HOLBROOK LANDCARE

The major works for the weed control in the **Ian Geddes Bush Reserve** recently by Soil Conservation Service and their subcontractors. The few instream willows, box elder and privets were removed with the cut-and-paint method. The stems are cut and the stump poisoned (with frog-friendly Glysophate). This leaves the root systems in place – very important on waterways because all vegetation has a role in bank stabilisation. The root ball will slowly die and give time for other things to take its place.

The trees that had fallen in over the past couple of years were assessed for risk. Large woody debris in a stream is a GOOD thing, but in this situation it was thought that realigning the timber along the bank would reduce the risk of future flood debris catching and causing erosion and damage to the downstream bridge. Large woody debris in the stream bed can actually aid stability over time and create habitat for fish and other aquatic animals, so the fact it is now in the bed is a good thing, even if it moves a little bit. We look forward to some flow returning to the creek and some more planting of the banks and aquatic species.

The next jobs are to tackle the ivy & blackberries, and keep on top of the seedling weed trees. We hope to organise another Working Bee soon.

A couple of Squirrel Gliders were spotted in the reserve during works and there are more nest boxes on the way for them to be put up this week. The bat boxes in the reserve are favoured by the Squirrel Gliders as the others put up by Transport NSW back in 2017 have larger holes and are all occupied by Brush Tailed Possums. The only trees removed were exotic trees, but we think the removal of the privets in one section might have scared them out of a hole.

The Refreshing Rivers initiative is a 10-year project of Local Land Services, in collaboration with Holbrook Landcare, and is focused on improving the health of waterways and surrounding habitats for some of our iconic species like the Southern Pygmy Perch.

Hume Freeway Soil Testing: A couple of weeks ago, Steph and Nick were back soil testing along the edge of the Hume Freeway in Albury.

This time last year they tested the soil in several failed revegetation sites along the freeway and provided recommendations to remediate.

Late last year a 'trial area' was treated and ripped and we were engaged this time around to see how things are progressing in the treated area. A penetrometer was used to measure compaction down to a depth of 1.5m, and they collected soil samples for chemical analysis down to a depth of 60cm.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS ABOUT ST PATRICK'S PRIMARY SCHOOL

For all other subject areas, our Infants students come together as one class and Primary the other.

St Patrick's has a generous staffing allocation that allows us to keep our student-to-teacher ratio low. This in turn leads to effective teaching and learning occurring in all of our classrooms.

We thank them most sincerely for their contribution to our museum.



COUNTRY MAYORS WELCOMES REPORT ON RFS ASSETS

Mayor Rick Firman *OAM*, Chairman of the NSW Country Mayors Association (CMA) has welcomed the release of the Public Accounts Committee's inquiry into the Assets, Premises and Funding of the NSW Rural Fire Service.

The Inquiry, undertaken to examine whether the current frameworks governing assets, premises and funding for the RFS remained appropriate, effective and sustainable, released its muchanticipated report this week.

"Local Government has long complained that the way that fire fighting assets are managed in NSW no longer reflects on-ground reality. Most residents are not aware that virtually all RFS assets and equipment from fire trucks to sheds, are actually owned by their local council and not the RFS. Further they are not aware that even though councils own the assets, carry them on their books and are responsible for their maintenance, we have absolutely no control over them. In most cases councils do not even have a key to the RFS sheds they own and maintain" Mayor Firman said.

The matter has come to a head in recent years, when the depreciation of the RFS equipment has hit council finances hard. The CMA, LGNSW, Joint Organisations, Regional Organisations of Councils and councils across the State have lobbied hard for what has become known as the "Red Fleet" to be removed from council asset registers and transferred to where they belong, the RFS.

The Public Accounts Committee found that the current arrangements where the RFS exercise operational control over the Red Fleet but ownership rests with councils has created substantial inefficiencies. administrative duplication, legal ambiguity and audit complications. The Committee's Report states that it received no evidence supporting the continuation of councils' ownership of the Red Fleet.

"The CMA Board and Members strongly supports the Committee's assessment of the current arrangements and we warmly welcome its recommendation that the *Rural Fires Act* be amended to recognise that the RFS owns and operates the Red Fleet" Mayor Firman said.

The recommendation is one of 14 made by the

Committee which will result in updating the 1997 Rural Fires Act to better reflect the way that the RFS operates and bushfires are managed in 2025.

"The CMA Board and Members extend our appreciation to the Inquiry Chairman, Mr Jason Yat-Sen Li MP, Member for Strathfield and the Committee members for their genuine commitment to engage with local government on this matter and find a sustainable pathway forward." Mayor Firman said.

The CMA has written to the Minister for Emergency Services, Hon Jihad Dib MP to strongly encourage the Government to adopt and implement the Committee's recommendations ahead of the 25/26 Bushfire season. We

"The situation with the Red Fleet has festered for far too long, The Committee has put clear recommendations forward to resolve the situation and Local Government is looking forward to seeing all stakeholders moving together support implementation of the the recommendations as swiftly as possible. We welcome the support we have received for the Inquiry from the Minister for Local Government. Hon Ron Hoenig MP and the NSW Treasurer, Hon Daniel Mookhey MLC" Mayor Firman said.

"The CMA Board and Members strongly support the work of the RFS and its thousands of volunteers who constantly put their lives on the line to make our communities safer. Our CMA members will continue to work constructively with the RFS particularly in the areas of mitigation, vegetation management and providing resources like earthmoving equipment and road closures when emergencies occur" Mayor Firman said.


