

The day was a huge success with beautiful weather and participation levels high. It was great to see so many students encouraging and supporting others having a go. Well done, HPS!

Last Friday, Years 1, 3/4 and 5/6 had their first Bluearth session with coach Teigan Pearson. Bluearth is a program that aims to improve health and wellbeing by making movement a part of everyday life. It engages every participant,

regardless of their abilities. The staff of HPS can vouch for this after participating in their own Bluearth session on one of the Staff Development Days this year. Teigan had all staff engaged, moving, puffing and even laughing during the session; sore knees and all!

The staff at Holbrook PS are extremely excited about the year ahead, with many new initiatives, grants and projects on the horizon. We have 152 wonderful students to begin the school year and a staff of 24 teachers and support staff to help them thrive.

It was great to receive news over the holiday period that we were successful in attaining two NSW Government grants; a \$5,000 grant for a Sustainable Garden Project, and approximately \$25,000 for a new Sports Court Upgrade.

The NSW Department of Education has also provided us with significant additional funds to support students whose learning was adversely affected due to COVID-19 in 2020.


And whilst COVID-19 Guidelines are in place it was wonderful to see so many parents/Carers/



PLANT PICK PLATE

The inclusion of fruit trees in a not only provide delicious fruity treats but from a design prospective they also shade, balance structure to a garden. In many



house yards today room is at a premium so it is important to position your tree to allow for growth with ample surrounding space for air flow to reduce disease as the tree matures. However, if you are like me and want to grow everything, apples, stone fruit, pear, citrus and more then dwarf varieties and multi grafted trees are the answer.

Dwarf varieties can be grown in a small corner of the yard and some, especially the citrus flourish in large pots. With multi grafted fruit trees you can have all those delicious fruity treats as two or more varieties are grown on the one plant, eq: the fruit salad tree. The issue of planting compatible pollinators, as with apples which require two trees, is eliminated with dual grafting on one plant. Cultivars are available that will suit your climate and position.

Although, be aware that all is not what it seems when it comes to fruiting trees. My young dwarf Pink Lady which I planted a few years ago has never produced these sweet pink apples. Rather, it produces sweet golden/green fruit. Initially I thought it was my neglect with incorrect fertilization, or lack thereof. But NO. The varieties of Lady William and Golden Delicious were crossbred to develop the Pink Lady cultivar. My plant has obviously thrown to the Golden Delicious.

Now, while the fruit trees are producing succulent, juicy apricots, nectarines, peaches and summer citrus with crisp new season apples and pears being harvested soon, make note of the fruity treats you would like to have in your garden, for planting in the cooler months.

BUILDING A DAM!

Over the last few weeks we've had a small trickle of water emerge in the playground, from broken pipe under the ground, and so ever so slowly, a large puddle has developed which has us many given SO opportunities for learning. What fun we



have had exploring the properties of water and mud! So many of the children are familiar with the use of real excavators and diggers and used their knowledge to build creeks and dams, using the water and dirt and our own trucks and diggers, and we heard children using some amazing language – "gooey", "ohh gross!!" "that feels so good" as they played together. We also marvelled in the play that we saw in all age groups, and celebrated the way that the children drew on their own experiences to create the 'Holbrook Lake' in the sandpit.

This week we needed to call on the assistance of plumbers to attend to a leaky pipe under the ground because the water began to build up a little too much! The children looked on eagerly watching them work and fix the leak. We've started to see the water slowly seep away which has had everyone talking about the disappearing water and where it might have gone. The learning framework that guides out practices with children, The Early Years Learning Framework talks about taking these unexpected moments to extend and expand children's knowledge. We've explored maths, science and technology, used our imaginations and worked collaboratively to create rich learning opportunities for the children. One day he said to me, "the ministry of a priest is to comfort the disturbed and disturb the comfortable." Another time Clive said; "The church is full of the mad, the bad, the sad and the glad, you have to work our which person is what, and minister to them all," Clive's words have proven to be very sound.

The thing I ask myself is, "which one am I." I have resolved that I, and everyone else, are all of these things at one time or another. One of the wonderful things that surprise me is when I discover that I have stopped ministering to others and they have been ministering to me. I guess that makes everyone a minister to each other, but only Jesus can minister to all of us, that is why we need Him.

I often say, "my desire as a Priest is to make myself redundant." I say this because one day I will be gone, but people and Jesus will still be here. People need people and all people need Jesus because everyone needs disturbing or comforting, and we all qualify to be the mad, the

bad, the sad, and the glad. The problem with being human is that we are good at hiding our feelings and we stop people and Jesus from ministering to us.

The age of, "the stiff upper British lip" i.e., not showing your feelings, has passed." We have to be honest and reverse the old nursery rhyme that goes, "sticks and stones will break my bones but names will never hurt me." The truth is that we do get hurt and names people call us hurt us, and we hurt them. We all need to be disturbed, comforted, own our feelings, and minister to each other with the love of Jesus.




