CIAO, MI CHIAMO AUDREY (HELLO MY NAME IS AUDREY)

I was a short-term Rotary Youth Exchange Student in Italy over the summer school holiday period for 3 months. I didn't know what to expect but after coming home and having settled in, I am so incredibly grateful for every moment and can't wait to go back and visit.

My first few weeks in Milan were some of the most challenging times I've ever faced having to overcome homesickness and culture shock but once I was settled in, I began to fully immerse myself in the experience to be able to make the most out of the short time. I was fortunate enough to live in the centre of Milano with my host family which consisted of my host mum, host dad and two host sisters (one 17 years old and the other 16 years old). Together we travelled to places like Lake Como, Venice, and Bormio. During the first month I visited the city of Cremona with other exchange students from all around the world and with whom I became very close friends. I also went for a trip to Rome with my district of 14 exchange students which was a highlight of my time in Italy. In Roma, my favourites were the Colosseum, Trevi Fountain, and the Vatican.

My experience with school in Italy was different since I went to an artistic high school which was a 20minute walk from our apartment. I found it quite difficult at first to understand what was being said since I only knew a basic level of Italian and my classmates and teachers had a very sound level of English. Eventually, my class and I were able to communicate in some ways (mainly through sports) and they were all very welcoming. Some of my close school friends even helped me learn Italian while I helped them with their English homework.

One of my favourite times was when the city of Milano started to prepare for Christmas and seeing the city transform into a Christmas wonderland. Around the Duomo di Milano (the Milan Cathedral) I watched as they set up the Christmas market, Christmas trees and the whole city had amazing Christmas lights. A walk away from my house there was an ice skating rink which was fun to visit. I tried all the traditional Christmas foods and on Christmas eve my whole extended host family met together, and we had an amazing seafood pasta.

Often people would ask what my favourite thing about my exchange experience was and my immediate response would be the food (which was amazing, especially at Christmas), but after being home for a significant period, I think my favourite part was learning about the culture and language as well as making life-long memories.

I am especially grateful to the Holbrook Rotary Club as well as Rotary District 9790 for allowing me to have this experience. I would like to mention President Murray Jones and Youth Officer Belinda Izzard for working tirelessly to make the exchange as easy as possible.

To anyone considering going overseas on exchange, for whichever period of time, I highly recommend

doing it. It is the perfect opportunity to push yourself out of your comfort zone, indulge in a new culture, and make lifelong friends and memories.

AUSTRALIA'S VIETNAM VETERANS DAY - 50TH ANNIVERSARY

Australia was involved in the Vietnam War from July 1962 until June 1973 when the troops guarding the Australian Embassy were withdrawn. During the conflict 523 Australian ADF personnel died as a result of the war and almost 2,400 were wounded.

Vietnam Veterans Day is commemorated on 18 August every year. The day was originally known as Long Tan Day, chosen to commemorate the men of D Company, 6RAR who fought in the battle of Long Tan in 1966. On that day, 108 Australian and New Zealand soldiers fought a pitched battle against over 2,000 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong troops in a rubber plantation not far from the small village of Long Tan. The Australians prevailed, but only after fighting in torrential rain for four hours. They were nearly overrun, but were saved by a timely ammunition resupply, accurate artillery fire from the nearby Australian base, and the arrival of reinforcements by armoured personnel carrier. Eighteen Australians lost their lives and 24 were wounded, the largest number of casualties in one operation since the Australian task force had arrived a few months earlier. After the battle the bodies of 245 enemy soldiers were found, but there was evidence that many more bodies had been carried away.

The Holbrook RSL will hold a service at 11 am on 18 August 2023 at the Cenotaph to commemorate 50 years since the start of Australia's involvement.

The MLHD Specialist Palliative Care team will provide a short education session about the team and what supports they offer, followed by guest speakers from local areas including funeral


directors and solicitors to speak around topics such as:

Ben Coster from Wandabar Stockdogs provided impressive physical demonstrations using his main dog "Fred" and one-on-one sessions with each of the 13 attendees with working dogs; everyone getting opportunities to put their own dogs through their paces. The 10 fence sitters were also kept well entertained, and everyone left the day with plenty of great tips and information to help them with training their dogs.

It is important for us to acknowledge the behind the scenes work that Hamish and Abby Paton and Peter Govan put in leading up to and throughout the day. We are grateful to Hamish and Abby for volunteering their yard, amazing new shed and sheep for the day, and to Peter for managing the yards during the day, making sure everyone had the chance to have a good go and sharing his own knowledge of working dog training.

Sheep Stock Containment Workshop: Recent years have demonstrated that producers are seeking opportunities to protect vulnerable pastures and landscapes without having to compromise on the livestock carrying capacity of their property. A growing solution is the implementation of Stock Management Areas (SMA) into their management system.

Although SMA enable producers to remove grazing pressure from vulnerable drought impacted pastures and landscapes, deciding if an SMA is beneficial to your business is challenging; from determining if you have the appropriate resources, time and management tools, and have suitable feeds and understanding of nutritional requirements, to understanding and applying the economic value and consequences of utilising a SMA before, during and after drought. SMA, their use and maintenance, can be complex but can also protect and enhance your existing on-farm assets.

The purpose of this project, led by Local Land Services in partnership with Holbrook Landcare, is to provide opportunities in the form of workshops, designed to support decision making when designing, and budgeting for stock

containment, and develop awareness of economic, natural resource, animal health and labour considerations of SMA.

Our next Stock Containment Workshop will be focusing on sheep and will be held at Tarcutta on 11th September 2023.

If there was an award given to the Hero of Vegetables, it would have to be won, without a doubt, by the



humble carrot. Varieties of this ancient root vegetable can be grown throughout all seasons and in all climatic conditions. It has been the staple of kitchens for centuries and the most economical vegetable to purchase and grow. You get a lot for your buck.

The carrot (Daucas carota) originated in the Iran and Afghanistan regions, previously known as Persia, 1100 years ago. Then colours were purple or white, the orange colour being bred into the gene in the late 1600's creating the carrot we all enjoy today.

Highly versatile in the culinary world, the carrot is enjoyed steamed, roasted or stir fried for extra crunch. Also eaten raw, grated on a salad or as a juice tonic, the natural sweetness is unmistakable and is a rich source of beta carotene – vitamin A.

Now the signs of spring are appearing, I aim to have a succession of carrots growing in my garden throughout the spring and into early winter by sowing a number of different varieties. First is the Chantenay which is a fat stubby carrot ideal for shallower soils as the winter soil is wet and heavy and has not been tilled well. This is followed by the Baby carrot which is a quick grower and can be harvested before the Chantenay. Come summer, the soil will be tilled to a depth enabling the sowing of Topweight or All Seasons, both of which produce long, thick, pointed roots extending the growing season into winter. The Harlequin variety is a reincarnation of the ancient variety, a mix of purple, orange, yellow and white roots that can be sown year round, but not one I will try this year. Speedy Chicken, Ginger & Sweet Corn Soup

Ingredients:

1 tbs sesame oil 3cm ginger, finely grated 3 cloves garlic, crushed ¹/₄ bunch spring onion, thinly sliced, white and green parts separated 400g creamed corn 1L salt-reduced chicken stock 1 tbs soy sauce 2 sweet corn cobs, husks and silks removed, kernels removed 2 free range eggs

1 hot roast chicken, meat removed and shredded, skin and bones discarded

Method:

- 1. Heat half of the oil in a large, deep pot over medium heat. Add ginger, garlic and white part of onion. Cook, stirring, for 2 minutes or until fragrant.
- 2. Add creamed corn, stock, soy sauce and corn and stir to combine. Reduce heat to low and simmer, uncovered, for 6 minutes or until hot.
- 3. Meanwhile, in a small bowl, whisk together eggs with 1 tbs water. While stirring the pot, gradually pour in egg.
- 4. Divide soup among bowls. Top with chicken and remaining onion. Drizzle with remaining oil to serve.

Serves 4. Ready in approx. 15 minutes.
