
JINDERA PRE-SCHOOL NEWS


DIATE

Our local newspaper celebrates the publication of 300 EDITIONS

The original name of our newspaper was Jindera Jottings, then after some years it was known as Rural Rack and finally it was renamed Jindera News, as it is known today. This local newspaper has been contributing to the Jindera community for around 40 years with some gaps over these many years when it was unable to be produced.

The dawning of a community newsletter for Jindera took place on the 1st May 1982 when the first issue was circulated in the village. The issues were hand delivered around the village and some placed in the General Store/Post Office.

It was brought into being by a few locals, Stephanie Klein, Dianne McElwaine, Lee Howard and myself Jean Lowndes, who met at my house earlier that year to discuss how and whether, it would be possible to produce a local newsletter.

The group would meet at someone's house and using a typewriter, type up notes received from the different community groups.

These local groups included the Pony Club, Museum, Pre-School, Public School, St Johns School, Brownies/Girl Guides, Bush Fire Brigade, Senior Citizens Club and the churches, to name a few.

Members came and went but the Jindera Jottings continued to come out at the beginning of each month. The Hume Shire Council made a modest donation and usually provided access to their photocopier for printing, or when needed, generously one of the members ran it off at their Albury business. In those days such ventures were very much 'handmade' affairs, with cut and paste. A 20c donation was asked for each copy! It wasn't a profitmaking affair. Hard work, goodwill, enthusiasm and interest in contributing to the life of a community were the driving forces.

A copy of the Jindera Jottings is under the Bicentennial stone outside the 'Turk's Head' in Albury along with the book 'Jindera A Village and Its People'. This was also produced entirely with local input. In those days Jindera was a smaller community with families who were more historically connected. Both Lee and Jean still enjoy reading the Jindera community newsletter each month, as they like to know what's happening in Jindera.

There's always something going on in Jindera. I'm talking about the everyday stuff that makes a town tick. Although, forty-one years ago, townsfolk weren't always sure what was on, when it was happening and where it might take

place. It was at this pivotal moment that an enthusiastic band of would-be editors, publishers and others, decided to address the need, instigating the towns very own 'paper' in 1982. In May the first copies of "Jindera Jottings" rolled off the press ... or more accurately,

photocopier. A basic double-sided A3 sheet, folded down the centre to produce a modest, four-page A4 publication, with text prepared via typewriter which was then cut-and-pasted into place.

I considered myself a local lad those days, having recently built our first home opposite the Jindera common on Drumwood Road (the Country Golf Club wasn't there as yet). At that time I was working as a graphic artist at T-Shirt World, Albury and keen to contribute some creative elements to hopefully add some visual interest to our fledgeling publication. These included the cover page masthead and a cartoon strip, just to name a few.

A few months later, the first of my three sons was born and with the extra responsibility and subsequent lack of sleep, I only managed to draw a few more cartoons for Jindera Jottings. A decade later, with a plethora of illustrations, designs and signs under my belt, it was time to launch my own creative design studio, Artmost Graphics.

Then, in 1997 circumstances lead me to a very different location - Sydney's Northern Beaches, where I've been living with my wife Debi ever since. Occasionally, we head down to Albury to visit my mum, sisters and friends.



Recently I took a drive around Jindera and as one would expect much has changed in the ensuing years, yet there still remains a welcoming charm and authenticity of Jinderians which I believe is why so many now call this place their home.

I'm sure the explorers Hamilton Hume and William Hovell, who passed through this area way back in 1824, would give it their 'thumbs-up' too.

Interim President's Report—Presented at AGM on 21st May 2023

My position today as Interim President came about due to the resignation of Jonathon Howard in September who was the RCL president for over 3 years. I would like to thank Jonathon on behalf of the RCL for his dedication to the association and his many hours of being physically present and supportive of the Op Shop and the Office. Jonathon was the driver of the successful publication of the school's 2022 calendar.

Personally, it has been a whirlwind time since stepping into those shoes. It was an honour to be chosen by the committee, however, I can honestly say that I am still learning the extent of my role and responsibilities and the workings of this charitable association. I would like to thank all the committee and Sue Ellen, who have all supported me with honesty and the courage to guide me.

The RCL consists of a group of people who are what I describe as "drivers". That is, they drive the organisation of events and groups, and they do these tasks very well. Without individually naming every person, I will just say a thank you for being the dedicated and committed people who edit and publish our Newsletter, who run and work in our Op who support people in necessitous Shop, circumstances, who coordinate our Carers Group, who have run special events during the year such as the Spring Fling, Jindera Community Garage Sale and the Carers Plus 'Grief and Loss' Workshop. Thank you also to those who administer the compliance, governance, and finances of the association.

RCL is a charity and our aims and objectives have been fulfilled this year by this dedicated band of drivers. We have also made donations of a charitable nature beneficial to the community. These include:

- A top up to the grant for the Spring Fling;
- A donation of \$5,000 to support the School of Arts Hall committee in their quest to maintain this unique space for theatre and events for the people of Jindera;
- A donation to the Jindera Multipurpose Hall of \$10,000 a whole town project which will be a great benefit to all;

- A Donation of \$2,500 to Betty's Place in Albury, who support women and their children in crisis in our region;
- Our annual schools grant donations, to local schools not supported by a service club, who at their discretion, support children in need with uniforms, excursions, school community gardens, etc. \$1000 to the large schools, \$500 to the small schools.

This year we have purchased an Anzac Day Banner which can be used each year to advertise service times, which may have contributed to the increased attendance at both the dawn and morning services.

On behalf of the Jindera Community Forum, RCL has set up a community donations fund account to receive donations towards the installation of Up Lights of trees in the Jindera Village Green. The target is \$7000 and the RCL has donated \$1000 as a show of support from proceeds from the Community Garage Sale.

Since September:

We have dedicated many hours to improving the way we report the minutes of our meetings and communication between committee members.

From an initial grant we ran the community event 'The Spring Fling'- a terrific day of market stalls, interactive games, entertainment and food, resulting in a festive community atmosphere. Special thanks and credit to Sue Ellen for being the main driver of this event who was supported by willing volunteers on the day.

We have researched and sourced a better solution to our storage and Op Shop overflow quandary. Thanks to the Lutheran Church community for the lease of this amazing space.

Installed an information box outside the op shop of emergency services to call when in crisis.

A notable RCL achievement is the setup of the Website by the office. Being able to communicate digitally and the ease of online membership renewals and registrations for the Garage Sale has been fantastic. The website is still a work in progress.

We have unfortunately had to pause the Blue Tree project for now and were unable to continue the schools calendar project this year.

This brings me to sum up, with our plans for 2023:

We have recently flagged the need and are currently scheduling dedicated time to review the governance of the Association.

Strategic Planning is high on our agenda to review the role and responsibilities of each Committee member and Coordinator including Succession Planning. Also, review our Policies and Procedures.

It would be beneficial to record and learn about the history of the RCL. I believe it is important to know where we have come from, what worked, what was tried and didn't work, to be able to move

forward and be the association that supports the actual needs of the people of Jindera and surrounds

today and into the future.

We need to ensure the sustainability and improvement of our Core Business which are the Op Shop, Jindera News, Necessitous Circumstances, Carers Group and Carers Plus, Schools grant, Community Garage Sale and Anzac Day support.

We will review our business and financial structures, prioritize recruitment of new committee members and volunteers, have a donation strategy and put down a Vision for the future.

One of the noticeable realisations during my short tenure, is that a small number of people do an extraordinary amount of work to run our Core Business. Through experience, we have discovered when we've taken on extra events/activities that we have done so with limited numbers. We are now actively looking at ways to calculate our capacity to carry out each task, before commencement of a project or activity.



- The toilet block upgrade next to the skatepark will be ready for use once the power has been connected. The power is related to a trench being dug to connect the proposed BBQ area in the new playground.
- The playground is awaiting the installers from Forpark who have experienced holdups... but any day now!
- Work has been carried out at the swimming pool to fix broken pipes and do other maintenance works.
- Once again Jindera Recreation Reserve has been targeted by thoughtless individuals who graffitied two of the buildings. Investigations are continuing with checking security footage.
- New security cameras will be installed at the skatepark and new playground area. These will also be linked to cameras in the Village Green.
- Concerned parents met with Justin Clancy and myself at the Hueske Rd/Urana Rd intersection bus stop to discuss ways that this can be made safer. It is a very busy and dangerous place early in the morning when children are catching the buses into Albury. Further investigations will take place.
- The levee bank in Jindera St has been reinforced to help alleviate any flooding issues.
- Roadworks and drainage have been carried out at the end of Pioneer Dr.
- Pipe laying and a water valve update/replacement took place at the corner of Molkentin and Urana Rds. This is the beginning of further works to take place in the future.

Over the past two terms, students through the school have engaged in two different learning strands. These have been carefully planned to sequence learning from Kindergarten through to Year Six. During the colder months visitation to the museum drops as people find it less appealing to get out from heated comfort. The museum still offers many wonderful areas to explore, even when the weather is chilly. Being such a large site, there are plenty of displays undercover and many activities that children can still engage in while inside the many dwellings, sheds and galleries the museum has to offer. The **Tea Room** open from 11am each Sunday always provides a welcome place to catch up with family and friends in a cosy atmosphere. The wood fire sets the scene for an enjoyable lunch, morning or afternoon tea, with all items on the menu home-made. The soup varieties are always popular during these colder months, all prepared in different kitchens by our volunteers, so you can be surprised by what's on offer.



During these winter months we try to get on with a few of our larger maintenance jobs that require areas to be closed off or require some more intrusive disturbance. In the last few weeks, the folk from the shed have set up a new wood shed constructed from an old tank. This was a great addition, freeing up some more useful shed space and enabling some roof work to be done on that shed soon.



The Wattle and Daub cottage will also have some roofing work done in the next few weeks, curtailing some leakage onto the mud floor. The main house also needs some gutter repairs and it is hoped we may be able to replace the main shop veranda roof and have the 'Wagners Store' signage redone in the next few months. We will also have erected the new cow bail and fencing in the next few weeks and perhaps at times, we may also have a cow to grace the space.

We continue to work on the blacksmith yard area and had hoped to have an 'opening' of this space in July. With the colder weather, we also see a migration of several of our active volunteers to warmer climates, so we will continue to work on this but we may have to push the opening back a bit.

These are also the months for garden work, pruning, transplanting and establishing. The site can be a bit wet from time to time, so keeping an eye on drainage issues is also important. Fortunately, the colder weather brings less mowing, which is always gratefully appreciated.

July is the month in which we hold our Heritage Dinners; this year they will be held on Friday 7th and

Saturday 8th July. Bookings for these evenings will be open via Trybooking on Monday 5th June. There are limited seats for both these nights (having to be indoors) so if you are interested



in attending, remember to book *Keritage Dinners*

quickly when tickets are

released. This year, the Jindera Theatrical Society will perform before the dinner on Friday evening and on Saturday there will be a special performance of Irish fiddling by John-Paul Sweeney (some may have seen him on St Patricks day). These performances precede a three course dinner with all the embellishments of the Victorian era.

The museum has recently heard they will be the recipients of a small grant for tools for the machinery shed group, courtesy of the Federal Government Building Stronger Communities Grant. The red shed is developing into a great place for local engine enthusiasts to gather on a Wednesday morning and sometimes, as well as tinkering with machines, some necessary job, or piece of maintenance, is accomplished - like the new wood shed. We are pleased that the grant process saw fit to award this grant to the men's shed at the museum.

We're almost halfway through the year and so far, it's packed a punch! Not only are our students thriving through our academic curriculum, we are also focusing on students' emotional and mental health through 'Restorative Practices'. We've also had a lot of fun through all three sporting events and our senior primary students making the most of their camps in Term 2!

St John's is a Restorative Practices school. Our staff have recently participated in refresher professional development and our whole school will focus on Restorative Practices this term. As a Christian school, these practices help us put God's love into practice to build meaningful connections with each other.

What are Restorative Practices?

Restorative Practices acknowledge that harm is caused when our school expectations for behaviour and respect are not followed, creating a need for healing and restored relationships. They go hand-in-hand with our school positive behaviour approach, including teaching students that there are consequences for actions.

Restorative Practices

Restorative Conversations

When harm has been caused, our leaders, teachers and learning coaches use the following **WARM** conversation format:

What happened?

How were others <u>A</u>ffected? (E.g. feelings hurt, being disrespected)

How can we $\underline{\mathbf{R}}$ estore relationships and $\underline{\mathbf{R}}$ epair hurt?

How can we $\underline{\mathbf{M}}$ ove forward from here and what will happen if it occurs again?

These conversations can happen incidentally in class or the playground or can be conducted formally by staff or members of the Leadership Team, depending on circumstances.

Restorative Circles

Each class has been using this highly valuable and effective strategy in their classroom. The class sits in a circle and discusses a topic relating to social and emotional learning provided by the teacher or a student. Rules for showing respect and taking turns ensure everyone can speak if they want to and different perspectives are respected. Research has shown that this strategy effectively improves student behaviour and relationships in schools.

Year 3/4 Camp to Echuca

The Year 3/4 camp to Echuca was an amazing success. It was wonderful to see students further build their relationships outside the school environment. Every student displayed their best qualities, making our school proud. We were complimented on our engagement and behaviour during their interactions with the guides and public. The camp provided opportunities for each child (and adult) to step out of their comfort zones and support each other, from swinging on ropes, following instructions, to organising our belongings.



Sporting Carnivals

Over Terms 1 and 2, the students showed off their best sporting abilities and sportsmanship with our swimming carnival, cross country and athletics carnival and we had superb weather for every event!





Year 5/6 Camp to Ballarat





JINDERA ANGLERS CLUB INC.

Fishing locally is still very good with most anglers being able to snare a feed or catch and release their chosen fish species. Redfin at Lake Hume are nice and fat and in spawning mode, with only minor sightings of the virus being present, good catches of trout are being caught at Lake Dartmouth and you don't have to go far from the ramp to get them. Good catches of yellowbelly are being reported from Lake Hume to below Yarrawonga and if you're prepared to put in the hours some ripping cod are being caught from the upper Murray and right along the Murray River. For a mixed bag of fish have a crack below the Hume dam wall and around Albury, yellowbelly, cod, trout and redfin are on the chew.

June will see the opening of the crayfishing season, considering 2022 was a tough year to cray, 2023 should be great, make sure you know the rules and abide by them.

The anglers had a monthly closed comp at Neils Bend, Walwa on the weekend of 26th, 27th and 28th May in very cold damp conditions, the river was in YOYO mod with river dropping Friday morning with a steady rise to Saturday afternoon when the river dropped again. Traditionally in the old days the best fishing was on a slow rising river and it didn't change levels every couple of days, just saying natural river flows are best for fish.

Best fish for the weekend was won by champion upper Murray angler Kevin (Cod Strangler) Brown with a 110cm Murray cod, best bag of fish went to Sham with a 85cm and a 57cm cod, Aaron Charnock got a nice 63cm cod and in the ladies Kirsty Taylor snared a smaller cod. Once again the doughnut awards were popular with Squeaky and Trevor pushing for the big doughnut award.

As often occurs on these weekends a few *funny things* happened, where's the rope Kirsty and a capsized canoe with captain Dylan going down with the ship, there is a reward out to anyone finding a Ryobi radio, kayak seat and a yeti stubby cooler.

A big thankyou to Graham for providing the wood for the weekend, it was really appreciated.

Once again the debate of trout cod or hybrid cod reared its head and I have no doubt there are hybrid cod in the upper Murray.

Next Anglers general meeting will be held on Friday, 2nd June commencing at 5.30pm.

If members have any recommendations for any changes to the club's constitution they must be submitted in writing at this meeting or prior.

Next fishing competition will be an **Open Comp** held on the last weekend of **June**, commencing on **Friday**, **23rd at 4pm** with the weigh-in at the Jindera Clubhouse at 4pm on Sunday, 25th June.


The children have been waiting a long time for the completion of these projects and they are engerly looking forward to the time when they will be in full use.
