Mt Maze hits the road!

So how did Mt. Maze come about?

Nick Musarra (rhythm guitar) and Shane Ellwood (bass) had met the Tollis Brothers through high school. Nathan (Drums) joined with Nick and Shane after graduation and started playing a few house parties in a band together.

Adam (Vocals) was trying to start a band after moving home from London, putting up flyers and ads on social media to find members. Grady Nigsch (lead guitar) responded to a flyer and started jamming with Adam. They went on to record a single together which hasn't yet been released.

Towards the end of COVID, all 5 boys decided to get together for a jam and they just clicked!

Forming in early 2022, they gained confidence performing at Sodens open mic nights in Albury, and from there the gigs came rolling in from Melbourne to Wollongong. They have been rubbing shoulders with some of Australia's big contemporary bands, such as Kingswood and Smith Street Band, playing opening gigs for both.

Adam tells a story of note: "We got a call up one Saturday around lunch time, to support a Melbourne band at the iconic music venue, Cherry Bar. So, at 2pm, we all jumped into Mum and Dads Prado, making it to Melbourne just in time for sound check. We played the gig, went to China town for some dumplings and drove home. Very random trip, but a lot of fun."

The boys say that their main influences are primarily built up of contemporary bands such as Ocean Alley, Skeggs, and Letters to Lions, "but we have covered an old Aussie Crawl tune."



The groups interest in different styles of music is what helps them to hone their specific sound. Having input from all members of the band brings a variety of writing styles and musical composition. Techniques from metal to folk are used by the boys to greater enhance their sound, which is becoming more and more popular as they grow and develop their fan base.



"I think that's what makes us a little different as a band. We're all into different music which makes the writing process pretty fun".

Mt Maze are currently supporting Tassie legends, Lennon Wells, on their Need To Feel Something tour through NSW & TAS and possibly Vic. This has given the band an opportunity to play at some iconic music venues such as La La La's in Wollongong and the Sydney Oxford Art Factory.

Mt. Maze have released 5 singles to date; Fool For You, Sweet Escape, Wasteland, Silver Rings, and their latest, Run To Me, which came out the week of the tour.

The band have recorded all current releases through Simon McKenna in Albury. Simon's attention to detail with producing and tracking, gave the lads the push in the right direction that they needed, to bring the quality

of their music to a high standard. Simon brings a wealth of knowledge to the group and gives the boys in depth and professional focus throughout the recording process.

With no sign of slowing down, the boys are working towards tracking an EP and many more singles for our listening pleasure.

"We're definitely keen to get back into the studio"

Keep an eye out for these Gents as they obviously have a big future in Music. They will no doubt be appearing at a venue near you at some stage.

Look out for their 'Mt. Mazemobile'!

"We've built a band bus out of two broken down Tarago's to get us around to future gigs."



Sold Out Performance



Launch of Life Force program prompts action on prostate cancer in Jindera



The Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia has



officially launched **Life Force**, a prostate cancer awareness program championed by community volunteers, including Greg Finster in Jindera.

Prostate cancer is now the most diagnosed cancer in Australia and the most common cancer among Australian men.

More than 24,000 men are diagnosed with prostate cancer each year, with 1 in 5 men diagnosed by age 85.

Through PCFA's Life Force program, local businesses and community organisations will have the opportunity to welcome a trained community speaker like Greg on site, to present on prostate cancer symptoms, diagnosis and treatment.

When detected early, prostate cancer is easier to treat and easier to beat, with survival rates at nearly 100 per cent for stage one diagnoses.

Greg spoke to his decision to participate in Life Force as a prostate cancer survivor. "Public awareness of prostate cancer saves lives through early detection which is why I decided to join the Life Force program," he said. "I am one of the men diagnosed every 22 minutes in Australia and my own experience with the disease has motivated me to speak out about men's health. Alongside fellow volunteers from across the country, I will be visiting local businesses and community organisations to give people the chance to learn life-saving information on symptoms, diagnosis and treatment options. I encourage you to reach out and book in a presentation today – you could help save another life."

PCFA CEO, Anne Savage, said that the launch of Life Force is key to the organisation's mission. "The Life Force program will help us reduce the burden of prostate cancer for all Australians, mobilising the community to drive research, prevention and early detection, improved treatment, and world-class psychosocial care," she said.

"Our team of dedicated and passionate community speakers are activating and motivating workplaces and community groups to play their part in helping to make prostate cancer history. There has never been a more important time to prioritise health and wellbeing in the workplace and in the community."

The museum is continuing to work on having the blacksmith yard and sheds open in September. A new access system will be installed and exit will be by the side gate. Many of the buggies and sulkies used for transportation have been relocated to this site and a wonderful collection of items from the property 'Wyseworth' near Howlong, will be on display in the old stables. We will have new information boards showing aspects of the wheelwrighting trade that was conducted in the blacksmith, along with the hot and heavy blacksmith work conducted in the forge.

The grant received from the Federal Government through the office of Sussan Ley has been used to purchase a selection of tools for the Tim Fischer shed. This saves those who get together to undertake this work, having to bring their own tools to repair and modify many of the machines we have on display.

The school holiday period saw many families venture out to the museum, a great place to spend a few hours when there are limited things to do in this cold time of the year. A round trip to the museum, then taking in Wirramina at Burrumbuttock & then on to Morgans Lookout at Walla Walla takes a full day & is ensured to use up a good deal of energy. We have seen lots of grandparents with children this month as well as visitors from all over NSW and Victoria and a smattering of further afield visitors.

We had a successful Heritage Dinner early last

month, with a new collection of guests along with a few regular attendees to our functions. The entertainment provided by John-Paul on the fiddle was outstanding, with guests revelling in his wonmusic and derful Irish brogue. With a range of heaters, we were able to keep guests warm for the evening, which is quite a feat in our notoriously cold vestibule.



Without regular heating, the cold seeps into every corner of the museum buildings until they long for the start of the Spring weather and the return to some warmth. The **Tea Room** has remained extremely busy, even though we haven't had very pleasant weather for

- Another meeting took place at the Hueske Rd bus stop last week involving Justin Clancy, two members from the Dept of Transport, a couple of parents and myself. This dangerous situation had been raised at the Local Traffic Committee meeting. The Dept. of Transport will be investigating ways to improve matters which may involve a bus route and pickups in Glenholm Estate.
- What was also very concerning to us all was the number of vehicles who are not slowing down at that intersection when a bus has pulled over at the bus stop and has it's lights flashing and then overtake. The rule is to slow down to 40kph when passing a stationery bus.

Does your volunteer group need up to \$5000 cash?

Farrer MP Sussan Ley has announced new small-grant funding for her electorate through a new round of the Australian Government's Volunteer Grants program.

A total of \$10 million is being allocated nationwide with amounts from \$1,000 to \$5,000 awarded to eligible not-forprofit groups after a local community committee and department assessment process. Ms Ley said the grants can be used to upgrade or buy new equipment, cover the cost of a training course or screening check, funds for eligible transport needs, and for activities which help increase volunteer numbers and participation with your group.

Last year 24 organisations in Farrer were successful, using their cash to buy work tools, a defibrillator, sending volunteers off to a first-aid course, purchasing a new mower, laptop and iPads, even to find some new bench seats. The idea is to help strengthen and support volunteer organisations, which in turn improves social outcomes and the wellbeing of our local communities.

Funding is capped at the same amount for each federal electorate, with eligibility, criteria details and expressions of interest (EOI) forms available by the links below, contacting Sussan's electorate office or through her website www.sussanley.com. EOIs close 31 August 2023.

DONKEYS ARE FUN

Several years ago Wayne and Betty Coulthard of Jindera went to buy one donkey for their children to ride around their 40 acre farm. They were so taken with them that they came home with four, and have been breeding donkeys successfully ever since, at times running up to 15 of them. At present they have 3 jennies, their foals, and 1 jack.

The foals are sold at around 10 months of age, and the Coulthards say they have no trouble disposing of them when the time comes. Betty believes this is because small children will readily make friends with a donkey and feel confident with it, even if they are frightened of ponies, because of the donkey's greater affinity with people. They are naturally friendly and inquisitive, and children relate easily to this. Children can progress from riding a donkey to a pony, as the principles are the same.

Donkeys are sometimes used to train bulls to lead for the showring, where they must be quiet and easy to handle. The young bull is tied to a quiet old donkey, usually a jenny, who, unperturbed, leads the bull by the nose wherever she wants to go. Thus the bull is taught to lead and because donkeys love people, he learns to associate with people.



The Coulthards say their donkeys do not have to be broken in. From the earliest stages the foals are handled, stroked, their feet picked up, and generally taught to respond to and co-operate with people. Consequently, they only need to be mouthed and they are ready to ride.

Donkeys apparently are also easier to feed than horses, as they will do well on feed not suitable for mares and foals, and graze well in conjunction with other stock, such as cattle, cleaning up what they leave. In other respects, such as drenching for worms and vaccinating against diseases, such as tetanus, they are similar to horses in husbandry practice, although they are generally more sensible about fences.

There are several breeds of donkey, and the Coulthards run mainly the 'Jerusalem' type with its distinctive crucifix mark, and a 'Spanish' type which is darker in colour. Betty says that in all the time they have been breeding donkeys they have never come across a 'bad' or 'nasty' one.

The Coulthards obviously enjoy their donkeys immensely and are very enthusiastic about them. After meeting their gentle and friendly animals it is easy to understand why.

Lamb shanks

This is an easy and hearty Italian recipe for those chilly wintery weekends. A great alternative to your traditional Sunday roast.

What you need

- Lamb shanks (4 large or 8 small)
- A few tablespoons of plain flour (gluten free flour is fine)
- Olive oil
- Salt and pepper
- 1 brown onion
- 1 carrot
- 1 stalk of celery

- 1-2 cloves of garlic (optional)
- 500 ml of premade stock
- Oregano and thyme (fresh or dried)
- 1 or 2 400-ml cans of tomatoes
- 2 tablespoons of tomato paste
- Glass of wine (red or white) or 1 bottle or can

What to do

Coat shanks in flour, salt, and pepper. Brown on a moderately high heat for a few minutes on each side on your stove top. Use your Dutch oven or heavy based casserole dish, or fry in a frying pan and then transfer to your crockpot / slow cooker. Set shanks aside.

Dice the carrot, celery, onion, garlic, and thyme. Fry in olive oil in your pot or pan on the stove top. Fry for five to ten minutes until soft and golden. Add oregano and cook for a further three to five minutes.

Add stock, tomato, tomato paste and wine or beer. Reduce heat and simmer for around 10 more minutes to thicken. Add the shanks back into the pot and make sure all the meat is covered by the sauce.

Cover with baking paper or foil or place a lid on your pot.

Cook in a moderate (170^C) oven or on high in your slow cooker for 3 or 4 hours. Lamb should be tender and fall away from the bone easily.

Garnish with rosemary sprigs (if desired). Serve with creamy polenta or mash potato.

Mr. White has given us just a touch of information so that we can do our own research to learn more about the Murray Darling basin plan and its management of water and possible effects on us all.

Neil Meyer thanked Tom White for his information and presented him with our Probus pen as a token of our appreciation.

Memberships are due now.....


