## **CONNECT THE DOTS**

What does the Rotary Club of Holbrook, 3 Billabong High School students, supportive parents and a tall ship have in common? On 18 May, under sponsorship of the Rotary Club of Holbrook and support from their respective parents, the students - Nikita Stevenson, Tadhg Scholz and Oscar Preston - set off for an adventure. Leaving from Holbrook, they were driven to Melbourne Airport by a parent to connect with a flight to Adelaide. Arriving in Adelaide, the students were billeted with Rotarians involved with this adventure.

By 10 am on 19 May, the 3 Billabong students were joined by 21 other students from NSW, VIC & SA. Their collective adventure — sailing on the tall ship "One and All" from Adelaide to Docklands, Melbourne. The learning curve must have been steep as the 24 students, plus volunteers and professional sailors had to operate as a team, 24/7 for the next 7 days. The students weren't allowed any electronics on board, i.e. no phones, tablets, etc., so the focus was on sailing and managing the shared shipboard duties. I wonder how many "sailors" suffered from motion sickness? Scuttlebutt had

it that there were student sailors who hadn't flown before and for whom motion sickness was a real thing. Were these rumours tall tales from a tall ship sailing challenge?

"One and All" arrived in Port Philip Bay on 24 May and anchored overnight. Though close to Docklands, the tall ship had to wait for the 25 May afternoon low tide to get under the Bolte Bridge. Upon arrival, the student sailors were met by waiting family members eager to hear about the voyage and the opportunity to tour the "One and All" themselves.

The Rotary Club of Holbrook would like to thank Rotary International for making this opportunity available, Rotary District 9790 support staff and especially the students and their parents for enabling this exceptional opportunity to happen. In the trenches of the Western Front during World War I, a soldier said to his dying mate "I'll look after the missus and kids". This became known as 'The Promise' and it is kept by the over 40 Legacy Clubs still working to ensure that families receive the support they deserve.

You are probably all familiar with Legacy Badge Day in September, and the Legacy raffle earlier in the year. These are the two main dedicated fundraisers BUT your generous support of the Tin Hats in the local bars, and the Two Up on ANZAC Day, as well as the Gunfire Breakfast on Anzac Day, also raise much needed funds. Holbrook and Woomargama have, as always, been very generous in their support.

This year was a record Gunfire Breakfast, on a lovely morning, and just over \$1,000 was given to Legacy by the RSL. A very generous donation from the gamblers who braved the Woomargama Hotel Two Up was also received – over \$900!

This year Legacy are celebrating their centenary with The Legacy Centenary Torch Relay 2023 marking 100 years of service to those who have sacrificed. Beginning in Pozieres, France in the lead up to ANZAC Day in 2023, the Centenary Torch is travelling around the world, stopping at all 45 Legacy Clubs worldwide. The torch will visit Albury Legacy — our local Legacy Club — on Sat August 5, 2023.

Albury Legacy runs holiday camps, social outings, provides financial assistance, and owns a house in Wodonga that can be used by out-of-town families. It also provides links to other services delivered through a network of dedicated volunteers known as Legatees, who are supported by or help connect those in need to a team of

social workers and mental health professionals.

# **END OF THE SCOBIE ERA**

The 70 year connection between the Scobie family and Holbrook has come to an end with the relocation of Robin Scobie to Banksia Village at Broulee on the south coast.

Ian Scobie arrived in the district in 1952 to help a friend at Talmalmo deal with the bushfire that burnt to the coast that year. He went on to work on various farms in the area including "Kildrummie", "Woomargama", "Table Top", "Burnley", "Ardrossan", "Mount Annan" and "Round Hill".

Robin was appointed to teach at Holbrook School in 1953 having previously worked in Nyngan. Legend has it that Robin and Ian met at a dance at the Town Hall in the same year and they were married by Robin's uncle, Richard Stockdale, who was the Anglican Minister at Yackandandah, in 1954. Robin's sister, Susan, still lives just outside that town to this day.

Five sons were soon born: Graham who is a farmer and musician at Moruya, Duncan runs Scobie Saddlery in Blackall, Jim is a racehorse trainer at Gundagai, Rob farms at Batlow and Stuart is a landscape architect in Batemans Bay. All 5 boys completed their primary education at Holbrook Central School before moving on to high schools in Albury, Wagga Wagga and Culcairn.

Both Ian and Robin were involved in various roles in Holbrook over the years. Ian was Shire President, had a role in the formation of Billabong High School in Culcairn and was a Life Member of the RSL for being President for over 25 years. He also received an OAM in 2007 for contributions to Holbrook and district. Ian passed away on 4 Sept 2019 at Holbrook Hospital at the age of 95 and is buried in the Holbrook Cemetery.

#### **HOLBROOK LANDCARE**

Holbrook Landcare staff have been kept busy with a wide range of field days and trial sites over recent weeks. These range from drought or bushfire preparedness through to nestbox inspections. Crop and pasture trial sites, covering liming rates and the use of different pasture species are at various stages, ranging from establishment through to data collection. Other programs being managed through HLN include a Prograze course and a Working Dog School to be held next month and was sold out within about a week of advertising.

**Birdwatchers Wanted!** BirdLife Australia's Birds on Farms project – southern NSW – needs your help! 2023 Winter Birds on Farms Surveys are fast approaching.

There are several landholders who have their properties set up with survey points ready-to-go but who require assistance from an experienced volunteer birdwatcher. Volunteer birdwatchers get to meet these inspiring landholders and get to search for birds in previously 'unexplored' territories (albeit on a property-scale!). Surveys can be completed within a day, and a range of support materials and training is provided.

BirdLife's Winter Survey period runs from Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> June until Sunday 30<sup>th</sup> July. Be part of the fun! # Book review: "Blessed" by John Doyle (a new book on our shelves)

This is also one of the RRL Book Club books and I can see why. Once you've read it, there are so many lively discussions to be had. Often funny, at times poignant, this book has many layers and I thoroughly enjoyed it. Whilst it is a work of fiction, John Doyle has based the story around a year in his teenage life, growing up in Lithgow in the late 1960s. The perspective John writes from is clever (if you read the book you'll see what I mean). The story reads like a memoir and is an excellent description of young peoples' lives - the Catholics versus the Publics, boys and girls, family connections, sport, school, opinions, beliefs. John's writing feels effortless and yet he covers so much of the social changes beginning to reach the more isolated country towns at this time. The book leaves you feeling like so much has changed for the better but that maybe we have lost some of our resilience and sense of humour along the way. *Dom Heriot*

# HOLBROOK SHEEP & WOOL FAIR CONTINUES TO ATTRACT

The annual Holbrook Sheep & Wool Fair has once again attracted approx. 180 secondary students from schools in the southern Riverina, Central Tablelands and Victoria, with many travelling 5-7 hours to attend.

The educational value of the hands-on workshops continues to be the main reason this event is on the calendar for the schools. The HSWF organisers have an enormous level of appreciation for the volunteer presenters of these workshops and the people who accept judging roles during the 2% day event.

One of the primary concerns though is the capacity to continue with the program with a very small committee, more than 50% of whom are well past the age of retirement. Over the coming months several strategies will be investigated in order to ensure that the event is able to continue to benefit the participants and help to encourage young people to be involved in the sheep industry.

It is interesting to note that the Holbrook Sheep & Wool Fair attracts the greatest number of exhibitors of Lincoln sheep of any show. These exhibitors are also primarily located within a 150km radius of Holbrook and it is often the first time that visitors have seen the Heritage Breed sheep in real life.



# **GREATER HUME CHILDREN SERVICES**

This past month at Greater Hume Shire Children Services the children have been engaging in lots of construction, role play, story time, writing/drawing, messy play.

The Babies Room have had some new children start over the past few weeks, and the children in the room have shown lots of care and nurture towards their new peers as they make safe, secure attachments.

The Toddler Room have been working on their self-help skills with some cooking experiences and day to day tasks. The children participated in creating a mural of their hands in representation of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander colours in recognition of Sorry Day 26<sup>th</sup> May.

We offer a funded "preschool program" through the Start Strong program which is a government initiative. Throughout this program the children engage in a range of activities to assist with being "school ready". Our biggest focus is to ensure that children learn self-help skills, which we start implementing from when they are in the babies room. We focus on the emotions that the children experience and assist them to self-regulate as they navigate their way through their world.

The children in the Preschool Room have been doing "show and tell" to assist them with their confidence, language, ability to ask questions, listening to peers and taking turns. The children are always very excited when they get to bring a special toy from home.

The Preschool Room have started a pen pal system with a Centre in Albury. The children have drawn pictures and helped Catherine write a letter. The children will then go to the local post office to send the letter and pictures.

We are now offering vacation care for the July school holidays. This service will be run at the Holbrook Public School. Spots are filling fast so please contact Kimberly Jeffries (0457 235 325) Holbrook Centre Director to secure a spot.



## **OLEANDERS IN HOLBROOK**

A colourful garden species -Nerium Oleander that has fallen out of garden 'fashion' in recent years is still very much in favour, as seen in gardens and public frontages in almost every street in Holbrook.



the publicity concerning plant being poisonous have made Oleanders unpopular in many other towns and cities even though there are countless other toxic common garden plants. Believed by historians to be native to the Mediterranean region they are a hardy evergreen shrub that will tolerate a wide variety of conditions. They prefer full sun and good drainage. They present in double, semi double and single flower form. They are a popular choice for privacy barriers. The tall single white variety known as "Ed Barr" in the USA was used to surround tennis courts and the hardy red and California highways and absorb pollution.

An early catalogue from The Darling Nursery, After it's removal from home gardens and public 'Splendens' double 'Cardinale' pink,

'Purpureum' Crimson, 'Variegatum' double pink with variegated leaves, 'Lutescens' yellow flower. These listed Oleas are the early plants available to most Australian gardens. A quite beautiful white semi-double specimen named "Magnolia Willis Sealy" often chosen in the USA is sold here as "Madoni Grandiflorum".

The single Oleas grow faster and are easier to root cuttings from and appear to be the most common seen in white, pink and red. The more exotic double pink "Splendens" and semi double salmon "Mrs F. Roeding" have almost rose-like flowers but are not as big as the singles. There is also an uncommon double pink with variegated leaves, "Mrs Runge".

In the USA, Galveston Texas has celebrated the Oleander for 175 years and is known as the Oleander City. After destruction by a hurricane in 1900 the city replanted Oleanders throughout.

The toughness of Oleas is apparent by their survival after the atomic bombing of Hiroshima City Japan because it was the first flower to bloom white varieties were used to beautify the from the rubble. A white Olea, later to become in 1973 the Peace Flower of Hiroshima.



# FLU SEASON: IT'S TIME TO GET VACCINATED

Murrumbidgee Primary Health Network (MPHN) is encouraging community members to book a flu vaccination with their GP or pharmacist as soon as possible.

Getting vaccinated helps protect both you and the people around you, especially those at risk of severe illness or complications if infected with the flu.

Senior Manager Primary Care Engagement Andrew Heap said with COVID-19 still circulating in the community, vaccination is especially important.

"We understand people may be feeling vaccine-fatigued after the last few years, however we're strongly encouraging everyone to stay vigilant and give themselves the best chance of a healthy winter by getting their flu shot," Mr Heap said. "Our region's GPs and pharmacists are ready and waiting to help protect you against influenza, all you need to do is make an appointment."

It's difficult to predict who will catch influenza or who will become seriously ill. The flu can require hospitalisation and can even be fatal.

Community members most at risk of influenza include children aged between six months and five years, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, people with underlying medical conditions, people aged over 65 years and pregnant women.

You can also get a COVID-19 vaccine at the same time as your flu vaccine. Everyone over 18 years can get a new COVID booster if it's been six months since their last dose or COVID-19 infection.

"Ask your GP or pharmacist about getting a COVID booster at the same time as your flu shot, particularly if you're 65 years or over, or at increased risk from COVID-19," Mr Heap said. "Being proactive can make a difference in keeping Murrumbidgee residents safe and healthy and out of our hospitals this winter.

"Staying up to date with your vaccinations helps protect you, your loved ones, and our most vulnerable community members against severe illness. So please make your flu shot appointment today."
