Homelessness... close to home

Over the past year RCL have been involved with an increasing number of people who have become homeless. This is very disturbing, and has



been a challenge in many ways for us to try and assist these people.

As mortgage interest rates continue to increase, rental properties are becoming more expensive, and people experiencing financial hardship really struggle to find suitable accommodation that they can afford.

The demand for emergency accommodation appears to be very high, as RCL have on many occasions made contact with NSW Housing, Link 2 Home and Yes Unlimited in an attempt to find emergency accommodation. We have phoned countless Motels and Cabin Parks who advertise that they hold rooms for crisis accommodation, only to be told that there is nothing available, or they are priced so high that the person can't afford to stay there for any beneficial period of time.

Often people who are experiencing displacement have a pet, which also adds to their difficulty securing a rental. This is disappointing, as for some of these people, their pet is often their only family at that time.

Another challenge for clients in our area, is that they may wish to stay local, due to children in school or their work or transport situation for example, but affordable accommodation often means having to live in Lavington or Albury.

We have, in the past, had some wonderfully generous locals come forward, who offered up their Granny Flat to temporarily house a person who had become homeless. This gesture made such a world of difference for this person, who was able to keep their little dog with them, and was less anxious and more able to think clearly and take the

necessary steps to eventually find a permanent place to live.

If you are in a position to help someone in this way, whether you have a Granny Flat, or a well developed Man Cave, or some form of self contained accommodation that is not being used on a permanent basis, we would love it if you would consider going on a register with us, for the purpose of offering crisis accommodation to someone in need.

It is hard to say how long a person may need to stay, but from experience so far, just 3-4 weeks can make a huge difference to someone, who may be currently living in their car and moving around to free camps, and at this time of year, that is a horrible experience for them. Just to be able to sleep safe and warm, to be able to shower, wash their clothes, make some food, and keep their phone charged, means that they can continue applying for rentals, work, etc., instead of every day being taken up with just surviving.

Rural Care Link Inc. reaches out to anyone who may be able to offer this type of support, and we guarantee discreet and professional handling of your details.

So whether you are able to help us, or we are able to help you in some way, the number to call is **0475 594 073**. The phone is manned continuously, so messages will be replied to promptly.

Meet Another Committee Member



Hi. My name is Vickie Priscina and my role is

Carer Support Group Coordinator.

A little about my working life and my commitment to "make a difference".

My Career in the Welfare field began at Woodstock Residential Care Centre, Lavington in the early 80's. This was a time when parents of Children born with disabilities were encouraged by Medical Professionals to place their Children into care. As a Residential Care Worker I cared for up to 8 Children in a Unit that was their Home. All children were totally dependent. It was an honour to be part of their lives everyday.

I formed Limb Kids Vic/ Tas after our first baby was born with a limb deficiency. Through sponsorship, Children and their Parents were flown to Sydney to attend the Paralympic Games. This was one of the happiest occasions I have ever witnessed where young people made lifelong connections with the Paralympians that they saw compete. I am proud to say also that through a grant from the Paul Newman Foundation a group of Families and mentors, including Paralympians, attended a 2 day Camp at Lake Hume. This made a huge difference to the young people with limb loss as well as their Parents and siblings.

After a break to look after my Children and be

involved in School activities, I returned to work at Cooinda Family Support Group. Here I organised social activities and Education sessions for Families of Children with disabilities. Some of the most memorable times were Family Camps, Fashion Parades to celebrate International Day of People with a Disability, Respite trips away for Mothers, Fathers, Siblings, Couples. It certainly was a fun job where we got to think "out of the box" in ways to offer support. While there I contributed to a book entitled "Capability Dialogues" it documents my story of having a child with a disability as well as many other Albury/ Wodonga people. A lot of my work required promotion and interviews with local media, for this I received a national award from "Bar None" for inclusiveness and excellence in promoting disability issues in a positive manner. At Cooinda I also had the role of Play Group Facilitator, offering Parents of Children with disabilities a supportive environment to bring their little ones and talk with others who had similar issues, enjoying some respite while the Play Worker offered activities.

Following on from this I worked at Carer Assist as a Carer Advocate. This job enabled me to help Families of people with a Mental Illness with emotional support and education. I worked closely with the staff of the Albury Hospital to help people through some very challenging and distressing times. During my time in this role I was for being commended able to advance the relationships between medical professionals, families and patients. I delivered Education Sessions on all aspects of Mental Illness, this knowledge for people was very powerful in their caring role, allowing them to understand and become better advocates.

I remain passionate about issues that affect people facing adversity. Being part of Rural Care Link gives me the opportunity to continue making a difference.

Jindera lass Lily Delahunty 'wired' for success!

Jindera's Lily Delahunty is proving a bright spark in the autoelectrical trade through her apprenticeship with local business **NA Auto**.

The 18-year-old born and bred local lass, who plays netball for Jindera, is the only female in her TAFE automotive electrician course at Wagga.

It doesn't worry the second-year apprentice one bit. "I reckon it is a male-dominated industry but I really don't care," she says. Lily adds that she's never really been into "girly girly things".

Her parents Melanie and Allan, together with her brothers Thomas, 15, and Jack, 10 always thought she might get into a trade, she says.

In an interview with the Border Mail recently, she mentioned she'd just spent the weekend four-wheel driving with her grandfather Neville Power, some mates and a few of their family's neighbours up Mitta way.

Lily dreams of travelling 'round Australia - in a four-wheel drive, of course; she's pretty proud of the Suzuki Jimny she saved for and bought brand new. "I'm going to get a bull-bar and put some driving lights on it soon," she explains.

Her "hard-working" and "inquisitive" nature has been a welcome addition to the family run **NA Auto**.

It was in Year 12 that Lily "hit a bit of a downfall" and knew she didn't want to be at school anymore. She'd done some work experience with a local electrician and liked the tradie environment. "It was really interesting and I loved meeting new people," she explains.

Lily went online and applied for a few jobs and, by sheer luck, an auto-electrical job came up at Jindera.

NA Auto's Kathy Anderson recalls it was "an amazing coincidence" that Lily applied just at the right time; and of course, they were thrilled to find a local who fit the bill.

It didn't hurt that there was also a connection between the Andersons and Lily's grandmother Deb Delahunty.

Robert Anderson, 25, says the family had no reservations about hiring a girl in what is a male-dominated field. "I know it's not considered an inclusive industry but there's never been a barrier here I'd like to think," he says. "Lily came for a week of work experience and was far more capable than any of the young men we've had. She's got an inquisitive nature and our job requires a genuine interest because we work on things that are not always seen."

And while Lily admits she "still has a lot to learn", she reckons she knows a "fair bit more about cars" than many boys - and girls - her age. "My bosses (Neil and Robert) are always sending me things to read and they take the time to explain things," she says.

As for whether girls could well have the upper hand when it comes to performance in the workshop? "Girls weigh the risks - you're not jumping the gun all the time," she says.



JINDERA - THE IDEAL ENVIRONMENT

Lillian and Geoff Ralph found Jindera not only to provide the ideal spot behind the museum for their concept of an environment oriented house, but also to provide some of the materials. Mud to be used for the rammed bricks was anduired from the surrounds of a local quarry and the hand made clay bricks from Jindera's old bakery will be used for their fireplace and woodstove. The Ralphs are very keen to reproduce the nineteenth century look of their surroundings and they have been very successful in acquiring some unique materials. Some of the timbers from the old Albury wooden bridge will be used for the frame. Doors with leadlighting were acquired from a house being demolished in Albury. Many trips to local clearing sales have provided other leadlight features and old timber mantelpieces. They are living onsite in a caravan and will be building the house themselves. The little 80 year old cottage on the block will be restored to be used by Lillian as a craft workshop. They start building soon and when they move into the house next summer will have the satisfaction of having built and designed their own concept which will blend easily with the surroundings and take full savantage of the insulation properties of mud brick.

Also in Jindera are mud brick accommodated ducks and geese. Their story will be in a future issue.



The museum can be a cold place during these winter

months, but our **Tea Room** on a Sunday is always a cozy spot to have lunch or a treat of cake or scones. The Tea Room continues to be a popular stop on a Sunday for regulars and passing traffic, of which there is a lot lately as many of the "gray nomads" head northward to escape the cold months in these southern parts of the country.



Many of our regular members also head north for the winter and we find our volunteer base rather depleted. If you have some spare time we always welcome new members to boost our volunteer base and to help with many of the jobs that are a constant here.

Our working bee this last month was well attended and we are getting closer to opening the blacksmith site on a regular basis. The stables are being fitted out with items from a property in the district that has been operating since land moved from the squatters to private acquisition. The owners have collected items across the property for all of this time and we have an interesting collection to display.



The blacksmith yard has been cleared and some additional items will be added over the next few months. There is always cleaning to be done, thanks to our possum population, but the site is looking good now that the loads of autumn leaves have been cleared. We have purchased some fabulous screens for the fences depicting old

photographs of the blacksmith site and we hope to install a photographic history of the kinds of work that were carried out in the blacksmith. It has been decided to leave the opening of the site until September when the weather is a little kinder and hopefully, dryer.

Our Heritage Dinners feature this month on Friday 7th and Saturday 8th July (see page 16). Tickets are still available from Trybooking. The Jindera Theatrical Society will supply a teaser to the full production of 'The Importance of being Earnest' which they will perform later in July. The first act will be performed prior to the dinner on Friday evening and acclaimed Irish singer and perform John-Paul Sweeney will perform prior to dinner on the Saturday.

Heritage dinners have been a feature at the museum since the museum opened back in 1968 when a large Heritage festival was held each year — Heritage week provided the opportunity to acknowledge the European settlement in many areas and was celebrated with varying festivities across the state. The museum ran heritage dinners which feature all of the trappings of a Victorian style dinner of the time. Even your attendants are dressed in period style and the evening also features some of the idiosyncrasies of dinning during this time. This provides a step back into this period of time that is not available anywhere else locally.

During these quieter months we are working on changing some of the exhibitions within the museum. Many clothing and fabric items that are on display need to be changed regularly as they deteriorate in the light and changing temperatures. Our dedicated curator, Chris, overseas these changes and the donations which we continue to receive. This is a very time consuming job as items need to be packed and stored correctly to ensure their preservation.

There is always something new and interesting to see at the museum and we continue to look for ways to improve and increase the interest.

In August we intend to put on a bush dance at the local School of Arts hall as this provides a great venue for us during the winter months when we are limited by our indoor and undercover areas and the cold. More details will follow in the next edition of Jindera News.







This term, year 1's PBL question was "How can we make new students feel more welcome at St John's?". Here are some photos of their showcase!






Quiz Worx Puppet Show






