach to water use for their large vegetable garden and orchard. While an off-grid home is not for everyone, Karen and Craig absolutely love theirs.
