ROTARY HELPS FIRE IMPACTED FARMING COMMUNITIES

Holbrook Rotary Club's new presidents Marg Geddes, Jen Parer and Jenny Kane recently delivered protective clothing and work-gear to the BlazeAid Camp at Tooma. Items including work boots, gloves and wet weather gear were purchased locally at Tumbarumba and hot water-bottles from the Holbrook Pharmacy. The BlazeAid volunteers consisting mostly of international backpackers have assisted fire affected farmers remove and rebuild hundreds of kilometres of fencing.

The Holbrook Club has joined forces with Rotary Club of Albury North to help rebuild local communities in the Upper Murray ravaged by fires and flood during December and January, North Albury has provided warm clothing and has been on the lookout for a generator and a caravan. The Uniting Church fencing team in Cudgewa has been active, a fencing team was provided by Tallangatta Rotary Club during the long weekend and the Blaze teams in Corryong and Jingellic have now resumed after the COVID 19 break. In fact, Rotarians from Districts 9790 and 9800 have thrown their weight behind supporting the farming communities damaged and destroyed by fire. Rotarian Bill Bott is chair of District 9790 Bushfire Recovery Fund and local Rotary clubs have been in contact with community leaders and farmers to investigate their needs and set up support.

Book Review The End of the Line By Gilliam Galbraith I kind of went off crime novels for a while, perhaps because I needed a bit of sunshine in my life during this dreary time. But then I'm always a sucker for a Scottish writer and along came Gillian Galbraith. Anthony Sparrow describes himself as a bookworm and a burrower. He is an undertaker who also clears deceased estates and when he uncovers rare publications in old Scottish mansions it satisfies his love of books. Retired Professor of Haematology, Alexander Anstruther is a bit of a cranky old hermit who is stressed and jumbled due to his age and the pressure of a public enquiry into the deaths of patients during the aids pandemic in the 1980s. His carers may or may not be abusing him and he employs a new assistant to help him in sort his papers. This new carer becomes a favourite and things progress well until Anstruther is found dead. Anthony Sparrow's burrowing uncovers some family facts and information that keep you reading. Just when you've figured it out, there's a twist in the tail. There are

odd Scottish/ British references so I hope that doesn't put people off. For instance, do Australians call psychiatrists, Trick cyclists and do you know what a sexton beetle is? This book was more psychological than blood and guts which suited me quite well in the end!

PLANT PICK PLATE

I had been away from my garden for two weeks. Upon my return I glanced quickly over my vegetable plots noticing the delicate white flowers of the peas and of course more weeds in and around the mulch blanketing the vegies. Other than that not a lot had changed. So I thought. Upon a more thorough inspection of the whole garden I felt it necessary to create a "jobs to do" list and as this list began to grow I needed to prioritise the most urgent tasks.

The fruit trees were first. I lightly pruned them at the end of Autumn so a spray to prevent curly leaf was urgently needed to be applied just before bud burst. The Apricot, Pear and two Apples were at the right stage for spraying, however the ornamental weeping Apricot had already produced delicate soft pink flowers. The first deciduous to loose its leaves and the first to bloom. Removal of the invasive ground covers surrounding all the fruit trees was back breaking. I had planted these covers to smother the weeds unaware they would take over. The application of blood and bone, compost, manure and specific granular fertiliser followed by mulch has set the trees up for hopefully healthy productive crops this summer.

Next task was to control the aphids I discovered hiding undisturbed in the heart of the red cabbage plants. Tiny white eggs and hatched green multi legged bugs happily living under the protection of the butterfly netting I had placed over the brassicas. Although the netting kept the caterpillars out it also kept the good predatory bugs out, hence the aphid infestation. The Bok Choy, Broccolini and the Red Cabbage all received a through spray of Pyrethrum.

Have you noticed the reoccurring theme? In my effort control particular garden issues. I have inadvertently created other garden problems and more work. Ahh, the joys of gardening.

Rotary helps fire impacted farming communities (cont.)

The Walwa Bush Nursing Centre project: this centre provides health and well being services to the Walwa and Jingellic areas. It suffered fire damage the kitchen and cool room and Rotary Clubs of Heidelberg and Ivanhoe and the Bushfire Recovery Fund are working on this project.

Cudgewa Fire project: At the height of bushfires in January, the town of Cudgewa suffered greatly through lack of water and loss of power supply which impacted on their ability to extinguish fires surrounding the town. Rotary clubs of Rosanna and Mooroopna are assisting the community with a 130,000 L water tank and diesel generator to ensure permanent water and power.

A total of 15 shipping containers have been delivered to the Upper Murray organised by District 9800 Rotary Clubs with another 21 organised by the Dept of land, Water and Planning and expected by July 12.

A total of 45 Air Purifiers were distributed to Myrtleford for distribution to hospitals and aged care facilities in the Alpine Health region.

Corryong FoodShare: The District Bushfire Fund has financially supported the FoodShare service which has been stretched as a result of an increasing number of clients from the Upper Murray requiring assistance for food parcels, clothing, linen, blankets, furniture, white goods and water pods.

4-WHEEL DRIVING IN NATIONAL PARK

Adventure seeking 4-wheel drivers navigated the rugged slopes of the Eucalyptus forests and surrounding pine plantations of Woomargama National Park on Sunday. A line-up of 13 four-wheel drives, the oldest vehicle - a '70s series cruiser wagon, and 26 people participated in the event.

The forest is home to 25 endangered animals or vulnerable animal species including the Eastern Pygmypossum, Squirrel Gliders, the Greater Long-eared Bats, Southern Bell Frog, Regent Honeyeaters, Superb Parrot and the Gang-gang Cockatoo. Once common, Koalas have not been seen in the area for thirty years. On the day, some wallabies were spotted and amongst the birdlife, the call of a yellow-breasted robin was heard.

The outing for Holbrook Rotarians and visitors was organised by their Community Service Director Murray Jones who stressed social distancing, hand hygiene and self-catering was a must due to the Covid-19 pandemic. That aside, the water was flowing, new pathways had been ploughed and drainage channels shaped, resulting in some challenging moments as the vehicles made their way separately up steeper slopes. A fair bit of grinding and shaking went on and we lost Ian T for a short period despite having the cornerman system in place and red and yellow flags and flashing light on lead vehicle and sweep vehicle.

At Home Plain, MasterChef lunch honours were won by Rob and Ange Peterson for best barbeque; best family picnic went to Bill and Joy Wearn; best looking salad – Trish and Beetle Bailey; and best picnic basket to Belinda and Rod Izzard.
