## FRIENDS OF THE HOLBROOK SUBMARINE MUSEUM

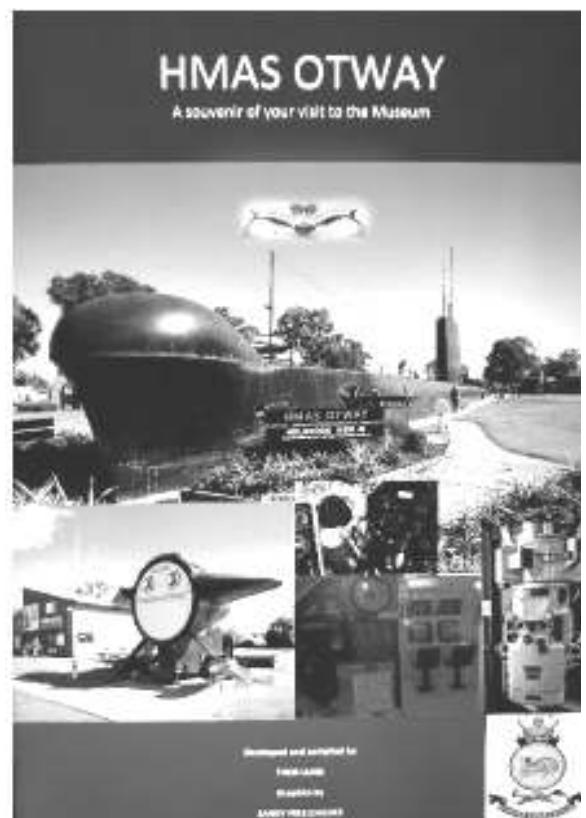

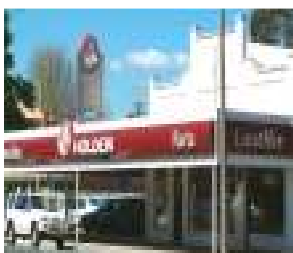

## The Yield by Tara June Winch

This book recently won the 2020 Miles Franklin Award and previously The NSW Premier's Literary Award. It is a very deserving winner.



There are three narratives: The first from Albert Goondiwindi who is writing down his language; the Wiradjuri language and each word has a story attached. He is from Massacre Plains on the Murrumbidgee River and is writing this dictionary before he dies to leave the language and knowledge to his family.

The next is from August Goondiwindi, granddaughter of Albert who ran away to England as a young woman to find meaning long since lost from her life after the disappearance of her younger sister. August returns home to Prosperous House on Massacre Plains, her home and home of Nan Elsie and poppy Albert. She comes to say, goodbye at Albert's funeral but the pull of the land and connection to country and family becomes too strong to ignore when the land is subject to mining. The last is in letters from the Reverend Ferdinand Greenleaf describing his life at Prosperous Mission in the early 1900's. His idealistic if sometimes patronizing ways and sympathy with the native people puts him at odds with the white settlers and ultimately his German origins leave him and Prosperous Mission's residents vulnerable as war breaks out.

This book is fictional but with a strong connection the Riverina and shows a history that many of us are reluctant to acknowledge.

## HISTORY QUIZ

**Previous quiz- Where am I?** I am a lone headstone, perhaps one of the oldest headstones in the GHC area. The cemetery in which I am located has lost a third of its area to ploughing, in the surviving two-thirds there may be as many as 140 graves in 90 plots. Although I am in a very historical site, thousands of cars pass me by without seeing me!

**Answer:** The headstone of Henry Wanklyn who was born in 1808 [died June 1852 Little Billabong], 19 March 1839 married Ellen Driscoll at All Saints Church Camden, Ellen who was born 1809 County Cork, Ireland died 11 February 1877 Little Billabong, and buried at Little Billabong.

**New Quiz Who am I?** I am a Holbrook 'character' well known to older Holbrook citizens. I died 14 December 1980 in Albury, Emma Wright recalled him carrying 400 pair of rabbits on his bike!

## PLANT PICK PLATE

My Eureka Lemon tree is sick. It doesn't have the expected new green leafy shoots and the flowers of future fruit are covered in a black sooty mould, have died and crumble in my fingers. It has many yellow leaves with the rest pale green verging on yellow. To add to the



distress I have inflicted on my tree, I discovered possible collar rot where the graft has been covered by mulch for far too long. Oh dear, what neglect!

On a positive, the tree has produced an abundant crop of large juicy lemons which I have now removed followed up by a generous prune to reduce the stress on the plant. A search for solutions to rejuvenate my Lemon tree pointed me firstly in the direction of nutrient deficiency. Iron deficiency results in yellow leaves requiring an application of chook manure pellets. Tick. Chook manure purchased and applied. Next problem is the black sooty mould caused by humidity and lack of airflow. My tree is covered by thick shade cloth for frost protection which I suspect also inhibits airflow. Tick. A quarter of the cloth rolled up. The collar rot is resolved by removing soil and mulch to expose the graft well above ground level. Tick. However, the damage could be too great and my Lemon tree may already be slowly dying. This is a sad day.

While I sob quietly, I need to deal with all those lemons I picked. Recipes are vast, using lemons in deserts and preserves. Instead I flicked through my very old PMWU cookery book I found Candied Peel which is stored for future use. I squeezed the juice and froze in ice block trays, also for future use. I will need all this as I probably won't have lemons next year. **Passionate Gardener, June**

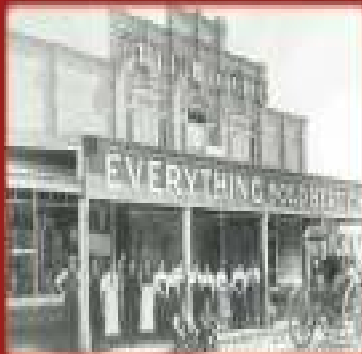

## MARION CARSTEN

A well-known local Marion Carsten passed away on 9 August 2020. Marion was born on the 13 August 1929.

She was married to Brian (dec). She is survived by her children David & Jan, their partners Pauline & Colin and her grandchildren & great grandchild

Marion was very involved in the local community supporting many organisations.

Brownie Leader, Brown Owl, from 1948 to 1954.  
District Commissioner 1972-1977

Badge assessors - (for many years) she assessed the Australiana, Collector, Cook, Hostess, House Orderly, Safety in the Home and Hobby badges.

Marion Carstens was presented with her badge for 40 years' Service to Guiding in 1990. It was presented in the form of a 'Mystery Parcel Prize', the winner being Marion. She was also honoured to receive her 50 years of Service to Guiding Badge.

In 2010 the History of Guiding book was published and Marion shared some memories:

A Brownie Pack began in 1948 when a very nervous Brown Owl and six excited girls met Miss Aspinall, the NSW Brownie Advisor at the Log Cabin where the first Holbrook Brownie Pack was formed, then before long another twelve girls were enrolled. Many happy and noisy Brownie days were held, lots of challenges met and fun sharing our talents. Brownies were very restricted

in our activities in those days, as we were following the British Handbook for Brownies. We were not allowed to march on Anzac Day, only walk on the footpath. Camping out and hiking were not permitted. When the Australian Handbook was accepted, Brownies were able to enjoy outdoor activities. Rallies & Revels were always a fun day especially if we travelled away to meet other girls and leaders were able to share their ideas.

We were very fortunate to travel to Wagga Wagga to see Her Majesty the Queen and Prince Phillip. Also to see Lady Baden-Powell and meet lots of other Brownies from our Division.

I have always enjoyed my visits to the Brownie Pack for their special occasions and Promise Ceremonies, also helping with the testing for some of the badges. Hopefully the girls who made their Promise will try to remember to do a 'Good turn every day'.

Marion was also involved in other organization over the years including the Log Cabin Trust, the Commander Holbrook Scholarship Trust and the Holbrook Red Cross

## BILLABONG HIGH

Secondary English is the study of literature and communication. Our main aim is to build in students a thorough understanding of the English Textual Concepts, such as, perspective, argument, authority, intertextuality, symbolism and literary value. We are also explicitly teaching student processes such as how to engage personally and critically with literature and how to experiment with, and reflect on, language and context. These skills are essential in a modern world where students are bombarded daily with textual messages and are continuously being positioned and asked to respond to a large amount of information. The deeper an individual's understanding of the way textual form, language and imagery can shape communication, the stronger their ability to navigate modern society and to make sound decisions.

An example of how we embed the explicit teaching of these concepts and processes across the junior courses is Year 9 students are experimenting with camera shots and angles to create a short scene about an outsider.

Meals on Wheels NSW CEO, Les MacDonald says "National Meals on Wheels day recognises the outstanding contribution of our wonderful volunteers, who ensure older Australians remain nourished and safe at home every day. It has been an uncertain last 12 months, with bushfire devastation and now COVID-19. We offer gratitude and thanks to all of our 35,000 volunteers in NSW, and the growing band of individuals and organisations that have come on board who continue to support us. Their efforts have made us stronger and more focussed than ever, and today we celebrate their contribution to our service".

During the COVID-19 pandemic, the Federal Government provided vital additional funding which allowed Meals on Wheels services to continue delivering nutritious meals to an increased number of vulnerable members of the community - Our service has seen an approximately 50% increase in service demand since March.
