HOLBROOK SPORTSGROUND PLAYING SURFACE UPGRADE

Council is aware that there has been significant discussion in the community regarding the unsatisfactory performance of the Holbrook Sportsground playing surface following the upgrade to the surface last summer.

Upgrading the playing surfaces of the four most used grounds; Culcairn, Henty, Holbrook and Jindera over one summer period was very ambitious, however with the funding available through the Drought Communities Fund it was a once in a lifetime opportunity to achieve lasting improvements to these grounds. The Holbrook ground was only sprigged in January and then over sowed in April and the first year was always going to be challenging, particularly if a wet winter ensued.

Council had to heavily roll the surface and remove sprig lines which has no doubt impacted on the efficiency of the drainage system. This, combined with over 100mm of rain in Holbrook in the second half of July and rain on 25 of the 31 days and two home games in consecutive weekends during this period led to the poor state of the surface.

It has always been the intention to undertake further improvements works after year 1 and to a lesser extent year 2 to ensure the playing surface will stand up to the rigors of winter sport.

Works planned post football and netball season include: additional surface inlet pits installed around the perimeter of the ground to assist with the removal of surface water, reshape perimeter

swale drains to direct surface water to the additional pits, new underground storm water discharge/outfall drain is to be installed connecting both the ground and the new building and some other areas to the main open drain on the western side of the Reserve. The additional capacity will greatly improve the drainage of the oval and surrounds.

The first priority will be to grow the kikuyu by fertilizing and verti-draining. Low areas on the ground will be filled. Verti-draining (aerating) will help alleviate water logging, improve drainage and also decompact the soil promoting healthy growth of kikuyu. Further top dressing of the oval may be required but this will only be undertaken once the kikuyu is fully established.

Council is confident that over the next two years the playing surface will improve significantly.


Digital Library: Everyone should be aware by now that we have an extensive digital collection ready to be listened to or read on your smartphone or tablet.

LEST WE FORGET – WILLIAM W. COOK

Leading Aircraftman William "Bill" Cook, was born in Holbrook in 1925, the son of Norman and Amelia Cook. He left his job at Woomargama Station in 1944 to enlist in the Royal Australian Air Force.

After his service during World War Two, William volunteered to join the British Commonwealth Occupation Force (BCOF); a taskforce created in 1945 for the purpose of enforcing the terms of Japan's unconditional surrender which had ended the war the previous September. Whilst United States forces were responsible for the military government, the BCOF was responsible for supervising demilitarisation and the disposal of Japan's war industries. It was dismantled in 1952, when the Japanese Peace Treaty came into effect.

William, as a plant operator, was posted to the No. 5 Airfield Construction Squadron, nicknamed "The Flying Shovels." It's primary objective during the Occupation of Japan was to provide engineering support. Along with employed Japanese labourers and tradesmen the Squadron conducted the important role of repairing and maintaining airfields.

Stationed about 40kms from Hiroshima at Iwakuni, William stayed in what used to be a Japanese naval and air force college. During his time there he was able to visit Hiroshima — or what was left of it. Writing home, he explained that little remained of the city. All around where the atomic bomb exploded was complete havoc and devastation.

In late January 1947 while at Iwakuni, William was diagnosed seriously ill with a cerebral tumour. He was repatriated to Australia and admitted to a RAAF Hospital but was later transferred to the Alfred Hospital in Melbourne where he died on the

18th February 1947.

GREATER HUME COUNCIL NEWS

Business dealt with at the meeting included:

Council resolved to strongly support the establishment of a four bay RFS Brigade station at the Gerogery Recreation Reserve.

Council resolved to approve a 2 lot subdivision at 60 Wallace Street Holbrook subject to 11 conditions.

With the postponement of the Local Government elections, Cr Heather Wilton will continue in the position of Mayor until the 4 December elections, however an election for the position of Deputy Mayor will be required at the September meeting. Week commencing 10 January 2022 Community grants from the Bushfire Community Recovery and Resilience Fund (BCRRF) have been approved to the value of \$26,190.36 have been approved for the Wantagong and Wymah/Bowna RFS Brigades along with Holbrook Meals on Wheels.

Council will contribute \$600 to the Southern Sports Academy for the 2021/2022 year to support three local athletes that are attending the Academy.

The Community Engagement Strategy for the Community Strategic Plan Review was approved. The strategy outlines various ways the community can engage with Council to assist in the review and development of the Community Strategic Plan. Council will be seeking feedback from a variety of stakeholders to understand the key priorities for the shire.

Council approved the relocation of the Holbrook Community Garden from St Patricks School to public land adjacent to the Holbrook Library complex. A management committee will be established to oversee the management and operation of the garden.

Council noted the report on the 2017-2022 Delivery Plan / 2020-2021 Operational Plan. The report highlighted various achievements of Council for the period 1 July 2020 – 30 June 2021. Greater Hume Council are an active member of the Murray Taskforce for the NSW Growing Regions of Welcome Pilot program. The taskforce will guide the strategic approach to newcomer attraction and retention, community welcome, employment and support service coordination.

Council has appointed Fulton-Hogan to the Spray Sealing Works for Greater Hume and Lockhart at a cost of \$1,747,867.08 exc. GST.

COOKARDINIA MEMORIAL HALL

CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT 2020-2021

Our Hall is located midway between Henty, Culcairn and Holbrook and sits in a tranquil rural setting. Originally constructed as a memorial to soldiers from the Cookardinia region who served in WW1. The War Memorial board was revamped and a Memorial Stone laid on 11/11/2018 during the Celebration of Peace, commemorating 100 years since the end of WW1.

The brick complex has a hall with seating capacity for 100 people, kitchen {fully equipped}, supper room, meeting room, tables and chairs, parking and toilet facilities. Tennis Courts are located close by.

The committee has over the past twelve months made the following improvements, installation of electric heaters and an insulated ceiling in the supper room. All rooms are cooled by electric fans. In addition the meeting room has reverse cycle air conditioning. These improvements were partly funded through a very successful Trivia and auction night held in August 2019. We are very grateful for the generosity of regional donors who supplied goods and services for auction or cash donations.

The committee has recently applied unsuccessfully for a Crown Lands grant to upgrade toilet, kitchen and hygiene facilities to meet the standards required during the COVID pandemic. The grant was considerably oversubscribed thus we were not successful this time.

Unfortunately, we were not able to hold our Cookardinia AGM which includes all our local management committees due to the present lockdown. However, we do not sit idle.

Plans to upgrade the toilet suites, provide dispensers for soap and sanitiser throughout the complex, provide easy to clean stainless steel benches and handwashing facilities in the kitchen are still being formulated. Also, planned as a future improvement is the levelling and replacement of original flooring in the meeting room.

The Hall has been used for weekly exercise classes run by Bounce Physiotherapy, a family reunion, Mulga bike tours stop over, tennis weekend and Holbrook Landcare community meeting during the year. We are able to book small events at present. We look forward to hosting larger events once COVID restrictions have eased.

HOLBROOK ADULT RIDING CLUB SHADE GRANT COMPLETE

Holbrook Adult Riding Club recently completed their shade structure, with the most part of it funded from Greater Hume Shire Community Development Grant, and funds raised from the Trivia Night in February. It has completed the previous shipping container clubhouse project (funded with a grant from Riverina Water), and given a safe shade area for riders and families to congregate.



Covid restrictions caused a few headaches, having started in 2019. Working Bees scheduled then postponed. It was finally installed in May. We hope to host horse events, now, with much improved infrastructure. Thank you to Greater Hume for the grant, we are incredibly grateful.

HOLBROOK LANDCARE

Nick's been busy soiling his undies!

Nick recently completed the first stage of soil testing for our 'soil quality and health in pasture systems' project. A total of 16 pasture paddocks across the region (from Gerogery to Tumbarumba) were analysed and sampled. One of the field measurements used was the infamous 'Soil Your Undies' test that involves burying a pair of 100% cotton underpants in the topsoil and leaving for 2 months. After 60 days the undies will be dug up and assessed for how well they have decomposed.



This is an indicator for how abundant and active the soil microbes are. Other field measurements conducted included earthworm counts, organism counts, sub-clover nodulation scoring, infiltration rate, slaking and dispersion, and groundcover percentage. A sample of the topsoil was also collected and sent to a laboratory for a range of biology tests. Results can be expected towards the end of the year.

New Soil Health Videos: We have developed a series of short videos on soil health in pasture systems. The content is relevant to pasture systems here in the Holbrook region and provides some useful information and techniques for landholders to assess and improve soil health on farm. Burrumbuttock Field Day Postponed: The field day scheduled for this week at the Future SOILS Acid Soil Trial Site has become a victim of lockdown. A new date will be advised when we are in a better position to make a decision.


